81 A silver Spoon. All readers of American History will remember the episode of the taking away of Hannah Dustin and her infint from Haverhill, Mass., at the date of the early N. E. War's. Her baby was taken from her arms and its brains dashed out on a stone; she was taken up the Merrimac, near the island Contoocook. Assisted by a boy, a fellow captive, she arose at night and killed all the Indians. Then feeling that her narrative would scarcely be credited, she went back, and secured their bloody scalps; escaping down the river, she came to Buston. Her heroism was deemed worthy of some recognition, and Mrs. Dustin received from the General Court of Mass. then in session, a silver Tankard, and from private citizens over the whole country various acknowledgments of her valor. The Tankard is now in Essex Institute, Salem, Mass. The mementoes are widely sattered, and their present whereabouts is scarcely known : but this Spoon was preserved in the family until the time when I received it from one of her descendants. It is certainly a most remarkable memento of early New England ; it is of good, though awkward shape. It is marked in black letter on the face H. D. The shank is stamperd on the back side with the English mark of the workman who made it. I have had this Spoon for nearly fifty years.
82 A Verge Watch, with heavy gold case. For this watch Crosby, Hunnewell and Morse offered me $\$ 50$. during the war. 'The watch, nearly 100 years ago was given to Stanislaus Vanier of Boston, as a freedom gift from his father ; case engine turned and engraved.

My friend Strobridge, whom all numismatists will recollect, obtained it, and afterwards sold it to me. It is a beautiful ring, set with emeralds and diamonds, one of the latter of which was lost years ago.

The top is of marble, $1 \frac{3}{4}$ inches thick; the whole surrounded by a circle of pieces having five sides each : within this outer circle, a circle of pieces of Rosa Anticho, each piece $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch in width: within this another circle of pieces, each $\frac{5}{8}$ of an inch in width, of semi-precious stones, comprising agates, carnelians, and various spars, interspersed with similar stones but in greater variety. Within the outer circle the table top is made up of semi-precious stones, including a magnificent specimen of orbicular granite, and many others equally fine and rare. The centre of the table has a crescent of lapis lazuli: the top presents many rare varieties, including agates, malachite, spars, lapis lazuli, etc. The table when purchased at Rome cost $\$ 3000$, at which expense it was imported into Boston.

871 Another Table, octagonal in shape. This was purchased by Mr. Deacon from a portion of the furniture belonging to the late Queen Marie Antoinette. The base is supported by caryatides, gilded in solid gold. This table gave rise to the strange stories of solid gold furniture brought from the palaces of France by the Swan family, formerly of Roxbury, Mass., of which many "travellers' tales" have been related during the last century. It is known that the Swan family possessed at one time furniture of fabulous richness, plate, jewelry and paintings, which, many year's after, were sold in an auction room in Boston. This table was attributed by the owners of the Swan mansion to the Royal family of France, and somehow got mixed up with the same family by whom its ownership was attributed to a much earlier period, namely that of the first French Revolution.
872 Brack Walnut Table. Base, carved by Litchfield of Boston, represents the head and shoulders of griffins. Antique and classical. This is the bottom for the marble top referred to in No. 870.
873 Badge showing the crucifixion of St. Andrew. The surface of gold in blue enamel. On its face it bears two griffins and a crucifix ; the griffins are doubleheaded, with crowns in gilt and enamel.
