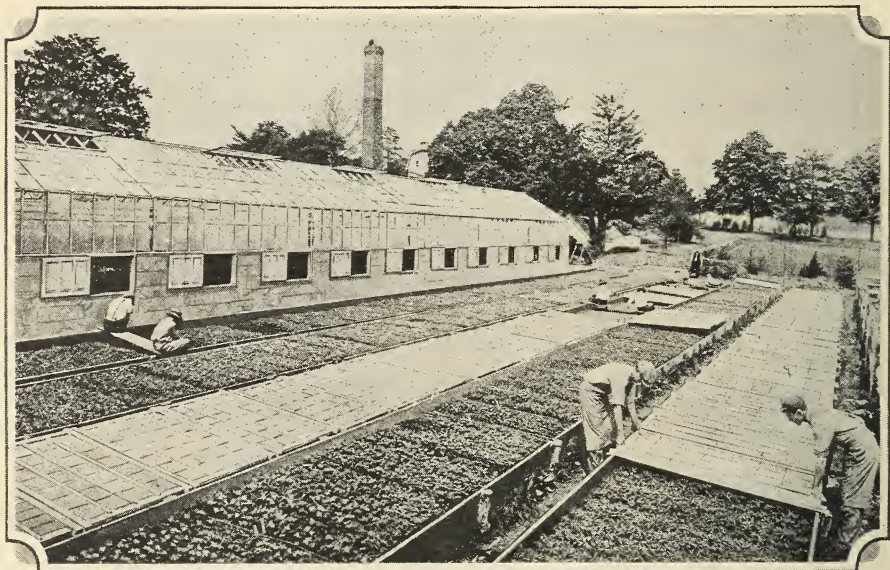

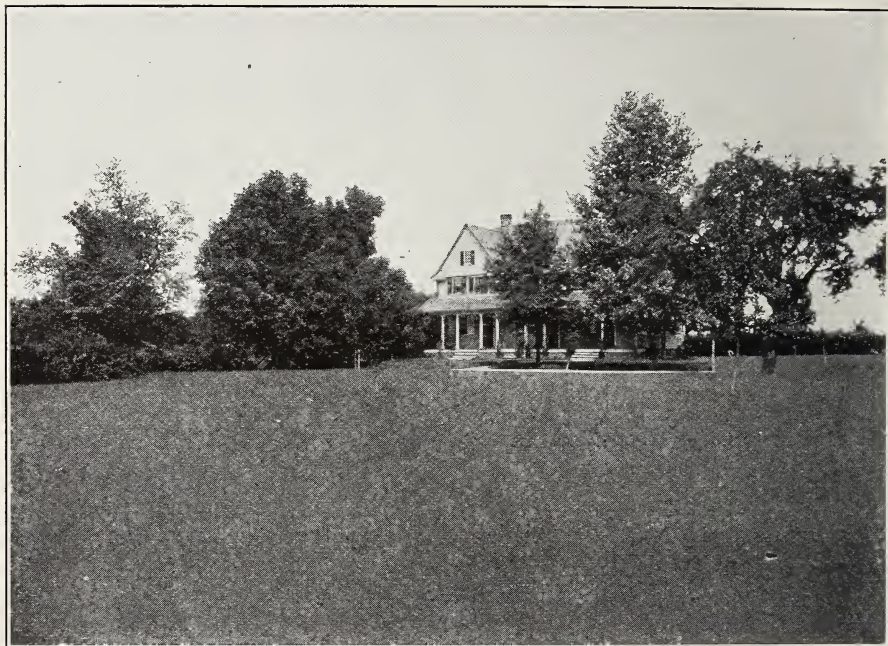

Make Your Garden Work Three Seasons Out of Four

Many people think that seeds cannot be planted any other time than in April and May. This is far from true. The wide-awake gardener begins sowing as early in the spring as possible, and sows succession crops throughout the summer and until late in the fall. Succession crops are most important, since they provide fresh vegetables for fall and winter use. A cellar full of stored vegetables is a good investment. Grow all the vegetables your garden can produce. Eat them fresh, evaporate them, can them, store them, and be independent of high food prices. Keep BURPEE'S ANNUAL handy for reference throughout the year.

When and What to Sow

The dates apply to the vicinity of Philadelphia and localities with similar weather conditions, where the first light fall frosts occur about the middle of October and severe frosts around the first of November. The outdoor sowing season begins late in March or early in April, depending on the condition of the ground.

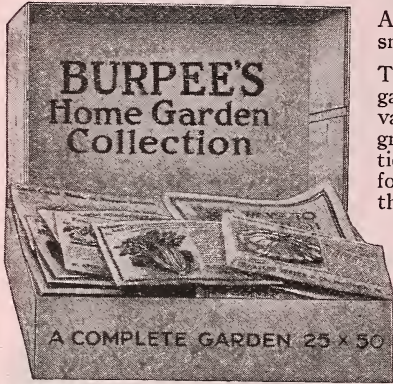

ROOT CROPS

Those vegetables that are grown principally for their roots, such as beets, carrots, and turnips, are, of course, classified as Root Crops. Root Crops are easy to grow. They grow quickly from seed and do well in all parts of the country in any good soil. Root Crops can be had early in the spring, all through the summer and fall, and can be easily stored for winter use. Root Crops every month in the year will help greatly to reduce the high cost of living.

EDIBLE SEEDS

Peas, beans, and corn are the Edible Seeds. No class of vegetables contains such highly concentrated food as do the Edible Seeds. So full of nutrition are the Edible Seeds that they might almost be called the vegetable beefsteak. Beans are more nutritious than meat.

GREENS & SALADS

Greens and Salads are just as important for the daily diet as are the Root Crops and Edible Seeds, for they contain the mineral salts which are so necessary for good health. 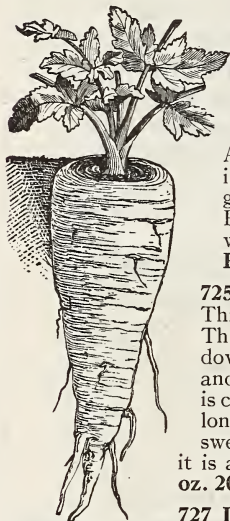
VEGETABLE FRUITS

Root Crops

Under this heading we have grouped together vegetables which are usually looked upon as Root Crops without claiming that they are, in a strictly botanical sense, Root Crops. The value of Root Crops is not sufficiently realized. 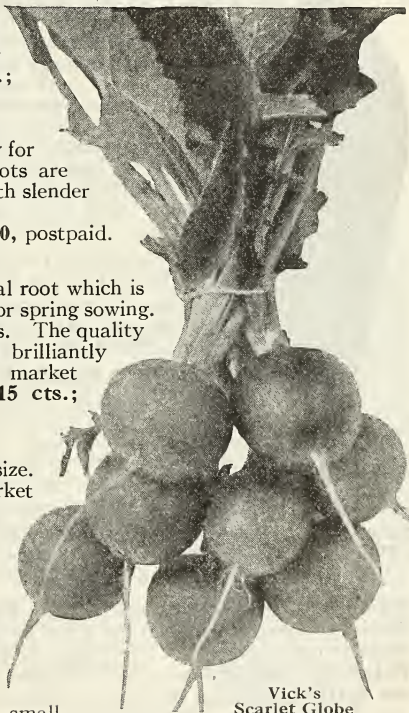

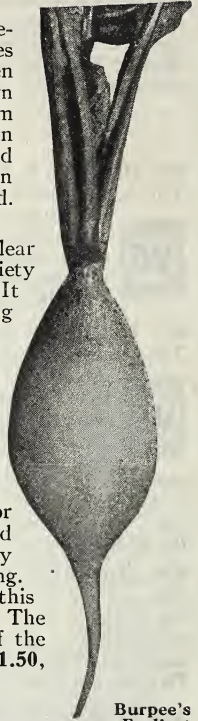

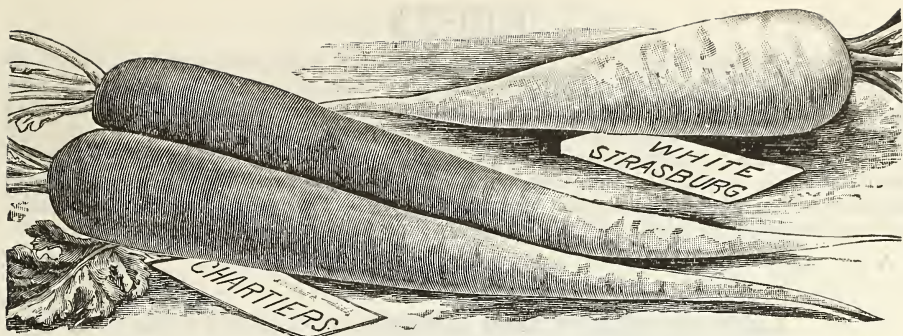

BEETS

Beets are classed according to their uses. We have *Sugar Beets*, *Mangel-Wurzels*, and *Table Beets*. The Sugar Beets are varieties which have for years been carefully selected for high sugar content of the root. They are extensively grown to extract the sugar and also for stock feeding. They are nutritious and easily stored over winter. The Mangel-Wurzels are universally grown for stock feeding. They grow to enormous size and yield a large quantity of nutritious roots. The Table Beets comprise varieties with comparatively small roots, selected for freeness from fiber, fine-grained texture, and sweetness. The deep-red varieties of this class are most preferred, but dark and light zoned as well as yellow-fleshed kinds are grown.

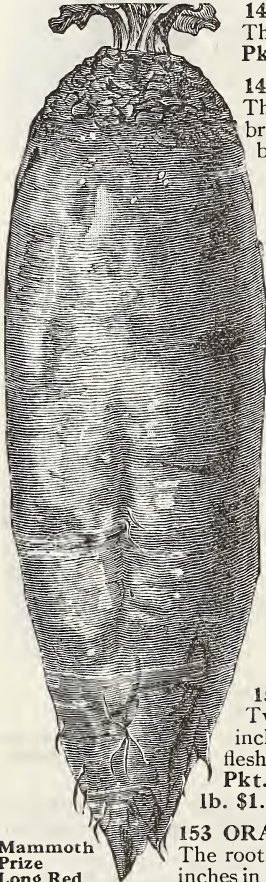

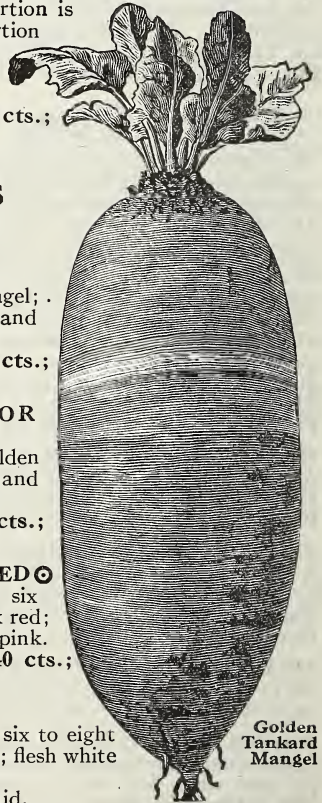

TABLE BEETS

These are of universal culture, but we would emphasize the importance of using improved strains which will produce the finest and smoothest roots with a minimum amount of foliage. It is important, also, to make frequent sowings in order that a constant supply of tender, young roots may be had throughout the season. When allowed to get too old, the roots become hard, have a woody fiber, and to a great extent lose their sweet flavor. Seed may be sown as early in spring as the ground can be worked into good condition. Sowings should be made for succession at least once a month up to the first of July, at which time we recommend making a large sowing to produce a supply of well-grown roots for winter use. If the roots are gathered on the approach of cold weather and packed in slightly moist earth, they can be kept in a cool cellar in perfect condition until spring.

The seed should be sown thinly in drills from one-half to one inch in depth, leaving twelve inches or more between the rows, to admit of cultivation. When well started, the plants should be thinned out to stand one in a place, three to four inches apart in the row, and the ground cultivated regularly throughout the growing season.

Carrots are easily stored and keep their good qualities under storage conditions. Larger sowings should be made late in June and during July. Half-long varieties are preferred to be sown at that time, and they will make fine roots of just the right size for winter storing. Take the roots up before severe frosts set in, cut the leaves within one-half inch from the top, and place them in a cool cellar. They will keep nice and plump if placed in alternate layers of dry soil and roots.

These can be grown easily in good, loose soil; keep well when stored for winter use and form an extremely wholesome addition to the winter rations of stock when fed in conjunction with corn and dry fodder. ABOUT THE GERMINATION OF LIMA BEANS

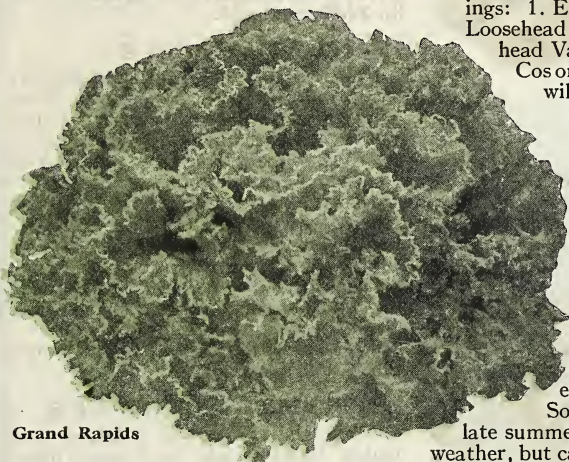
The Lima Bean is native to warmer climates and requires warm weather to grow to perfection. The seeds are by far more sensitive to cold and moist weather conditions than the ordinary snap beans, and cannot be planted until quite some time later. They must not be sown until all danger of cool and moist spring weather has passed. A week or two after planting Sweet Corn is generally safe.

Greens and Salads

"Greens and Salads" are rightly called "Nature's Tonics." The American people are too much inclined to eat pastries and highly seasoned and concentrated meat-foods, which are rich in proteins and fats, but are almost entirely lacking in mineral salts. The importance of these mineral salts in the diet, although it was only recently recognized, cannot be overestimated. The natural source of these essential salts is the "Greens and Salads." They should constitute a considerable portion of our food. The majority of the salad plants are easily grown. They are free from insect pests and are adapted to a wide range of soil and climate. They should be extensively grown in every garden. Most varieties can be sown as succession crops, and there is no month during the entire garden season that will not produce one or the other of these useful Greens and Salads.

LETTUCE

We have classed all varieties of lettuce offered in BURPEE'S ANNUAL under the following headings: 1. Earliest and Forcing Varieties; 2. Loosehead Cutting Varieties; 3. Solid Crisp-head Varieties; 4. 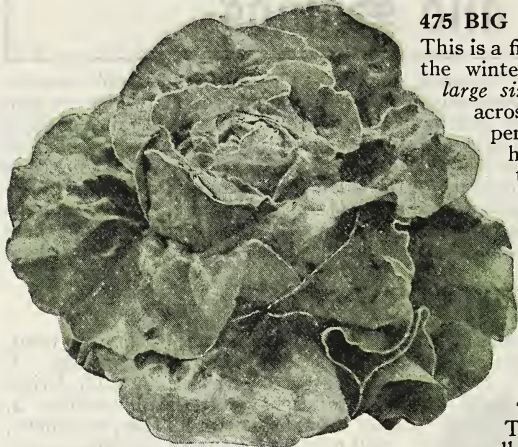

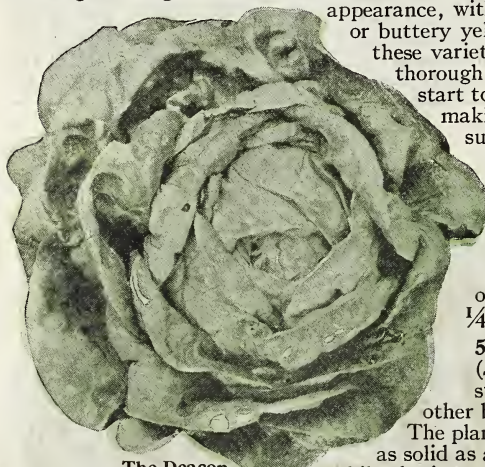

Winter Varieties of Celery

Celery is one of our finest winter vegetables. When properly stored, the stalks keep crisp and nutty in flavor all through the winter until late in spring. Celery is a typical cool season vegetable and should be sown to delay the most active and important growth until the cool fall months. For a winter supply the seed is sown early in spring either in a frame or a specially prepared seedbed. Keep the seedbed well moistened but avoid overwatering. Success with celery depends mostly upon nursing the plants along and preventing any check in growth. WHAT SCIENCE SAYS ABOUT SALADS

World-famous scientists have discovered by actual laboratory tests that many diseases, like rheumatism, gout, nervous troubles, etc., originate from the collection of poisonous germs in the intestines. These famous physicians have pointed out that the way to avoid this condition is to use salads, such as chicory, collards, cabbage, lettuce, spinach, etc., plentifully. Europeans have known this for years. The French call spinach "the broom of the stomach." CHINESE, or CELERY CABBAGE

Chinese Cabbage was introduced into this country by the Chinese of the Pacific Coast. It has been cultivated in China for many years and quite a number of varieties are known. Of all these, Wong Bok and Pe-Tsai have proven in our trial-

grounds to be most worthy of offering to Burpee customers. Chinese Cabbage belongs to the cabbage family, although the plants more closely resemble lettuce. The most essential requirement for raising Chinese Cabbage successfully is cool weather. Where the summers are warm, sowing must be delayed until early August. In the vicinity of Philadelphia, spring-sown seed seldom forms the attractive, tightly folded heads, but goes to seed before having made much leaf-growth. With us the first week of August is the best time. Sow the seed thinly in the rows where they are to mature, since they do not transplant well, and thin the plants out to stand twelve to fifteen inches apart in the row. The plants develop quickly, forming large, tightly folded heads of tender leaves which are well blanched in the heart. They thrive in any good soil and mature full size heads in one hundred and twenty to one hundred and thirty days. Chinese Cabbage can be served as salad like lettuce or, when cut, will answer the purpose of cold-slaw. Boiled, it is even more palatable than ordinary cabbage and somewhat resembles Brussels sprouts in flavor. Chinese Cabbage is quite hardy and is not hurt by slight frosts. It should, however, be gathered before

severe freezing sets in. Taken up with the roots, the plants will store for quite some time if placed between layers of straw in a cool, dry cellar.

CREAMED CHINESE CABBAGE

1 head of bleached Chinese Cabbage. 2 cups cream sauce. Wash and cut the cabbage into half-inch pieces, put into saucepan, cover with boiling water, and let it stand until cold, then drain, rinse with cold water, return to saucepan, cover with boiling water, and boil twenty-five minutes. Drain and cover with sauce.

How to Make the Sauce: 4 level tablespoonfuls of butter or butter substitute. 4 level tablespoonfuls of flour. 2 cups of cold milk. 2 level teaspoons salt. A little pepper. ¼ teaspoon of grated nutmeg or one teaspoon of onion. 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.

Put butter or butter substitute into saucepan; if onion is used add; when butter is melted, add the flour; mix until smooth and add cold milk, slowly stirring so it will not lump; add seasoning and flavoring.

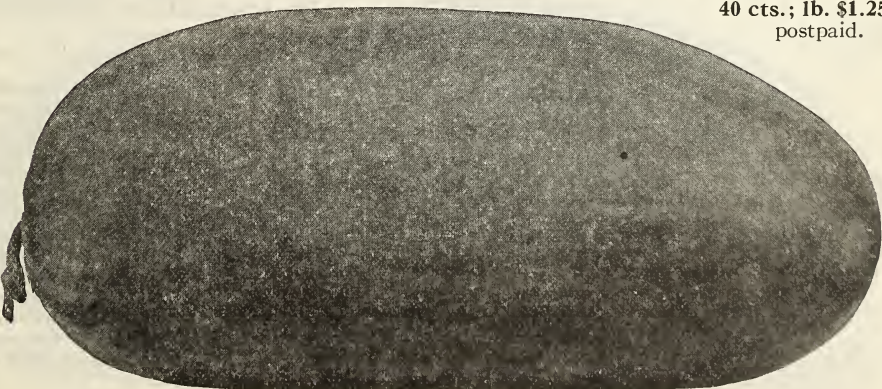

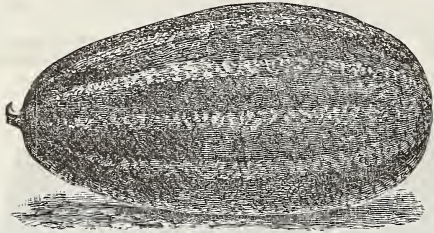


A Specimen of Tom Watson Watermelon—from a Photograph

EGG PLANTS

The Egg Plant is becoming more and more popular in our markets, and the market season is greatly prolonged by early shipments from the South.

In our vicinity seed should be sown in March in a warm hotbed in light, rich soil, or they may be started in a box in the sunny window of a warm room. Sow thinly, and when young plants show two or three leaves, transplant to stand three inches apart each way; or, if growing indoors, set them in small flower-pots. Kept constantly warm and moist, they will make fine large plants by the time the weather is warm enough to set them outdoors, which should not be done until the trees are in full leaf. Set plants in rich soil two feet apart each way. Hoe frequently to keep soil loose and fine.

PEPPERS

The large-fruited, mild-flavored Peppers have become highly esteemed for serving as a separate vegetable. The thick-fleshed fruits, either ripe or green, are filled with finely cut meat or other ingredients and served baked or stewed. The small-fruited sorts, which are hot and pungent, are used extensively for flavoring.

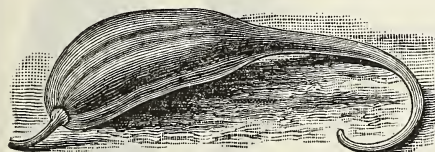

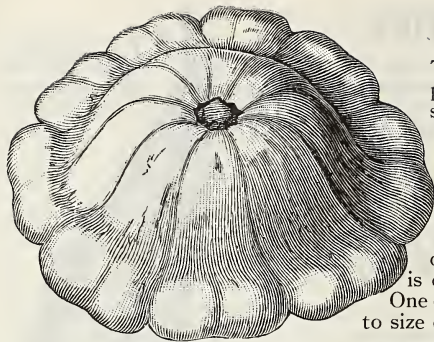

PUMPKINS

Pumpkins can be grown easily among a crop of sweet or field corn or wherever there is ample room for the vines to spread. In the small garden they can be grown by planting the seed near a paling-fence or some low building over which the vines can run without interfering with other crops in the garden. In field culture it is best to make the hills ten feet or more apart each way, so that the vines may have ample room in which to spread. Wherever fruits are desired for exhibition purposes a large hole should be made with a liberal quantity of well-rotted manure, and only one or two fruits should be allowed to set on each vine. Three or more seeds can be planted to a hill, but when the plants are well started they should be thinned out, leaving only the best plant standing in the hill. The fruits should be gathered and carefully stored in a warm, dry place before they are touched by frost. According to size of seed one ounce will plant twenty-five to fifty hills.

OATS

In the United States the oats region consists of six adjacent States, namely, Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Nebraska, and Indiana. These six States produce over one-half of the total oat crop in the United States. Other States producing good oats include the New England States, Pennsylvania, New York, and Ohio.
