





# Novelties for 1936

# CALCEOLARIA "Feltham Scarlet"

The plants are fairly dwarf and compact in habit, and the flowers are of a rich, dark scarlet, which will make a glorious show in the greenhouse. One of the most striking colors in the hybrid Calcolarias. **Pkt. 50c.** 

# "Golden Bedder"

There is no doubt that gardeners will welcome "Golden Bedder" as an alternative to the orange form for Spring and early Summer bedding. Its fine tone will blend more easily with many subjects than does that of the "Allioni." The color is deep golden yellow. (Hardy Perennial.) **Pkt. 50c.** 

# CHELIDONIUM "Yellow Queen"

This is a most attractive biennial. The plant reaches a height of 4-5 feet and has green cut foliage, somewhat resembling that of "Meconopsis." The flowers of a beautiful golden yellow, are produced freely and remind one of a "Yellow Romneya." **Pkt. 50c.** 

# CORNFLOWER "Jubilee Gem"

A dwarf variety growing about 12 inches in height. The compact plants are literally covered with dark but vivid double blue flowers. The foliage is distinct from all other Cornflowers, forming a tufted mass of vivid green. (Hardy Annual.) **Pkt. 50c.** 

# DIANTHUS "Delight"

The growth of the plant is about 9 inches high, of neat, erect habit, which is continuous flowering out of doors from June until October, producing flowers about half an inch in diameter. There is a bewildering range of colors from the palest pink to the deepest purple. (Hardy Annual.) **Pkt. 50c.** 

# LINARIA MAROCCANA "Fairy Bride"

A great advance on any Linaria hitherto raised. The plants are 7-8 inches high, very bushy, and extremely floriferous, each bearing hundreds of glistening, pure white flowers and forming literally a carpet of bloom. (Hardy Annual.) **Pkt. 50c.** 

## MARIGOLD "Dixie Sunshine"

The tall, bushy plants of this charming novelty are literally smothered with large, ball-shaped, brilliant golden yellow, double flowers daintly fringed. **Pkt. 25c.**, ½ oz. \$1.25.

# PETUNIA PARVIFLORA

A creeping or trailing plant quite distinct from any of the hybrid Petunias, and especially valuable for the Rock Garden. It produces lilac pink blooms about one-fourth of an inch in diameter, the foliage forms a light green mat about 18 inches in diameter, and usually less than 3 inches high. Being a long lived Annual, this species is a splendid type to use in filling in vacancies after the Spring flowering bulbs have finished blooming. **Pkt. 25c.** 



# NEW MINIATURE PETUNIA Rose Gem

A charming addition to the miniature group of Petunias. The plant is neat and compact, 5 to 6 inches high and smothered with rich rose colored blooms about 2 inches in diameter. **Pkt. \$1.00.** 

## SCABIOSA "FISCHERI"

A fine border plant from Manchuria, hardy and truly perennial, growing about 20 inches high, with handsome divided leaves and blooming well into the Autumn. The flowers are about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches in diameter, borne on long, stiff stems, and are of a rich, deep violet blue shade unlike any other Scabiosa. **Pkt.** 50c.

## STATICE SINUATA "Lavender Queen"

Few plants have made greater advance in public esteem of late years than the Statice sinuata, but the range of colors is still rather limited and we feel that this new variety will be warmly welcomed. The flowers are of a beautiful clear bright lavender, quite distinct from any of the other colors. (Hardy Annual.) **Pkt. 50c.**



# NASTURTIUM DOUBLE DWARF "Golden Globe"

(Award of Merit)

Uniformly dwarf and compact, free flowering, and the well formed, double flowers of deep golden yellow are delicately sweet scented. **Pkt. 20c., oz. \$1.50.** 

# NASTURTIUM DOUBLE DWARF "Gem Mixture"

# PAPAVER NUDICAULE "Gartref" ICELAND POPPIES

# ANNUALS

These play a big part in the great color schemes of brilliant beds and borders in our Summer gardens. Both for garden effect and for cutting their beauty and usefulness is equally valuable, and by careful choice as to height, color and time of blooming, effective arrangements can be made for a continuous display away into the Fall.

HARDY ANNUALS. Sow in the open ground where they are intended to bloom. The seeds should be sown thinly and covered with fine soil to a greater or less depth, according to the size of the seed.

HALF-HARDY ANNUALS. The seeds should be sown in pans or frames in the early Spring, and transplanted outdoors in April or May, but previous to removal they should be hardened off by gradually exposing to the open air.
