- Elm (Moline)—Fine new type of American elm; rapid upright grower with large leaves. 8 to 10 ft., ea. \$1.50.
- Locust (Globe-headed) Attractive new formal dwarf type, forming large dense head without pruning. On 5 to 6 ft. stems, ea. \$2.00.
- Maple (Skinner's Cut Leaf)—Silver maple type having very finely cut leaves and drooping branches. 6 to 8 ft., ea. \$1.50.
- Maple (Soft or Silver)—Well known rapid growing maple. 6 to 8 ft., ea. \$1.00.
- Mountain Ash (European) Ornamental tree bearing bright orange berry clusters. 6 to 8 ft., ea. \$1.25.

 Mulberry (Russian) A tree also suitable for hedge or windbreak. 6 to 8 ft., ea. 50c.
- Poplar (Bolleana)—Most refined type of poplar; narrow rapid growing tree keeping a smooth green bark; foliage dark green with silver underside. 8 to 10 ft., ea. \$1.50; 6 ft., ea. 75c.
- **Poplar (Carolina)—Pyramidal tree of very rapid growth. 8 to 10 ft., ea. 75c; 6 ft., ea. 40c.
- Poplar (Lombardy)—Tall spire-like grower. 6 to 8 ft., ea. 50c.

Poplar (Simoni) — Shape similar to Lombardy; smaller leaves. 6 to 8 ft., ea. 50c.

ORNAMENTAL SHRUBS

- Almond (Pink Flowering)—Showy pink flower clusters before leaves appear. 18 to 24 in., ea. 50c.
- **XBarberry (Japanese) Hardy shrub for low hedges, foundation, or groups; rich green foliage turning to red in autumn; red berries. 12 to 15 in., ea. 15c; per 100, \$8.50; 3 yr. clumps, ea. 30c.
- Barberry (Red Leaved)—Newer form of above, having blood red leaves all summer in sunny location; red berries. 12 to 18 in., ea. 35c.
 - Butterfly Bush (Magnifica)—Grows from ground each season producing long clusters of lavender flowers from July on. Strong No. 1 plants, ea. 35c.
- Caragana—Large shrub for specimens, screens or hedges; very hardy; has small yellow pea shape flowers in spring. 4 to 5 ft., ea. 50c.
- Cotoneaster (Acutifolia)—Graceful, very hardy shrub with colored foliage and black berries in autumn. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 40c.
- Pogwood (Alba Sibirica)—Shrub with very bright red stems; valuable for winter landscape. 18 to 24 in., ea. 35c.
 - Dogwood (Gold Twig)—Winter bark is golden yellow; often used with red-stemmed variety. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 50c.
- Honeysuckle (Pink)—Hardy, vigorous grower; pink flowers followed by red berries. 3 to 4 ft., ea. 50c; 18 to 24 in., ea. 20c.
- Honeysuckle (Red)—Red flowering type of above shrub. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 35c.
 - Hydrangea (P. G.)—Large lilac shaped bloom clusters, white turning to pink; August. 2 and 3 yr. plants, ea. 35c.
- XLilac (Common Purple)—2 to 3 ft., ea. 35c.
- X Lilac (Common White)—2 to 3 ft., ea. 50c.
 - Lilac (Persian)—Later blooming, lower growing type; light lilac flowers. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 40c.
- Lilac (Japonica) Has very long white bloom clusters in June; tall grower. 3 to 4 ft., ea. 75c.
- Mock Orange (Coronarius)—White flowers, fragrant and profuse. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 40c.
- Mock Orange (Virginal)—Semi-double, intermittant flowers all summer. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 50c.
- Prunus (Cistena)—Very hardy shrub with rich purple red foliage; effective singly or in groups.

XRosa Rubrifolia-New hardy shrub rose with striking red foliage all summer; small pink

flowers. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 60c.

Snowball (Common)—Forms many balls of pure white flowers in May-June. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 50c.

- Snowberry (White)—Small pink flowers followed by waxy white berries which remain into winter. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 35c; 18 to 24 in., ea. 25c.

 Snowberry (Vulgaris or Coralberry)—Has dark, close-set foliage and clusters of red berries massed along drooping branches. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 35c; 18 to 24 in., ea. 25c.
- Spirea (Anthony Waterer) Dwarf; flat red flower clusters over long period. Low clumps, ea. 25c.
- Spirea (Frobeli)—More vigorous than above variety; colorful spring and autumn foliage. 18 to 24 in. clumps, ea. 35c.
- Spirea (Thunbergi)—Fine, feathery dense foliage; profuse white flowers in May. 18 to 24 in., ea. 35c.
- Spirea (Van Houtte) A most indispensable shrub; a fountain of white flowers in May and June; foliage and form is ornamental the year round. 3 to 4 ft. heavy specimens, ea. 50c; lighter grade, ea. 20c.
- Sumac (Fern Leaf)—Splendid shredded foliage; red fruit clusters; brilliant autumn color. 3 to 4 ft., ea. 50c; 18 to 24 in., ea. 25c.
- Tamarix (Africana) Feathery green foliage; pink flower panicles in spring. 4 to 5 ft., ea. 50c.
- Tamarix (Hispida) Bright silvery foliage; bright coral pink flowers over long summer period. 3 to 4 ft., ea. 50c.
- Viburnum Opulus (Highbush Cranberry)—Decorative shrub with white flowers in May followed by showy clusters of scarlet fruits. 2 to 3 ft., ea. 50c.
- Willow (Pussy)—Popular for large gray catkins in early spring. 3 to 4 ft., ea. 40c; 6 to 8 ft., ea. \$1.00.

- Clematis (Jackmanni)—Large purple flowers; a beautiful vine, ea. 75c.

- Ivy (Boston)—Climbs brick, stone or concrete walls, ea. 50c.
- XIvy (Englemanni)—Neat hardy self-climber with very brilliant autumn colors. ea. 35c.
- Silver Lace Vine—Covered with clouds of fragrant white flowers from July till fall; strong rapid grower. ea. 75c.


