

### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ACTS:

# SGA PROPOSES ELECTION CHANGE

A PROPOSED CHANGE IN THE METHOD OF SELECTING HOUSE PRESIDENTS FOP MIXED DORM-ITORIES HAS BEEN DRAWN UP BY THE LEGISLATIVE AND THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL® OF THE STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIA-TION. AND WAS FORMALLY PRE-SENTED TO THE STUDENT BODY IN HALL MEFTINGS LAST WEEK-

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL WILL HOLD AN OPEN MEETING IN THE BALLROOM OF ANN CAPTER LEE, AT 7:45 P.M. TOMOPROW FOP THE PURPOSE OF DISCUSSING THE PROPOSAL. AT THIS TIME, MEMBERS OF LEGISLATIVE COU-CIL WILL LISTEN TO ANY DIS-CUSSION FROM THE STUDENT BODY AT LARGE, AND ON THE BASIS OF THIS DISCUSSION WILL DRAW UP A FORMAL AMENT MENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Voting on the Amendment will then take place during the week of April 18 - 25.

THE CHANGE, WHICH CAME ABOUT IN RESPONSE TO NUM-EROUS COMPLAINTS CONCERNING THE PRESENT SELECTION SYS-TEM, WILL PLACE THE CHOICE OF HOUSE PRESIDENTS IN THE HANDS OF A DELEGATION OF THE JUNIOR CLASS, WHICH WILL WORK WITH THE EXECUTIVE CABINET OF STUDENT GOVERN-MENT. THESE TWO GROUPS WILL CHOOSE HOUSE PRESIDENTS ON THE BASIS OF A PERSONAL INTERVIEW AS WELL AS A WRIT TEN APPLICATION FOR THE POS ITION OF HOUSE PRESIDENT.

As stated by Bapbara Hamblet, Chairman of the Legislative Department of SGA, the proposal reads as follows:

"...MIXED DORM HOUSE PRES-IDENTS BESELECTED BY A VOTE OF EXECUTIVE CABINET AND A DELEGATION FROM THE JUNIOR CLASS,FOLLOWING A PROCEDURE IN WHICH ALL CANDIDATES FOR THE POSITION WILL HAVE SUB-MITTED A WRITTEN APPLICA-TION AND UNDERGONE A PER-SONAL INTERVIEW BY CABINET AND THE JUNIOR CLASS DELE-GATION."

THE EXECUTIVE CABINET MENTIONED ABOVE IS MADE UP OF THE PRESIDENT OF SGA AND THE FIFTEEN DORMITORY PRESIDENTS.

PROPONENTS OF THE PLAN FEEL THAT SUCH A CHANGE WOULD BE ADVANTAGEOUS IN THAT IT WOULD ALLOW A GREATER NUMBER OF GIRLS TO BE CONSIDERED FOR THE HOUSE PRESIDENCIES, AND BECAUSE, DURING THE PER-SONAL INTERVIEW, EACH CANDIDATE WOULD HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO DEMON-STRATE THE QUALITIES OF LEADERSHIP AND PUBLIC POISE THAT ARE NECESSARY FOR ALL HOUSE PRESIDENTS.

UNDER THE CURRENT SELECTION SYSTEM, THE ELECTION OF HOUSE PRES-IDENTS IS LEFT TO THE DISCRETION OF THE JUNIOR CLASS.

THIS SYSTEM ALSO PER-MITS THE ELECTION OF BOTH RISING JUNIORS AND SENIORS TO HOUSE PRESIDENCIES, AND THE NOMINATION OF CANDIDATES BY BOTH THE SOPHOMORE AND JUNIOR CLASSES. THE NOMINATION OF A SOPHOMORE IS RARE. HOWEVER, AND THE SYSTEM HAS BEEN DEFENDED ON THE GROUNDS THAT MEMBERS OF THE JUNIOR CLASS ARE FAM-ILIAR WITH THE ABILITIES OF THEIR CLASSMATES, AND ARE BEST QUALIFIED TO MAKE INTELLIGENT DECISIONS AS TO CAPABLE CANDIDATES FOR HOUSE PRESIDENCIES

As part of the Honors Work As part of the holious work revamping recommendation from the Committee on Academ-ic Excellence, the faculty also agreed that both the Depart-mental and Academic Excel-lence Committees would examine an applicant for Honors can-didacy with greater latitude than before, weighing the grade re-quirements and especially the student's motivations, special skills in her chosen field, and other capabilities.

Along with these decisions, the faculty encouraged every de-partment to offer some program of individual work for those who of individual work for those who either do not meet the grade re-quirements or who wish to un-dertake an individual project on a smaller scale.

In truth, choosing faculty with a view toward their social acceptability is a survival from the old days when colleges were genteel pre-serves, isolated from the tur-moil of the outside world. This no longer makes sense at a time no longer makes sense at a time when colleges not only are no longer separated from the great world, they are the great world.

At a school grievously afflict-At a school grievously afflict-ed with lower middle-class anx-iety, all bulletin board notices have to be cleared with a pris-sy office of the student ac-tivitaes determined to civilize the barbarians. The sense of play, the social passions, the sheer Idiosyncratic energy that turn up on a bulletin board are an expression of a school's expression of a school's ethos.


