

### INTERMEDIATE COURSE.

#### FIRST GRADE.

Reading—Third Reader completed, and Supplementary Reading.

Spelling—Written. Speller supplemented by lists from

text books. Special attention to dictation exercises. Arithmetic—Intermediate Arithmetic through Fractions.

Geography—Elementary Geography.
Language Lessons—Whitney and Knox's Elementary Lessons in English. Part I begun.

Writing-Copy book No. 3, Common School course.

Drawing.

Singing—Daily lessons in Singing.

#### SECOND GRADE.

Reading—Fourth Reader begun. Spelling—Written, with frequent dictation exercises. Arithmetic—Intermediate Arithmetic completed. Geography—Advanced book, begun by January 1.

Language Lessons-Whitney and Knox's, Part I, completed.

Writing—Copy-book No. 4, Common School course. Drawing-Daily lessons at least half the year. Singing—Daily exercises.

## GRAMMAR GRADES.

#### THIRD GRADE.

Reading—Fourth Reader continued. Spelling—Written exercises.

Arithmetic—Practical Arithmetic through Fractions.

Geography—Advanced book continued.

Writing—Copy-book No. 5, Common School course.

Drawing-May alternate with writing at option of teacher.

Singing—Daily exercises.

#### FOURTH GRADE.

Reading—Fifth Reader. Spelling—Written exercises.

Arithmetic—Practical Arithmetic through Partial Payments; Mental Arithmetic, daily exercises.

Geography—Advanced book completed.

Language—"Graded Lessons" completed by middle of year. Grammar begun.

Writing—Copy-book No. 7.

Drawing—Optional with teachers.

Singing—Daily exercises.

#### FIFTH GRADE.

Reading—Appleton's Fifth Reader, Cathcart's Literary Reader, or Sixth Reader of some series.

Spelling—Written exercises.

Arithmetic-Practical Arithmetic completed and reviewed.

Language—Grammar and composition.

U. S. History-Barnes's Brief, or Higginson's Young Folks' History.

Temperance—Colman's "Alcohol and Hygiene." Drawing—Optional with teachers.

Singing—Daily exercises.

# ELEMENTARY NORMAL COURSE.

#### FIRST YEAR.

Mathematics—Elementary Algebra.

Language—Grammar and Composition.

Natural Science—Commercial Geography, one term. Physical Geography, two terms.

Morals and Manners—Gow's "Good Morals and Gentle Manners."

Latin—Optional with teachers.

Drawing.

Vocal Music.

#### SECOND YEAR.

Mathematics—Higher Arithematic. Book-keeping. Natural Science—Physiology. Botany, one term. Literature—"Seven British Classics," or equivalent. Didactics—School Economy and Primary Methods. Latin—Optional. Drawing.

Vocal Music.

### HIGHER NORMAL COURSE.

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

Mathematics—Plane Geometry, whole year.

Natural Science-Physics, whole year.

History—General History, two terms. Scripture History (New Testament), one term. English Literature, one term. Drawing.

Practice Teaching-Under criticism.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

Natural Science—Geology, two terms. Astronomy, one term.

Mental and Moral Science.

History—United States History and Civil Government. Pedagogics—Science of Education. Practice Teaching. Reviews—Of common branches.

It is believed that the "Elementary Normal Course" will abundantly meet the necessities of the large part of those desiring to teach. For those proposing to follow teaching as a "profession" both courses should be taken.

To those completing either of the above courses there will be given a diploma, designed for each department, signed

by the President.

## COLLEGE PREPARATORY COURSE.

For admission to this course pupils must pass a satisfactory examination of the studies of the Grammar course.

#### FIRST YEAR.

English Composition: Latin—New Method, Allen; Mathematics—Elementary Algebra; Physical Geography—Anderson; Good Morals and Gentle Manners—Gow; Reading, Writing and Spelling.

#### SECOND YEAR.

Latin Composition and Grammar (Allen and Greenough) Casar, and Virgil begun: Greek Grammar (Goodwin), and First Lessons (White); Mathematics—Higher Arithmetic; Physics—Elementary, Steele.

#### THIRD YEAR.

Latin, Virgil, through six books of the Æneid; Cicero, six orations; Latin Composition and Grammar (Allen and Greenough); Greek—Xenophon's Anabasis, three books (Goodwin); Mathematics—Geometry, three books (Davies'); Science—Physical Geography.

# GENERAL INFORMATION.

Tillotson Collegiate and Normal Institute was founded by the American Missionary Association, and is conducted under its auspices. It was opened on the seventeenth of January, 1881, the Association having partially sustained, for some years in Austin, a school taught by Mrs. Garland. The Association is much indebted to the liberality of Rev. Geo. J. Tillotson, of Wethersfield, Connecticut, for whom it is named, for the money for the purchase of the lot, and to his industry in collecting a portion of the funds for the erection of Allen Hall. This is a brick building, five stories high, containing rooms for at least seventy-five students, besides parlors, young ladies' sitting room, library, a beautiful and airy school room, large recitation rooms, dining hall, kitchen, etc.

#### BOARDING DEPARTMENT.

We wish to call special attention to the facilities for accommodating boarding students. The well lighted and well ventilated rooms are furnished with all that is necessary for the comfort and happiness of the boarders.

The regulations in this department of the school are intended to promote good scholarship and Christian character.

The school is made a home for those who attend. Not only their interlectual, but also their social, moral and religious culture will receive careful attention.

Students who enter this department are specially requested to be present at the opening of the term.

Young ladies are requested to provide themselves with suitable clothing for school wear, such as dark dresses and colored skirts.

All the clothing of both the young ladies and gentlemen should be clean, in order, and plainly marked with the student's name.

Each student is allowed washing to the amount of ten pieces per week. Young ladies will not be allowed to have

more than one dress or apron washed each week. Towels are included in the ten pieces; sheets and pillow cases are not included. Extra charge will be made for all over this number.

Young ladies will receive instruction daily in sewing and fancy work, and each young lady will be expected to keep her clothing neatly mended.

The wardrobes and rooms of all students are subject to

inspection and regulation by the proper officers.

All that is needed for the rooms and table will be furnished at the beginning of the term, but students are expected to replace all articles destroyed or broken by them.

Meals for the boarders are provided at the regular hours. Only in cases of rare necessity will they be furnished at other times, and then only with the permission of the Matron.

General rooms for the students will be warmed free of charge. The cost of fuel will be charged for warming private rooms

Parents of young pupils are advised to place spending money in the hands of one of the teachers, as it is found to be very much more judiciously spent than when given to the pupils.

Social intercourse between young men and young women is provided for to a limited extent under wholesome regula-

tions and careful supervision.

Students are not allowed to leave the school grounds without permission. Students are also expected to consult the faculty before selecting private boarding houses.

#### RHETORICAL SOCIETY.

There is in successful operation "The Tillotson Rhetorical Society," the special aim of which is to train young men for public speaking. The meetings are held Friday evening of each week and are under the immediate direction of the President of the college.

Prominent among other societies is the "Tillotson Band of Hope," a temperance society, which has, since its organization, done much good, and has a very bright outlook for the future. The meetings are held the third Sabbath even-

ing of each month, and are full of interest.

#### MUSIC.

Facilities for instruction in both vocal and instrumental music are ample.

#### THE LIBRARY.

A foundation for a good Library has been laid, and an earnest appeal is made to all interested in this department of our work, to furnish means, money or books, to complete what is greatly needed by the students.

#### DISCIPLINE.

Courtesy and mutual forbearance are expected of both pupils and teachers as indispensable to good discipline.

Students are subject to prompt suspension or discharge for an unsatisfactory course in respect to either study or conduct. Low or profane language will subject a student to discipline.

#### PUBLIC WORSHIP.

Prayers are attended in the Chapel every morning and evening, with reading of the Scriptures and singing, and all the students are expected to be present.

Public worship is held in the Chapel on Sunday, which all the students are required to attend, except such as have special permission to attend elsewhere. Such permission can be obtained only from the President.

#### WANTS.

"Tillotson," from the first, has been pressed for room. Every available means has been used to provide for the increasing attendance, for which the accommodations are now entirely inadequate. Its first and imperative "want" is a new dormitory.

The school being without endowments, is dependent upon the American Missionary Association for all support not derived from other sources. Our needs are those of young colleges—endowments, scholarships, reference books, maps, apparatus, etc. It is hoped that the time is not far distant when funds will flow into the treasury of the institution as freely as they do into colleges in other parts of the country.
