EXTRACTS FROM RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Admission and Discharge of Patients.

1. Admission.—Every contributor of £2 shall have the privilege of recommending two indoor or 12 outdoor patients within a year of date of such contribution; and of £5, five indoor or 30 outdoor patients within the year; of £10 annually, the privilege of having always one patient in the Hospital. A subscriber of £20 or over becomes entitled to Life Membership.

2. It is to be distinctly understood that these recommendations are only to be issued by the contributors to persons who cannot pay for medical treatment elsewhere. Hour of attendance of outpatients at the Out-patients' Department, Adelaide Hospital, 9 a.m.

3. Life contributors to have the same privileges in proportion; their donations being estimated as annual contributions of one-tenth.

4. It is optional for contributors to have indoor order-forms supplied in lieu of outdoor forms, at the rate of one of the former for six of the latter.

5. It is to be distinctly understood that these recommendations are only to be given to persons who, on account of their financial position, are proper subjects for Hospital treatment.

6. Applicants for admission to the Hospital shall, unless possessed of means sufficient to pay for medical advice, make a declaration, on a form printed for that purpose, to the effect that they are unable to pay for medical advice, and stating whether they are entitled to medical attendance from any benefit society or lodge.

7. Every member of the Board of Management and every legally qualified medical practitioner may likewise recommend patients for admission; severe accidents and cases of real emergency may be admitted at all times by the Resident Medical Officer on duty.

8. No female for the purpose of confinement shall be deemed fit for Hospital treatment; and no children under 10 years of age or infant shall be admitted on account of the condition of the mother alone, except with the advice of the Honorary Medical Officer. Infectious cases other than typhoid or tuberculosis are admitted to the Infectious Diseases Block, the Boards of Health representing the various municipalities being responsible for the isolation of such cases at a cost of 4s. 4d. per day per patient.

9. The proper hours for patients to present their recommendations for admission to the Hospital are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., except in cases of emergency or accident.

10. Any case which can be treated at the Out-patients' Department, or which is obviously incurable, cannot be admitted, except by special order of a visiting Medical Officer.

11. No patient shall be discharged from the Hospital without the consent of the visiting Medical Officer, except as provided for under the regulations or in cases of misconduct.

Admission on Payment of Fees for Maintenance.

1. Persons seeking admission, whose means will not enable them in any other way to procure such medical attendance as their cases may require, may be admitted into the institution upon payment of maintenance fees at the rate of from 3s. to 6s. per diem, and upon a patient or a responsible person making an agreement with the Secretary guaranteeing the payment during the time the patient remains in the institution.

2. Every person making a declaration or statement in writing when applying for admission to the Hospital that he is unable to pay for medical advice, and that he is not entitled to any benefit from any lodge, shall, nevertheless, be liable to pay to the Board the sum of ± 2 2s. for each week, and a proportionate sum for any part of a week, during which he receives medical attendance at or from the Hospital.

VISITORS.

1. Friends desirous of visiting patients, may, unless prohibited by the Resident Medical Officer, be admitted to the institution (by tickets only, to be procured in the wards) for that purpose on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sundays, between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m., and shall leave the wards punctually at the latter hour—a bell will be rung five minutes before the time for departure—but no more than two visitors to each patient are allowed on any one day, unless specially authorised. Exceptions to the above rule will only be allowed by special permission of the Resident Medical Officer or Medical Superintendent in favor of near relations, friends of patients in a dangerous state, or to Jews on their Sabbath. Visitors are strictly forbidden, on pain of expulsion from the wards, to introduce food, drink, or refreshment of any kind whatever without the sanction of the Resident Medical Officer in charge of the patient; and to ensure the perfect observance of this rule all parcels, etc., must be opened in the presence of the nurse on duty in the ward.

VISITING PATIENTS BY NIGHT.

In order to obviate certain difficulties to relatives of the patients in the Adelaide Hospital, who cannot for business reasons visit by day, the Hospital authorities have inaugurated a scheme which will, it is hoped, be satisfactory both to the public and the Hospital.

A special night visitor's card, signed by the Medical Superintendent, will be issued to eligible persons within 24 hours of the admission of a patient to the Hospital. This card, on presentation at the Hospital, will enable the person to visit his or her sick relative at the times stated thereon.

Special permission without cards will be given to relatives of patients who are dangerously ill.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

1. Patients are at liberty to receive the visits of ministers of the religious denominations to which they respectively belong.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1923.

The Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital, in accordance with section 12 (1) of the Amendment Act, 1921, has the honor to submit for the information of the Minister the 54th annual report on the condition and progress of the Institution for the year ended December 31st, 1923.

The Board held 60 formal meetings during the year, in addition to which frequent visits and inspections were made by its individual members.

RENOVATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

As the result of an arrangement with the Commissioners of Charitable Funds, money has been made available for the complete renovation of some of the wards of the Hospital. These very necessary improvements are well in hand, the work in some of the wards having been completed. Two electric lifts have been installed, floors have been planed and stopped, wooden skirting boards replaced by cement skirtings, and the walls and ceilings repaired and painted. In these wards, structural alterations have been carried out, providing large double doors in place of small windows. Balconies have been erected for four of the wards, by which means additional accommodation is provided, and the comfort of patients greatly enhanced, and open-air treatment made feasible. The completed wards have a bright and cheerful appearance.

New additional ward pantries, with modern fittings and sterilising facilities, are provided for, and the old ward pantries are being renovated and modernised as far as possible. New sanitary annexes are being provided, with the necessary modern fittings; lavatory basins, with hot and cold water, are also to be installed in each of the wards.

FURNISHINGS.

As the renovation of each ward is completed, the Board is installing modern metal and other suitable hospital

furnishings in place of the old unsuitable, and in some instances, insanitary, furnishings. In this regard the Board strongly urges upon the Minister the absolute necessity of a sum of money being made available to enable the Board to purchase its own furnishings, and carry out minor renovations. This is essential for the necessary standard of efficiency and cleanliness to be maintained. Under existing conditions, the provision of very many urgent requirements is dependent upon another department having the necessary funds for their purchase. The Board, having the care, control, and management of the institution, should be in a position to purchase its immediate and urgent requirements, and carry out minor improvements not involving structural alterations. No expenditure in this direction would be incurred without the Board satisfying itself of the necessity of the same. The Board contends that efficiency is economically maintained by immediate attention being given to all requirements. It is therefore strongly urged that the vote for minor furnishings, &c., be continued, and that the Board be empowered to incur expenditure from it.

Additions, &c.

A commencement has been made with the building of the new administrative block, to be designated "The Bice Building." This new building will contain accommodation for patients, as well as quarters for resident medical staff, offices, &c. Convenient lifts, covered ways, lavatory blocks, &c., have also been provided for.

The following are also in course of erection:---New kitchen and stores block, laundry and boiler house.

The cooking facilities in the existing kitchen were totally inadequate for properly coping with the cooking for such a large institution. To overcome this disability until the new kitchen is available, gas cooking ovens have been installed, and a greater variety of diet has been the result. These ovens can be transferred to the new kitchen when completed.

A temporary kitchen has been erected for use during the demolition of the existing one. This temporary structure is of such design as to allow of conversion to other uses when no longer required for its original purpose.

MATERNITY BRANCH.

An Obstetric Ward attached to the Adelaide Hospital is a desideratum, and the Board trusts that accommodation for this purpose will be available in the near future. This will provide much-needed accommodation and expert medical and nursing attention for expectant mothers in indigent circumstances who at present are unable to obtain admission to maternity institutions owing to limited accommodation. The reception of midwifery cases at the Adelaide Hospital will also be the means of extending the teaching facilities in midwifery for medical students and nurses.

MEDICAL RECORDS.

A new system of keeping medical records at the Hospital has been instituted. This work is now under the immediate supervision of the Medical and Surgical Registrar, a recently-created office. The re-organisation of the records has entailed considerable work, but a complete record system on the lines that are in vogue in other large hospitals elsewhere, cannot be achieved until a second registrar is appointed. The Board, therefore, trusts that provision will be made on the forthcoming estimates for the partsalary of a second registrar. The very important work of collating medical and surgical records in accordance with modern practice can only thus be maintained in order that the benefits of the institution shall be secured to medical science and to the public generally.

DIET AND CONTROL OF STORES.

The new system inaugurated for the issue and check of diet and other stores has resulted in a considerable saving, notwithstanding that the dietary scale has been much improved. The following table shows the quantities of the principal items of foodstuffs issued for two periods of six months each, viz., 1923 and 1924.

Patients and Staff.

LIGHTING.

Electric light has been installed throughout the institution.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS.

The Metropolitan Fire Brigade causes regular inspections of all fire appliances and hydrants at the institution. Monthly reports and recommendations are made, and the Board expresses its appreciation of the assistance and advice rendered by the Fire Brigade in this regard.

DENTAL HOSPITAL.

The new Dental Hospital was completed during the year, and opened to the public on July 10th, 1923. Details of operations in this branch are shown in the appendices hereto. It will be seen from these details that the public is taking ever increasing advantage of the new institution.

REGULATIONS.

The Board has completed the drawing up of new regulations for the management of the Hospital and all its branches. The new regulations are now in the hands of the Crown Law Officers for putting into legal form, and it is hoped that they will be made operative at the earliest possible date.

POLULATION.

The daily average number of indoor patients in the Hospital during the year was 394. The total number of patients admitted to the Hospital was 6,122, this being the highest number on record. The number of attendances of out-patients treated during the year was 18,683.

In the Consumptive Home the daily average resident was 67, and in the Infectious Diseases Block 32.

FINANCE.

Revenue.—The total receipts from all sources, and including all branches of the Hospital, for the year 1923 was £15,548–16s. 2d., as compared with £13,122–15s. 8d. for the year 1922, an increase of £2,426 0s. 6d. Details of the revenue for 1923 will be found in Appendix No. 2. There has been a satisfactory increase in the amount of patients' fees, for the Hospital and the Consumptive Home—the revenue for 1923 from these sources being £2,141–13s. 7d. in excess of the amount received for 1922, or an increase of 43 per cent. Further, the amount received for patients' fees Adelaide Hospital only, during 1923 exceeded the amount received in 1921 by £3,348– 13s. 2d., or an increase of 127 per cent.

The revenue of the Dental Branch shows the satisfactory increase of $\pounds 1,372$ 4s. 8d. as compared with the previous year. Approximately 50 per cent. of the amount of the total expenditure of the Dental Branch was recouped to revenue fees.

Laboratory fees were £300 less than the amount received during 1922, the total revenue being approximately 65 per cent. of the total expenditure for the year.

Expenditure.—The total expenditure for all branches of the Hospital for the year 1923 was £84,044 14s. 3d., as against £78,293 11s. 8d., an increase of £5,751 2s. 7d. for 1923 over the expenditure for 1922. Of this increase, salaries and wages account for £3,113 17s. 1d., while contingencies show an increase of £2,637 5s. 6d. The increase in contingencies is principally accounted for as follows:— Water and sewer rates, £1,098 increase; an account for a large amount not having been rendered before the close of previous year. Printing and stationery, $\pounds 423$ increase; portion outstanding from previous year; new records caused additional expenditure in printing. Gas, $\pounds 272$ increase. Additional gas ovens installed; increased price of gas.

OFFICIAL VISITORS.

The undermentioned were appointed by the Government as Official Visitors to the institution:—Lady Hackett Moulden, Mesdames M. Wallington and James Wilson, Messrs. F. B. H. Vincent and F. W. Young.

Appointments.

The following Honorary Officers were appointed during the year :---

Honorary Consulting Ophthalmologist.—Dr. M. J. Symons was appointed in appreciation of the many years of valuable service rendered by him as Honorary Ophthalmologist.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The work demanded of the X-ray Department continues to increase, as indicated by the number of films used, as follows:— 15 x 12, 2,335; 12 x 10, 896; 10 x 8, 3,331; $8\frac{1}{2} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$, 670; $6\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{3}{4}$, 82; dentals, 171; total 7,485.

The number of examinations carried out was as follows :---Opaque meals, 232; opaque enemata, 35; urinary tracts, 212; chests, 370; miscellaneous, 1,388.

During the year the X-ray Department underwent considerable reorganisation.

The department was enlarged by the addition of an adjacent room for clinic and demonstration purposes.

Also the obsolete equipment was replaced by modern apparatus consisting of a 10 K.W. oil-immersed interruptcrless high-tension transformer, tilt-table, Potter-Buchy diaphragm, with coronaless overhead wiring.

REPORT re ADELAIDE HOSPITAL, 1922-23.

REPAIRS AND ADDITIONS TO THE ADELAIDE HOSPITAL.

On November 17th, 1922, the Commissioners, at the suggestion of the Inspector-General of Hospitals, made a very complete inspection of the then state of the bulidings and other accommodation provided for the patients and medical staff at the Adelaide Hospital. They were impressed with the urgent necessity for making alterations and improvements in the main buildings, especially as to the sanitary, bathing, cooking, and lighting arrangements, and they immediately communicated with the Chief Secretary, and supplied him with a statement of works which in their opinion should be undertaken at once. The Chairman of Commissioners had an interview with the Minister on December 6th, 1922, and the following agreement was preparation of recommendations for the work to be done, and estimated cost thereof, not exceeding a total sum of £10,000, to be provided by the Government on the condition that the Commissioners agree to pay interest at 5 per cent. per annum for a period of 30 years on the sum expended, such interest to be charged against the income received by the Commissioners from property vested in them on account of the Adelaide Hospital.'

It was arranged that the $\pounds 10,000$ should not be considered to form portion of the $\pounds 30,000$ provided for under Act 1438 of 1920, the latter amount having been set apart for defraying part of the cost of erection of the proposed new Hospital buildings.

After several meetings between the Inspector-General of Hospitals, the Architect-in-Chief, and the Chairman of the Commissioners of Charitable Funds, and interviews with the Hon. the Chief Secretary, it was finally agreed that the Commissioners should pay interest at 5 per cent. on an additional $\pounds 1,000$, and that the expenditure would be allocated as follows:—

The foregoing arrangement, as agreed to by the Inspector-General of Hospitals, the Architect-in-Chief, and the Chairman of Commissioners of Charitable Funds, and approved by the Chief Secretary, was finally sanctioned by Cabinet on March 29th, 1923; but some of the works had been in course of construction for several months prior to that date.

Adelaide Hospital-Bequests and Donations.

The amount received by the Commissioners on account of legacies and donations during the year ended June 30th, 1923, was $\pounds 2,102$ 7s. 9d., the details of which are as follows :—

- William Shierlaw, late of Adelaide, who died on August 25th, 1920, bequeathed the sum of to the Hospital, subject to payment being made by his trustee in 10 years, or on death at an earlier date. REPORT ON DENTAL HOSPITAL.

Superintendent—Dr. A. CHAPMAN, D.D.S. House Dental Surgeon—Dr. THOS. D. CAMPBELL, D.D.S. Senior Dental Mechanic—Mr. C. E. JOYNER.


The outstanding event of the year has been the completion and occupation of the new building, facing Frome Road, and it is evident from all points of view that the year's activities naturally fall into two distinct periods, namely, before and after the occupation of the new building.

THE NEW BUILDING.

This Hospital was opened to the public on July 10th, 1923. It is a very handsome red brick building of two stories, with a tiled roof, and an effective loggia entrance facing Frome Road. The waiting halls have polished Queensland maple seats and fittings, and parquetted floors. On the ground floor are the administrative offices, the operating surgeries for both general and local anaesthetics, and rooms for the preparation and recovery of patients. On this floor, also, is the whole of the prosthetic section, comprising a demonstrators' room and storeroom, the impression and fitting room, and the prosthetic laboratory proper (38ft. by 34ft.), with adjacent rooms for plaster and metal casting. This room is equipped to accommodate 48 students at one time.


The first floor is devoted to conservative treatment, the surgery being 72ft. by 34ft., and most excellently lighted, making it possible, if necessary, to bring 48 chairs into operation. On this floor also are an X-ray room, library, lecture theatre, and rooms for students and nurses. In design and equipment the Hospital is reported to be the most up to date in the Commonwealth. Hot and cold water is available throughout, together with radiators and fans where required.

The new teachnical appliances installed include 12 dental chairs, six electric lathes, two electric dental engines, one compressed air generator and service, one X-ray machine, and the complete new equipment for the operating theatres. A considerable quantity of unserviceable and obsolete equipment has been disposed of.

STAFF.

Dating from the occupation of the new building, the following additional staff has been employed:—One female clerk and typiste, one dental nurse, one porter.

On April 17th, 1923, Mr. S. B. Harry was appointed to the permanent office of clerk, assessment officer, collector of revenue, and storekeeper to the department.

HONORARY OFFICERS.

Dr. H. T. J. Edwards was appointed Hon. Dental Surgeon as from March 19th, 1923.

Dr. E. J. Millhouse resigned in December.

Dr. G. Brown and Dr. G. R. West, Hon. Anaethetists to the Adelaide Hospital, extended their services to this department in September.

Since July there have been 29 attendances of hon. dental officers.

Since September there have been 30 attendances of hon. anaethetists.

STUDENTS.

Twenty-two full-time students, one part-time student, and one pre-dental student were admitted to attend the practice of the department during 1923, and the facilities offered by the present institution have proved highly satisfactory. It is, however, urgently necessary, owing to the great increase in treatments given and greater scope of treatments provided, together with the increased numbers of students engaged on clinical work, that provision be made for more adequate supervision of students. It has been recommended that this be met by either the appointment of additional hon. dental surgeons, or by requiring officers to give more time to the execution of this office than hitherto. It is also felt that the operative technique classes to second year students should be conducted by a demonappointed by the University. During 1923, strator students attended the clinics compulsorily during University vacations, but for 1924 the University has decided not to require such attendance as a compulsory part of curriculum. This change in the students' hospital clinical year must be noted, for it will naturally decrease the effective scope of treatment per student as compared with previous vears.

REPORT OF TREATMENT EXECUTED.

From January 1st to June 30th the work executed was fairly maintained over the previous year, but since the occupation of the new building, the work has been marked for its general increase in all directions, as indicated by appendices and statistics attached. The special features to be noted are as follows:—

- There has been a marked increase in the number of people applying for treatment (see Appendix 1.).
- 2. The actual treatment given has increased enormously as compared with 1922 (see Appendix 1.).
- 3. The rates payable and the revenue received have shown very marked improvement, the revenue being about nine times that received in 1922 (see Appendices 3 and 4).
- 4. The scope of treatment has been enlarged. This is due to the many facilities offered by the new building and new equipment, notably the X-ray plant, and the acquisition of an anaesthetic block.
- 5. Greater numbers of children of school age have been treated, but large numbers have been
 ^{*} deferred or not admitted owing to the staff not being sufficiently large to cope with them (sce Appendix 1.).
- 6. General inability of the Department to provide treatment for all those applying (see Appendix 2.).

Although the general assessed rate for the year is two-thirds of the whole value, the actual average rate per patient in January and February was two-fifths, and from March to December threequarters, which shows a marked improvement in rates obtained. This improvement is traceable to appointment of a permanent assessment officer and a consequently more discriminate and searching financial inquiry, and also to the extension of treatment to a greater number of persons of moderate means, whereas previously the greater number of applicants were of the unemployed or indigent poor.

THE CONSUMPTIVES' HOME.

Within the home are rooms set apart for library (with hundreds of books, periodicals, and magazines), smoking, billiards (full sized table), billatelle, and other games. A piano and organ are also provided, in fact everything is done to give the patients all the comforts of a good home, together with the best medical and nursing skill procurable. There are 23 cubicles, three rooms for two patients each, one ward for eight patients, one ward for nine patients, one large bungalow for 12 patients, and four tents for one patient each—giving accommodation for 62 patients.

The buildings have verandahs on both sides, are thoroughly ventilated, the walls and ceilings are varnished and the floors covered with linoleum.

Provision is also made for the treatment of cancer cases, there being 14 single bedrooms devoted to this purpose.

The majority of cases pass through the Consultation room, or are transferred from the wards of the General Hospital.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES BLOCK.

The number of new cases admitted to the block (522) shows a substantial falling off from the previous year. The deaths totalled 16, a mortality rate of 3.06 per cent.

The decrease was mainly shown in the diphtheria cases: 109 in 1923, 276 were admitted in 1922; there were 6 deaths, or a case mortality of 5.5 per cent.

There was a slight decrease in the number of scarlatina cases; 189 in 1923, 195 in 1922.

The Clinical Pathological Examinations performed for Hospital include:—(1) The histological Adelaide thediagnosis of pathological tissues, several of which were immediate examinations performed during operations (such examinations are done in order to help the surgeon in determining the extent and nature of the operation necessary); (2) the examination of urine to detect abnormal chemical and morphological elements; (3) the examination of faeces to detect the presence of abnormal elements; (4) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect cellular and chemical change (this examination is extremely useful in detecting syphilis of the central nervous system); (5) the examination of the blood to detect the presence of the various anaemias and leukaemias; (6) the examination of material for the detection of *spirochaeta pallida* in the diagnosis of syphilis; (7) the examination of fluids from various cavities and cysts to determine their nature; (8) the examination of blood for the estimation of glucose, urea, proteins, &c.; (9) the examination of gastric contents after a test meal-129 of these tests were made, 45 of them being fractional test meals.

The Bacteriological Examinations performed for the Adelaide Hospital include:—(1) The examination of sputum for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria, and also for hydatid hooklets; (2) the examination

of blood for the Widal reaction (this examination is important is assisting in the diagnosis of typhoid fever); (3) the examination of swabs taken from the throat and nose to detect the presence of diphtheria bacilli; (4) the examination of urine to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, colon bacilli, and other bacteria; (5) the examination of inflammatory fluids for the detection of bacteria, e.g., pleuritic fluid for tubercle bacilli; (6) the examination of cerebro-spinal fluid to detect the presence of tubercle bacilli, meningococci, and other bacteria; (7) the cultural examination of blood to detect the presence of bacteria in the circulation; (8) the examination of faeces and urine for the detection of typhoid bacilli and other pathogenic bacteria; (9) the examination of pus for the detection of and other bacteria. actinomyces, gonococci. Bacteria isolated from the various fluids and materials are often used in the preparation of autogenous vaccines.

The Wassermann Reaction was performed on Thursday in each week. This reaction is of great value in the diagnosis and treatment of syphilis. The Griffith and Scott technique is employed throughout.

The examinations performed and classified under the head Private Work include in the main such examinations as described under clinical pathological examinations and bacteriological examinations. Much work was done for the Board of Health. Included in the examinations are also: -(1) Examination of various foodstuffs for the detection of bacterial contamination; (2) examination of drinking water to determine its suitability for drinking purposes. Included under this head is a special investigation carried out for the Adelaide Local Board of Health. The object of this investigation is to determine at regular intervals the bacterial content of the water as delivered from the Adelaide waterworks main. This investigation is being continued. (3) The examination of disinfectants to determine their germicidal power ; (4) the examination of 244 rats in the search for any possible plague (B. pestis) infection.

The routine examinations for the Stock Department include:—(1) Bacteriological examination of cow's milk for the detection of tubercle bacilli and other bacteria; (2) examination of faeces for the detection of helminth infection: (3) physiological examination of water suspected of containing some poison; (4) morbid tissues for histopathological examination; (5) material for the detection of anthrax bacilli, actinomyces, and *B. abortas;* (6) specimens removed *post-mortem* from animals dying from various causes, &c. Investigations were carried out in connection with mortality in pregnant ewes with some experiments in the toxicology of Stinkwort (*Mula graveolens*). Investigations were also carried out in connection with contagious abortion and sterility in bovines. An outbreak of coccidiosis in lambs was investigated, and investigations into other sheep diseases were continued.

The Vaccine Department, as well as preparing 258 separate vaccines, also administered inoculations of vaccine to hospital patients. During the year 134 hospital patients were under treatment. The majority of these patients visited the laboratory twice a week during their course of treatment, when they received their injections. In all 1,557 doses of vaccine were administered. Also 312 doses of tuberculin were given to 14 patients. Vaccines were prepared for 178 patients under the care of private practitioners, and 2,209 doses (including 49 doses of tuberculin, 17 doses influenza, and 299 doses T.A.B.) were supplied for these patients.

The *Bio-chemical* examinations increased in numbers from 207 made in 1922 to 821. This increase is largely due to the necessity for blood sugar estimations in connection with the treatment of diabetes with insulin.

Summary.—The figures show approximately the same number of examinations made as during 1922. Approximately 2,000 fewer examinations of throat swabs were made than during the previous year. In spite of this, the total number of examinations remains about the same, showing that, with this exception, there has been a general allround increase in the number of examinations made.

VENEREAL DISEASES .- NIGHT CLINICS.

Seventh Annual Report for Year ending September 30th, 1923.

Improved accommodation for the treatment of Venereal Diseases is urgently necessary.

The Venereal Diseases Act passed by Parliament in 1920 has not yet been proclaimed. The provisions of the Act could not be effectively carried out until accommodation for the treatment of both indoor and outdoor patients is provided.

It is considered that this Act should be proclaimed as soon as possible, but failing such action in the near future, improved accommodation and facilities for treating patients are necessary at the existing Clinic.

Report of Operations for the Year ending September 30th, 1923.

MALE SECTION.

Surgeon-Dr. G. H. BURNELL, B.S., M.D.

One hundred and twenty-one cases of syphilis and 324 cases of gonorrhoea were treated. Included in the above were 22 persons who had both syphilis and gonorrhoea. Eight persons attended on account of diseases which were shown to be other than venereal.

The total attendances were 4,917, an increase of 315 over the previous year.

FEMALE SECTION.

Surgeon-Dr. H. RISCHBIETH, M.D., F.R.C.S.

The total number of patients for the year was 77, and the number of attendances was 835. There were 50 cases of syphilis, 21 of gonorrhoea, and 10 patients came for conditions which on examination proved to be neither syphilis nor gonorrhoea—they were not cases of venereal disease. Of the 50 cases of syphilis, four were victims of gonorrhoeal infection as well, and of the 21 cases of gonorrhoea four were infected with syphilis as well. Attached are details of attendances and statement of expenditure.
