### PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS

All nursery stock needs careful handling. It must not be unnecessarily exposed to sun or drying winds before being planted. Keep the roots covered at all times with damp burlap sacks or something similar. After being planted the stock will need food and water.

Cut off broken or bruised roots just above the place of injury. Shorten any roots that are overlong with a sharp knife or pruning shears. Dig the hole large enough to receive the plant without bending the roots. Throw good top soil on one side of hole and poor soil on opposite side. Then break up subsoil in bottom of hole and mix with it a little top soil and some well-rotted manure or a commercial plant food.

Set your plant, then fill the hole to within a few inches of the top, tramping the soil as it is thrown in. Leave a pocket or basin around the plant to catch water, and let the last two or three inches of covering be loose soil or mulch to conserve the moisture. Water frequently until plant is established.
