### SOUTHERN GROWN WATERMELONS ARE FAMOUS FOR OUALITY

It seems that the soil and climate of the South are peculiarly adapted to the successful growing of watermelons. We have become known as the Watermelon House, because of the quality of our seed. Naturally all of our seed is Southern grown. We have a grower who we believe has no equal. While the South is producing heavy crops of Watermelons, we would like to see more grown, for it is one of the best money crops.

#### PLANTING AND GROWING DIRECTIONS

Plant in sandy soil that is well drained. If soil is not naturally loose and mellow, make it so by thorough tilling. Proper preparation of soil is half or more of battle for success with any crop. Fresh soil requires little or no fertilizer. Good melons may be grown from old thin soil if well fertilized. Soil-building crop turned under is best fertilizing method. Lot manure is good, best applied broadcast in winter and broken in, or may be applied in less quantity in and about hill. Construct seed-bed so as to drain hills. Space hills not less than 10 feet either way. Open little furrow about 16 inches long over hill and drop in seed about 1 inch apart. Cover seed about 1½ inches deep and stand will be assured if soil is in proper warmth and moisture. Many failures are caused from careless planting. A temperature of 65 is necessary to germinate melon seed. So don't plant till ground is warm. Thin to two plants to hill when vigorous growth begins. Plant in sandy soil that is well drained. If soil is

set. Keep clean. High winds and sand-blows damage melons. Consider this in location. Do not plant melons on same land successive seasons if avoidable. melons on same land successive seasons if avoidable. Use vigilance and energy against insect pests under advice of State Entomologist. The worst enemies are the spotted Cucumber beetle and the Aphides or common plant lice. The former destroy plants when young and may be controlled by dusting plants with Arsenate of Lead or same mixed equal parts with Hydrated Lime. Perhaps Kerosene Emulsion spray is best treatment for Aphis, which usually attacks about time crop is setting. An effective measure is carefully burning or burying the first plants on which lice appear.

Fortunately the melon is almost a sure cropper, and the careful following of these simple directions will almost insure success. We will be glad to correspond with any one desiring to give or get help on producing this very important crop.





### Plant a Few Spring Turnips

#### CULTURE

Spring plantings of turnips are important, although the general crop for winter is usually sown late in the summer or fall. The spring sown seed germinates rapidly and turnips are ready for use very early; being grown under more favorable conditions of temperature than in the fall. They are more tender, sweeter and more juicy than those grown in the summer and fall. Sow thinly in drills from January to March, according to locality, covering seed lightly. They make best on new ground or ground that has not been cultivated for several years. If stable manure is used it should be applied several months before the crop is planted, as fresh manure makes spotted turnips, inferior in quality and with a rank flavor. For fall or winter use sow rutabagas July 15th to September 1st; turnips August 1st to October 15th, and sow one ounce of seed to 200 feet of row; 2 to 3 pounds per acre.



The following rules should be kept constantly in mind:

- 1. Be sure of the cause of your trouble.

The different entomologists throughout the country classify insects into many different groups, but we will here classify them into two principal groups which will be all that is necessary to start along the right lines of study.

First: Chewing Insects, such as the potato beetle, the different caterpillars, etc., which bite off and eat exposed portions of the tissue of the plant. These are usually controlled by applying a stomach poison, such as Paris Green, Arsenate of Lead.

Second: Sucking Insects, such as plant lice, various scale insects, aphis, red spider, or the squash stink bug, etc. These insects are provided with a beak, through which they suck the sap or the plant, after having only punctured the exposed tissues. This group of insects can only be controlled by the application of a contact spray of a greasy, oily or caustic character, and they must be directly hit and covered so as to clog up the breathing pores of the bodies.

As there is danger of injuring trees or plants by either using the wrong material or by careless mixing we suggest that when in doubt, one should consult the state entomologists or others competent to give information.

# What to Plant in the Garden

### **JANUARY**

Prepare your hotbed in which to sow Beets, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Cucumber, Celery, Egg-Cabbage, Cauliflower, Cucumber, Celery, Egg-plants, Lettuce, Melons, Onions, Pepper, Squash and Tomatoes for transplanting. If weather per-mits, in the open, Beets (table and stock varie-ties), Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Carrots, Col-lards, Corn, Corn Salad, Chervil, Endive, Herbs, Kale, Kohl-rabi, Leek, Lettuce, Mustard, Onion, Parsley, Parsnip, Peas, Potatoes, Radish, Salsify, Spinach, Tobacco, Turnip. Set out Onion Sets and Shallots, Strawberry Plants, Asparagus, Horseradish and Rhubarb Roots. Horseradish and Rhubarb Roots.

### FEBRUARY

Beets, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Celery, Eggplants, Lettuce, Onions, Pepper and Tomatoes should be transplanted in cold frame or boxes to pro-duce sturdy plants; Cucumber, Melons and Squashes should be sown in dirtbands for transplanting after danger of frost is past, as they will not suffer any disturbance this way, and will be at least a month earlier. If weather permits, sow in the open: Artichokes, Asparagus, Beans, Beets, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Carrots, Collards, Corn Salad, Chervil, Endive, Herbs, Kale, Kohl-rabi, Leek, Lettuce, Mustard, Onion, Parsley, Parsnip, Peas, Potatoes, Radish, Rhubarb, Salsify, Spinach, Tobacco, Turnip. Set out Onion Sets, Shallots, Sweet Potatoes for Slips, Straw-berry and Vegetable Plants, Asparagus, Horseradish, Rhubarb Roots.

### MARCH

A general list of vegetable seeds may be sown in the open ground now, as well as hotbed plants can now be transplanted. Sow Artichoke, Asparagus, Bush and Pole Beans, Beets, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Carrots, Cauliflower, Celery, Collards, Corn Salad, Sweet Corn, Cucumber, Eggplant, Endive, Herbs, Kale, Kohlrabi, Leek, Lettuce, Melons, Mustard, Okra, Onions, Parsley, Parsnips, Peas, Sweet and Irish Potatoes, Pepper, Pumpkins, Radish, Rhubarb, Salsify, Spinach, Squash, Tobacco, Turnip. Set out Onion Sets, Shallots, all kinds of Vegetable Plants, Asparagus, Horseradish, Rhubarb Roots, Sweet Potato Slips.

### APRIL.

Work enumerated for March applies to April.

### MAY

Plant Bush and Pole Beans and sow Beets, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Carrots, Collards, Corn Salad, Sweet Corn, Cucumber, Endive, Herbs, Kale, Kohl-rabi, Leek, Lettuce, Melons, Mustard, Okra, Onions, Parsley, Peas, Sweet and Irish Potatoes, Pumpkins, Radishes, Salsify, Spinach, Squash, Tobacco, Turnips, Celery, Eggplant, Pepper and Tomatoes for early fall crop. Set out Sweet Potato Slips and Onion

### JUNE

Plant Bush and Pole Beans. Sow Beets, Carrots, Cucumbers, Sweet Corn, Endive, Herbs, Leek, Lettuce, Melons, Mustard, Okra, Parsley, Peas, Pumpkins, Radishes, Squash, Turnips, also Eggplants, Pepper, Tomatoes and Celery for fall crop.

### JANUARY

Work enumerated above for March may apply to April. Good time to sow Barnyard and Cattail Millet.

### MAY

Artichokes, Broom Corn, Buckwheat, all varie-Corn, Cow Peas, Soy and Velvet Beans, Japan Clover, Cotton, Bermuda, Johnson and Sudan Grass, Thousand-Headed Kale, Barnyard, Cattail and German Millet, Peanuts, Potatoes, Pumpkin, Rape, Salt Bush, Sunflower and Teosinte.
