

Alfalfa. As a fertilizing, land-enriching crop, it is unequaled. The roots sink down into the earth searching for nourishment and bringing to the surface the chemicals and fertilizing materials that have been stored 10 to 15 feet deep. One seeding stands for years. All cattle are fond of it. If possible, sow with oats at the rate of 15 pounds per acre, or if the land is very poor, sow 3 pounds more. The first season the growth will be very light, but don't be worried if the plants are small and several inches apart, for that means the next season you will probably get from 3 to 5 tons per acre, and it increases for several years, producing as high as 10 tons; but that is a very large yield. It should be cut when in full bloom, but don't cut too early and be careful not to allow it to become water soaked after cutting, as it greatly reduces its value for feeding.

Blue Grass. (Kentucky.) Extra fancy cleaned. One of the most valuable sorts for lawn purposes, and as pasture grass is indispensable. This grade is best for sowing lawns. Sow 3 to 5 bushels per acre for lawn; for pasture, sow $2\frac{1}{2}$ bushels. Bushel, 21 pounds.

Clover, Red. Fine quality, high germinating seed, free from foreign matter. 60 pounds per bushel.

Clover, Alsike (Swedish). Harvested with great care; the finest product of the market. 60 pounds per bushel.

Clover, Scarlet (Crimson). Used principally as a soil restorative. Imported seed. Best quality. 60 pounds per bushel.

Clover, White Dutch. For thickening the growth of the lawn, a better seed could not be used. Our grade is extra fine. 60 pounds per bushel.

Canadian Blue Grass. Adapted especially to high, dry situations. Fine for permanent pasture. Bushel, 14 pounds.

Domestic Rye Grass. Fine for an immediate effect. Bushel, 24 pounds.

Herd or Red Top, Fancy Hulled. Extra recleaned seed. Bushel, 32 pounds.

Herd or Red Top Grass. Western. Purity high. Very popular for field use. Bushel 10 pounds.

Hard Fescue. Thrives well in dry situations where many other grasses fail; 30 pounds to the acre. Bushel, 12 pounds.

Meadow Fescue. English Blue Grass. An excellent grass for permanent pasture or hay. Bushel, 22 pounds.

Orchard Grass. For pasture, sowing under orchards or shady places. Bushel, 14 pounds.

Rhode Island Bent Grass. (Agrostis Canina.) Resembles Herd Grass, forming a fine turf, even on thin soils. Doing especially well in salt atmospheres. Sow 40 pounds to the acre. Bushel, 15 pounds.

Timothy Seed. Best grades, strictly recleaned. 45 pounds per bushel.

VALUABLE PLANTS FOR SUMMER FORAGE AND ENSILAGE

Crimson Clover. Solves the problem of cheap manuring; it is the great nitrogen gatherer and economizer in the use of fertilizers. Improves poor lands and restores to fertility those that have been worn down by excessive cropping. May be planted in spring, summer and fall. Splendid for reseeding Red Clover that has been winter killed. Sow 15 to 20 pounds per acre.

Soja or Soy Beans. One of the most remarkable drought resisting crops under cultivation. Will thrive under the most adverse conditions; tremendous yielder and valuable soil improver.

Cow Peas. When planted in rich soil make an enormous growth of vine of high feeding value and equal to clover for enriching the ground if plowed under Whippoorwill Gray Crowder, New Era varieties are adapted to Northern growth. Sow 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ bushels broadcast, or drill 20 to 30 pounds per acre.


Canada Field Peas. These are very valuable for fattening stock, and can also be grown for soiling purposes, but are of greater value for fodder when fed as ground feed, or the vines can be cured for hay, which is of great nutritive value. They can be sown alone or with oats; if sown alone, sow 2 bushels to the acre; if with oats, sow 1 bushel of peas and 1½ bushels of oats.

Winter or Hairy Vetch. (Vicia Villosa.) Can be sown from July to November broadcast, at rate of 20 to 30 pounds per acre, with one bushel of oats or wheat, or 40 to 50 pounds if sown alone. Will grow on most any soil and produce a good crop. Splendid as a soil improver or for feeding.

Dwarf Essex Rape. It can be sown in drills far enough apart to cultivate, or broadcast-If sown in drills, but 7 pounds per acre is necessary. The best way is to sow it broadcast on very clean soil, or to sow it with your spring grain at the rate of 15 pounds per acre.

Sweet Clover, Bokhara (Melilotus Alba), also Yellow Blossom (Melilotus Officinalis) While extensively used as a bee food, these clovers are valuable varieties for soiling (green manure); for sowing in the spring on lands which are later to be sown in alfalfa. They grow from 3 to 5 feet high, according to soil and location. Sow 15 lbs. per acre in early spring, alone, or 10 lbs. per acre with other crops.

Sudan Grass. For summer forage or grass crop will produce two or three cuttings each season, stools out thickly after the first cutting, makes a most nutritious and desirable forage crop. Sow in drills 10 lbs. to acre, broadcast 25 lbs. to acre.

WHEN TO PLANT SEEDS

The seeds of farm crops may be divided into two classes, according to the temperatures at which they will germinate or sprout readily and can be safely planted, and the blossoming time of fruit can be taken as a more certain guide than any arbitrary calendar date.

1st Class—Those seeds that will germinate or sprout at an average temperature of forty-five degrees in the shade, or at about the time the peach and plum trees blossom:

Barley Red Clover Kale Oats Crimson Clover Cabbage Lettuce Cauliflower Rye Onion Grasses Wheat Beet Parsnip Pea Turnip Parsley Spinach

These can be planted with safety in the spring as soon as the ground can be prepared, and some of them if planted in the fall, live through the winter.

2nd Class—Those seeds that will germinate or sprout at an average temperature of sixty degrees in the shade, or when the apple trees blossom:

Alfalfa Okra Egg Plant Tomato Melon
Cotton Pumpkin String Bean Corn Cucumber
Pole Bean Cow Pea Squash Soy Bean Pepper
