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

Mock, and honored with the award of the Gold Medal of the Bagatelle Gardens at Paris, 1915. It is distinct and peculiar in color, a pale soft pink or rose shaded with hydrangea-pink. The flowers are very large, full and fragrant, perfect in form, and borne on rigid stems. The growth is vigorous and very floriferous.

MOLLY BLIGH (H. T.)—This Rose is described by the introducers as a queen among queens. The flowers are large, ideal shape, deep spirally pointed, of a deep maddery-pink heavily zoned orange-mad-der at the base of the petals; exquisitely fragrant and very free.

MRS. CHARLES RUSSELL (H. T.)—This wonderful new American Rose has taken the country by storm. No other forcing Rose except "American Beauty" can compete with it when it comes to counting points. Stems three feet long, stiff and surmounted by grand rosy-pink blooms of the largest size and build.

MRS. CAMPBELL HALL (Tea)—Delicate creamy-MRS. CHARLES BELL (Pierson, 1918)-



MRS. MACKELLAR (H. T.)—The glorious blooms make this an imposing Rose. A deep citron or delicate pure canary color. As the large blooms gracefully expand the guard petals charmingly reflex and become pearly primrose-white of great decorative beauty. Award of merit (unanimous), R. H. S., London.

MURELLE (T.)—A Rose of the type of Safrano, only a much stronger grower. It is a very free bloomer and is a Rose with a great future. Color rosy-blush flushed with saffron-yellow.

NATIONAL EMBLEM (H. T.)—Dark crimson of perfect shape, habit and inflorescence; as a bedding, massing and cutting Rose it is unique. Buds long and pointed, opening to large, full, handsome flowers of great beauty, flowering freely.

NERISSA (H. T.)—This Rose was given an award of merit from the Royal Horticultural Society of England. Why they did not give it a gold medal is beyond my ken. An enormously large, full flower, of fine shape, making a magnificent effect in the garden. Growth vigorous. This is a great Rose.



The Ever-Blooming Butterfly Bush

(Buddleya Variabilis Magnifica)

It was a matter of some thought before this highly desirable plant was finally christened with the common English name by which it goes. Several years ago there were imported from Europe some plant novelties, and this one was among them. I observed it carefully for a season and was charmed with its beauty, ease of culture and free-flowering habit. The name Butterfly Bush was applied to it because it seems to attract butterflies in large numbers. Particularly I notice that it is not alone the common little yellow species of butterfly, but also the large and gorgeously colored butterflies that swarm about it as though vieing with it in brilliancy of color. This shrub from a young plant set out either in the spring or fall, will mature to full size the first summer, producing a handsome bush, which the first year often maintains a height of four feet. It produces long, graceful stems, which terminate in tapering panicles of beautiful lilac-colored flowers that are of miniature size and borne by the hundreds on a flower head which is frequently ten inches long. A single plant the first season will throw out as many as fifty flower spikes, which increase greatly in number during succeeding years. The year after planting, it generally commences to flower in June and continues each season until severe frosts nip it. The foliage and blooms are exceedingly fine. The shrub is rather semi-herbaceous, by which I mean in some latitudes it will die down to the ground, and while perfectly hardy, I recommend covering the roots with manure, leaves or other suitable materials as winter approaches, as this will produce a heavy growth the following season. This shrub is very desirable as an individual specime on the lawn and in the garden, or placed promiscuously in the shrubbery border. Fine plants, 25 cents each; three for 60 cents.

DAISY COLLECTION

No flowers are so graceful for cut-flower work as those of the Daisy form. In the group named below are my own superb Alaska, or Shasta Daisy, and two from South Africa—Arctotis Grandis, and the Dimorpotheca hybrids; the latter two, so splendid and so little known, are as magnificent as the well-known Shasta Daisy.

As you are perhaps aware, all the plants we know as Daisies belong to the Chrysanthemum family, a widely scattered but tolerably distinct family. I have added others, that do not belong to the Daisy tribe, adding them for their color and flat-petaled form, their long stems and grace; these are the Cosmos, Gaillardia, and Coreopsis.

I grow all these flowers in my own garden, and because I can always gather a vase of graceful, clear-toned flowers for my table, it occurred to me that others might like to know of these for their own gardens,

so it is with pleasure I offer this list for your consideration.

Agathea Coelestis

Exquisite sky-blue; requires a sheltered position, tender, but will bloom all winter if lifted and potted in the fall; not so long-stemmed as the other Daisies, but chosen for its delightful color. Pkt. 5 cents.

Anthemis Kelwayi

Golden Marguerite. Deep golden; blooms from midsummer until frost; perfectly hardy. Pkt. 5 cents.

Arctotis Grandis

South African Daisy. Blooms very large; petals bluish-white above, pure lavender under side. Half hardy annual; one or two plants will supply hundreds of blooms. Flowers until hard freezing. Pkt. 5 cents.

Coreopsis Grandiflora

Clear, pure yellow; blooms early, and if cut back will give scattered blooms all season. Pkt. 5 cents.

This is declared to be the greatest acquisition to the cut-flower florist and to the garden made within the last thirty years. Annuals where deep freezing occurs; will bloom all winter in the house if lifted early; are winter bloomers in Southern California; they are all-round grand flowers and must be grown to be appreciated. Colors range from orange, through yellow, salmon, pink, white and bluish-white; flowers three to four inches across. Pkt. 5 cents.

Gaillardia Grandiflora
