Devotion to the Holy Ghost

HE Holy Ghost is the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity, the Person of Divine Love. He is called a spirit because He proceeds from the Father and the Son. The Father and the Son love one another with an infinite love and this love is a Person, the Person of the Holy Ghost, who is the bond of union, the source of happiness of the Father and the Son. From eternity to eternity, the Father loves the Son, and the Son loves the Father. They rejoice in this Divine Love, in the Person of the Holy Spirit.

As the sun gives light and warmth to all the inhabitants of the earth, so the Holy Spirit gives grace and light to all men, but especially to the Holy Catholic Church and to the hearts of the just.

Magnificent Works of the Holy Ghost

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THE wonderful sway of the Holy Ghost, both in the visible and in the invisible world, has ever filled the children of God with profoundest devotion and tenderest love toward the Third Person of the Most Blessed Trinity. The magnificent works of the Holy Ghost in the kingdom of nature and of grace are so sublime and marvelous that the devout heart is penetrated with love and gratitude in contemplating them, and the understanding, illuminated by heavenly light, praises and adores God in His great works. The principal of these magnificent works are as follows:—

1. The Beauty, Order and Harmony of Nature

In the history of creation we are told that the Spirit of God hovered above the waters, and that God looked with pleasure upon His work of creation. This work was good because it was accomplished in the love and in the power of the Holy Spirit, and because the Holy Spirit poured

Himself forth upon the whole creation. There is nothing which more eloquently proclaims the existence of an all-wise and all-powerful Creator than the marvelous beauty and harmony which is shown forth in the whole realm of nature, from the tiniest insect to the gigantic system of stars and planets which form the universe. And all this marvelous beauty and order is the work of the Triune God, through the special operation of the Holy Ghost.

2. The Blessed Virgin Mary

The Holy Spirit prepared and adorned Mary as the temple of the Deity, the Immaculate Mother of the Eternal Word, the most beautiful miracle of grace and sanctity, His own elect Spouse and the Queen of Heaven. In the beatitude of eternal life the Holy Ghost reposes with unspeakable rapture in Mary, His spotless Bride.

3. The Incarnation

When the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity descended to earth, and assumed flesh in the bosom of the Blessed Virgin Mary, it was the Holy Spirit who accomplished this wondrous miracle. In this mystery the Holy Ghost, as Creator and Divine Artist, surpassed Himself, so to say, by fashioning the most beautiful masterpiece in the whole creation in order to render possible our Redemption and to bring about its realization.

The Mother of our Redeemer was prepared by the Holy Spirit to be the worthy Mother of God. The immensity of His power overshadowed her, and the vehemence of His love wrought in her the mystery of the incarnation. The Sacred Humanity of our Savior was endowed with all the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and the Son of God was ever guided by the Holy Spirit in all His activities.

4. The Church of Jesus Christ

The Holy Spirit formed and modeled the Church of Christ with Divine power and heavenly fire, hovering over the Blood and Water which welled up and flowed from the opened Heart of Jesus on the Cross, and He continues to safeguard and dispense through the Church the infinite merits of our Savior till the end of time. It is the Holy Spirit who teaches, governs and sanctifies the Church, and it is in virtue of the Holy Ghost that the Church teaches, guides and rules the faithful. In an invisible manner the Holy Spirit directs the "Teaching Church," and preserves her doctrine in its primitive purity, by zealously guarding the infallibility of her Supreme Pontiff, as Christ promised His Apostles: "But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My Name, He will teach you all things and bring to your mind whatever I have said to you" (John xiv. 26).

5. The Salvation and Sanctification of Souls

Jesus Christ is the Author of our sanctification in so far as He has merited and prepared this grace for us. But the Holy Ghost, in virtue of the merits of our Savior, truly sanctifies us and makes us pure and pleasing in the sight of God. "You have been washed, you have been sanctified, you have been justified in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, and in the Spirit of our God" (1 Cor. vi. 11).

The Holy Spirit cleanses and enriches souls through the Precious Blood and the infinite merits of Jesus Christ, making them children of God and co-heirs with Christ, and transforming them into temples for His own habitation. By means of sanctifying grace the Holy Ghost takes possession of the soul and fills it with His love and grace, so that the soul, which was created according to the image of God, may be adorned with all virtue and sanctity and thus become a worthy dwelling of the Most Holy Trinity.

The Holy Ghost gives supernatural life in baptism; He strengthens us and increases His seven gifts in confirmation; He operates in our souls through Holy Communion and imparts comfort and strength in the other sacraments. To the Holy Ghost we owe all comfort, all light, all strength, all graces that we receive.

6. The Glorification of the Elect in Heaven

The sixth and most compassionate of the magnificent works of the Holy Ghost is the admission of all the children of God into the kingdom of heaven, where the Father and the Son love each other in the infinite beatitude of the Holy Spirit, and where all the elect of God love each other in this sacred, burning, infinitely blissful love of the Holy Ghost. How inconceivable is the rapture of those who dwell in the kingdom of the Holy Ghost. They will enjoy His bliss throughout eternity!



Operations of the Holy Ghost in the Soul

ALL spiritual good that we possess comes from the Holy Spirit, for He is the love of the Father and of the Son, and therefore He is the inexhaustible fountain of supernatural benefits and graces. Without the grace of the Holy Spirit we cannot do the least thing toward our sanctification. We cannot start, nor continue, nor complete any good work. "And no

one can say, 'Jesus is Lord,' except in the Holy Spirit' (1 Cor. xii. 3). Therefore the Church prays: "Come, O Holy Spirit! Come, Father of the poor! Come, Giver of gifts! Come, Light of our hearts! Without Thy Divine help there is no good in man."

Theologians often compare the manner in which the Holy Ghost operates in the soul of the just man with the action of fire on iron. When pieces of iron are put into the fire, the iron gradually grows redhot and becomes bright and glowing like the fire. The fire communicates to the iron its color and its heat; it penetrates the iron and causes it to undergo a change by removing the rust and making it so one with itself that it appears to be a part of the fire. So does the Holy Ghost act in the soul if it allows His grace to operate in it. The Holy Ghost penetrates the soul, imparts to it His sanctifying grace, or the flame of His Divine love, which purifies the soul, consumes the rust of sin, and inflames it with heavenly fire until the soul becomes beautiful, brilliant, supernatural and spiritual like unto God.

What is this action of the Holy Ghost

in the soul of man, and what graces does He impart to us? The Holy Ghost illuminates the understanding, sanctifies the affections, strengthens the will, consoles the heart and purifies the body.

The Holy Ghost *illuminates* the understanding. If the Holy Spirit does not send a beam of Divine light into our heart, the word of the preacher avails little.

The Holy Ghost sanctifies our affections. "Through the Holy Ghost," says St. Chrysostom, "we obtain the forgiveness of our sins; through Him we are purified from all stains of venial sins; through His gifts, those who surrender themselves to His Divine grace become angels; not that they change their nature, but what is still more wonderful, they remain men, walking before God as pure and holy as angels. Through the grace of the Holy Ghost, man, who before was steeped in the mire of sin, now shines more brilliantly and purely than the sun."

The Holy Ghost strengthens the will, according to the words of our Savior: "You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you shall be witnesses for Me" (Acts i. 8). Without

the grace of the Holy Ghost, man is delivered to the enemies of his salvation. By the strength of the Holy Spirit he can overcome all the snares of the evil one. St. Bernard says: "Through the gifts of the Holy Spirit, man is fortified against every temptation and persecution; he becomes unconquerable and fearless." How timid and cowardly the Apostles were before they received strength from above! St. Peter, at the word of a maidservant, denied Our Lord... But after the coming of the Holy Ghost, the Apostles knew no fear or hesitation. With intrepid courage they hastened through the countries of the earth and despised all persecutions and tortures, considering it their gain to die for Christ. In their footsteps followed the martyrs, who in the strength of the Holy Spirit displayed heroic courage. Even timid virgins, upheld by His power and love, endured untold torments without flinching.

The Holy Ghost consoles us in all our trials, difficulties and sufferings during the pilgrimage of this earthly life. Therefore Our Lord called the Holy Ghost the "Consoler." Holy Church prays: "Come, Holy Ghost, Consoler, sweetest gift." He gives

us the "peace of God which surpasses all understanding" (Phil. iv. 7), and fills the human heart with such heavenly balsam that the Apostle cried out: The Holy Ghost "comforts us in all our afflictions". "I am filled with comfort, I overflow with joy in all our troubles" (2 Cor. i. 4; vii. 4).

The Holy Ghost *purifies* our body. Remember, we are the "temples" of the Holy Spirit. (See page 30).

"O my children," exclaimed the saintly Cure of Ars, "how beautiful it is! The Father is our Creator, the Son is our Redeemer, and the Holy Ghost is our Guide. Man of himself is nothing, but with the Holy Spirit he is very great. The Holy Spirit elevates his mind and raises it on high. Why were the saints so detached from earth? Because they let themselves be led by the Holy Spirit. Those who are led by the Holy Spirit have true ideas; that is the reason why so many ignorant people are wiser than the learned. When we are led by the Holy Spirit we cannot go astray. He is our strength and our light. He teaches us to distinguish between truth and falsehood, between good and evil."

He who possesses the Holy Spirit has the Highest Good; he has Divine grace itself. He has God and the angels for his friends; he has the pledge of eternal salvation. He has the forgiveness of all his sins and all the good he can desire. The Holy Ghost instructs him in holiness, enkindles his heart with Divine love, adorns him with virtues, purifies him from the stains of sin, cares for him like a devoted father, loves him like a tender mother. The Holy Ghost is his truest friend; He heals his wounds; He is his unerring guide on the way to salvation.

He who possesses the Holy Ghost is richer than all the wealthy of this world, more powerful than all earthly rulers, happier than all lords, more cheerful than those steeped in worldly pleasures. He is blessed in body and in soul; blessed in his words and in his deeds. The angels serve him with delight; the saints gaze upon him with joy, and God dwells with complacency in his heart. The sweetness such a man experiences in his heart cannot be expressed in words. Those who have tasted this interior joy testify that no pleasure of the world can be compared

with it, and that in a quarter of an hour the soul is filled with more heavenly bliss than worldlings experience their life long from earthly pleasures of body and from the satisfactions of pride.

The Soul Deprived of the Holy Spirit

We have absolute necessity of the Holy Ghost. Just as the soul is indispensable to the life of the body, so the Holy Spirit is indispensable to the life of the soul. As the body cannot use its five senses without the soul, so the soul cannot use its spiritual faculties without the Holy Ghost; that is, it cannot see, hear, speak, taste or work without the Holy Spirit.

It cannot see sin in its true malice; it cannot perceive the occasions and dangers of sin, the dreadful punishment of hell, the wickedness of the world, the charm of virtue, the value of good works, the greatness of the Sacrifice of the Mass, the immense treasure of Holy Communion, and the beauty and glory of heaven.

It cannot hear without the Holy Spirit; it does not want to hear the Word of God. Such a soul avoids religious instructions, and if it does hear them, they do not pene-

trate the inmost heart, or make a salutary impression, or incline to a change of life.

Without the Holy Spirit, the soul cannot speak. A person devoid of the Holy Ghost has no love or inclination for prayer, has no comfort in confession, no determination to follow Jesus.

There is no *spiritual taste* in the soul deprived of the Holy Ghost. Such a person has no relish for the things of God, no devotion, no attraction for a holy life.

Without the Holy Ghost man cannot perform works conducive to his salvation. He cannot give up bad habits, nor lead a holy life. Whatever good such a person may do will not merit eternal life. He will not receive a reward in heaven for his prayers, his fasting, or other good works.



The Gifts of the Holy Ghost

THE seven gifts of the Holy Spirit are given in baptism, together with the three theological virtues, faith, hope and charity. These gifts are the dowry, the bridal gift with which the Heavenly Father enriches and honors His adopted children at the moment of their regeneration, when the soul is sanctified and espoused with God through Divine love.

These gifts are placed in the soul as a germ; they are, as it were, in their infancy, and the Christian must develop them through fervent prayer, through the worthy reception of Holy Communion and devout assistance at Holy Mass, in order that they may produce fruit.

These precious gifts of the Holy Ghost are given to us as a protection, a safeguard of the theological virtues. The gifts of the Holy Ghost are seven: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord.

1. Wisdom is the highest and most privileged gift of the Holy Ghost. It is like an overflowing of the Uncreated Wisdom. St. Bernard calls it the "supernatural gift of the Holy Spirit which enables us to know God and to rejoice in perfect love." Wisdom not only illuminates our mind, but it inflames our heart with love for God, gives us a relish for Divine things, and an ardent desire for heavenly treasures, especially a longing to possess God and to see Him face to face. Wisdom makes us love the things of eternity, detaches our heart from the riches of this world and removes us from everything opposed to our last end. In its light we see more and more clearly the nothingness of things created.

2. Understanding is that gift of the Holy Spirit which enables us to comprehend the mysteries and doctrines of our holy religion. If God designs to lead a soul to holiness, He gives it an interior light and a deep insight into the Divine mysteries, whereby it is animated to serve God more perfectly. This light is the gift of understanding, through which simple persons often have such a deep knowledge of great mysteries — for instance, of the Most Holy Trinity and the Incarnation — that it surpasses the natural understanding

of men more learned than devout.

- 3. Counsel is a gift of the Holy Spirit which moves us to choose what is most conducive to the glory of God and to our salvation. Through this gift we learn how we can best please God. By following the inspirations of the Holy Spirit we receive true interior peace and spiritual consolation. This gift is especially necessary for superiors, whose duty it is to guide others, for here natural prudence does not suffice.
- 4. Fortitude. This gift of the Holy Spirit banishes all timidity and human respect, strengthens us to hate sin and steadfastly to practice virtue, preferring contempt, temporal loss, persecution and even death, to denying Christ by word or deed. By this gift we are strengthened to fight and overcome the enemies of our salvation, and enabled, in the midst of temptations, difficulties, and persecutions, to fulfil the will of God. Fortitude makes us ready and courageous to bring the greatest sacrifices for our salvation.
- 5. Knowledge. By the gift of knowledge, the Holy Ghost enlightens us with an inner light, that we may know ourselves, and the snares of self-love, of our passions,

of the devil, and of the world, and may choose the fittest means to overcome them. By this gift the Holy Ghost illuminates us more and more as He lets His Divine light stream into our hearts, and enlightens us with regard to revealed truth and the duties we have to fulfil. The known truth appears to us in a clearer light than it could be perceived by our own intelligence. This is the knowledge of the saints that surpasses all worldly knowledge, "coming down from the Father of lights" (James i. 17). Even created nature is then an open book wherein we read God and His perfections.

6. Piety. By the gift of piety or godliness, the Holy Ghost infuses into us a reverence for God and Divine things, and gives us joy in conversing with Him. Piety inclines us to love God as the best of fathers, to love His dearly beloved Son and the holy Mother of Jesus most tenderly. Piety moves us to love not only the saints and the angels, but also our fellowmen, as the children and images of God. It causes us to feel sweetest pleasure in conversing with God, in listening to spiritual reading, and in hearing the Divine word. It makes us delight to do the will of the Father, and to have at heart all that tends to the honor and glory of God. If we are animated by such sentiments we are truly devout, and we possess the gift of piety.

7. Fear of the Lord. The gift of the fear of God is that childlike fear which dreads no misfortune except that of displeasing God, and which, accordingly, flees from sin as the greatest evil. There are two kinds of fear, the fear of a servant and the fear of a child. Childlike fear of God is the more noble and beautiful of the two, as it urges the soul to avoid the least sin in order not to displease God, the best and most amiable Father in heaven. The saints were animated by childlike fear and love for the Heavenly Father, and were ready to die rather than break His holy law by wilful sin.

The Fruits of the Holy Ghost

THE fruits of the Holy Spirit, as enumerated by St. Paul to the Galatians (v. 22, 23), are twelve: charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, longanimity, mildness, faith, modesty, continency and

chastity. These fruits should be visible in the Christian, for thereby men will know that the Holy Ghost dwells in him, even as the tree is known by its fruits.

If the Holy Spirit dwells in his heart, a man may be compared to a tree full of vigor which brings forth the best and sweetest fruit, that is, works of virtue and sanctification. But if the spirit of the world, the flesh, and the pride of life have taken possession of his soul, a man is like an evil tree which brings forth evil and bitter fruit. The works of the flesh, in opposition to those of the Spirit, are "fruits of death."

The fruits of the Holy Spirit are most desirable. They sweeten our life here on earth and give the assurance of our rejoicing in the love of the Holy Ghost throughout eternity.

Peace of Heart

Father Faber, the well-known spiritual writer and convert, was received into the Church on November 18, 1845. On that day, after having received the sacraments of Holy Eucharist and confirmation, he felt so happy that he was unable to tell a friend personally of the great peace which

flooded his soul, and which gave him a foretaste of eternal blessedness. Instead, he took a sheet of paper and wrote three words: Peace, peace, peace! "The peace of God which surpasses all understanding" (Phil. iv. 7) we obtain when the Holy Ghost enters our soul. Peace and joy in the Holy Spirit are a foretaste of future blessedness.

St. Philip Neri

St. Philip Neri was accustomed to ask daily for the Holy Ghost. On the Feast of Pentecost, 1544, when he again begged most fervently for the graces and gifts of the Holy Spirit, he became so inflamed with Divine love that he was unable to stand. He sank powerless to the ground, and bared his breast, seeking thus to cool his burning heart. Filled with unspeakable joy, he at length arose, but his whole body trembled, so greatly did his heart rejoice in the Lord.

Frequently his love and joy became so overwhelming that he called out with a stifled voice: "Enough, O Lord! Enough! Human frailty is unable to bear such excessive happiness." — Who would not envy this saint for enjoying in so intense a degree the sweet fruit of the joy of the Holy Spirit?





The Greatest Gift of the Holy Ghost

THE greatest gift which the Holy Ghost imparts to a soul is sanctifying grace, a gift so sublime, so precious and Divine that it surpasses comprehension. It sanctifies man, gives to his soul a resemblance to God corresponding to His infinite sanctity, and imprints upon it the supernatural likeness of God. Through grace, the soul is clothed in such heavenly beauty that, in comparison, all earthly beauty seems vile.

The value of sanctifying grace cannot be expressed. St. Thomas Aquinas says, "The least grace outweighs all the riches of this world." This is astonishing. We cannot comprehend it. Yet it is so and it can be thus explained. Whosoever has the

lowest degree of sanctifying grace is a friend of God's. If he dies in this grace he will be happy forever in heaven. God will give him a palace of inestimable worth, will make him a prince of the heavenly kingdom and will give Himself to him as his eternal reward. Now, since all treasures of heaven and earth are comprised in God, and God is of infinitely greater value than anything created, it follows that if for sanctifying grace man receives God Himself as a reward, he must have gained infinitely more than all the treasures of the world.

Sanctifying Grace Increased

We can increase our degree of sanctifying grace by every good work, and the more good works we perform, the more graces we merit. Not only by great deeds do we increase in sanctifying grace, but by every little act; for example, by a fervent sigh, a devout glance at the Sacred Host or at a holy picture, by a humble inclination; by every pious ejaculation, such as, "O my God! O good Jesus! O purest Virgin Mary!" and similar expressions. Each and every one of these

good thoughts, holy desires, words and deeds increases the grace of God in us, and for each of these we receive a new growth in sanctifying grace. Hence we also receive greater honor and greater joy in heaven, and God gives Himself to us in a more abundant measure, so that we know Him better, love Him more fervently and possess Him more perfectly. Moreover, even all our daily acts which are not of themselves acts of piety, such as eating, speaking, walking, working, etc., may be sanctified by doing them for love of God, and thus they will also increase sanctifying grace in us and become meritorious for heaven.

Inexpressible Beauty

Sanctifying grace imparts to the soul an inexpressible beauty. It makes the soul so pleasing, so beautiful and charming, that the beauty of the firmament and of the earth cannot be compared with the beauty of the soul. If we could behold a soul in the grace of God, we would confess that all natural beauty vanishes before it.

How inconceivable a beauty must our soul possess, since the infinitely beautiful God Himself takes inexpressible delight in it! The least degree of sanctifying grace imparts this beauty to the soul; but he who has more grace has a more beautiful soul, and the more grace he acquires, the more beautiful will his soul become. — O my God, what a great wrong those commit, who by mortal sin destroy the beauty of their soul and rob the Creator of His joy therein!

A Child of God

The soul is elevated so high by sanctifying grace that it becomes a true child of God. In utter astonishment at so great a love of God for His creatures, St. John exclaims: "Behold what manner of love the Father has bestowed upon us, that we should be called children of God; and such we are" (1 John iii. 1). As the rank of princes vanishes before God, so does every earthly rank fade before the privilege of adoption of children by the Almighty.

The consideration of this truth induced a daughter of King Louis XV of France to become an austere Carmelite. While still living at court this princess once reprimanded her maid of honor severely. The latter, a truly devout and Christian maid, meekly gave her mistress to understand that her reproaches were unjust. Exasperated, the princess demanded, "Do you not know that I am the daughter of a king?"

"And I," responded the maid, "I am even a child of God."

These words so deeply impressed the princess that in her ardent desire to become a privileged child of God, she renounced the world. Would that all who receive the inestimable grace of adoption of children of the Most High appreciated their exalted dignity!

Treasure This Precious Gift

As before mentioned, Saint Thomas Aquinas teaches that the whole world with all that is in it has less value before God than one single soul in the state of sanctifying grace. And all this is due to the Holy Spirit, though not, however, independently of the other two Divine Persons.

The Holy Ghost is the Spirit of Love, proceeding from the Father and the Son. The dispensing of sanctifying grace is the great work of God's love. How grateful,

then, should we be for this work of sanctification, for this precious gift of grace, and how jealously should we guard this treasure! Hell tries its utmost to rob man of this jewel, for the fallen angels realize its value. But, alas! souls do not prize its inestimable worth. Often they sell it for a trifle! — After the battle of Burgundy, in 1476, a soldier found a diamond among the spoils on the battlefield. He picked it up, but thinking it glass, threw it away. He picked it up again and sold it for a florin (about forty cents).

O dear reader, the gem of grace which God has placed in your heart is worth a million times more than the diamond which the soldier first cast away and then sold for a trifle. Do not for any price sell your precious gem by mortal sin, for this jewel makes you richer than all the wealth of the world could do. Pray, oh, pray, because Satan goes about seeking to rob you of your treasure!

Inscription on a Tombstone

There are people who, though bodily alive, are spiritually dead because they are void of sanctifying grace.

In a certain cemetery there was a tombstone bearing this curious inscription: Here rests N. N. He died at the age of 90, but had lived only 3 years. — A traveler, unable to comprehend its meaning, questioned the caretaker, who replied: "That man lived a life of sin till his 87th year. Only the last three years of his life were spent in the fear of God. Before his death he requested this inscription to be placed above his grave." — The traveler, thoughtful and serious, continued his journey.

A Temple of the Holy Ghost

Origen, one of the great writers of the early Church, was the son of St. Leonidas, who suffered martyrdom for the Faith in 204 during the persecution under Emperor Severus. When Origen was a child, St. Leonidas would approach his cradle and reverently kiss the breast of the sleeping boy. When asked why he did so, Leonidas replied: "The body of my child is a temple of the Holy Ghost."

The Holy Ghost dwells in the soul of the just man, sanctifies, ennobles and enriches it by infusing into it sanctifying grace. This grace gives the creature a participation in the Divine nature, and the supernatural Divine life which this grace implants is crowned by the Holy Spirit's making likewise of the body His dwelling-place. The Holy Ghost is not content with giving us His graces and gifts; no, He gives Himself. He Himself, as the seal of our sanctification, dwells in us, and He Himself, as the most excellent gift, accompanies His gifts of grace.

All these countless magnificent gifts are bestowed for the sole purpose of endowing us worthily for the presence of so great a Majesty. The sanctity of our temple is the Holy Ghost Himself. This truth He wishes to impress upon all Christians with these words of the Apostle: "Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you?.. Holy is the temple of God, and this temple you are" (1 Cor. iii. 16-17).

The Temple Sanctified

The Holy Ghost consecrates our heart for His living temple and dwells within us constantly in a new and wonderful manner. "If anyone love Me, he will keep My word,



and My Father will love him, and We will come to him and make Our abode with him" (John xiv. 23). We see clearly, therefore, what an inestimable treasure sanctifying grace is, which truly brings to us all gifts, even the Author of all holiness and goodness Himself. Yet how little this grace is esteemed by so many! How little these treasures are prized, how carelessly these jewels squandered! Beloved soul, esteem this priceless gift! Oh, "if thou didst know the gift of God!" (John iv. 10.) Oh, did you but realize who He is who comes to you in sanctifying grace, how carefully you would preserve it even at the sacrifice of your life! How thankful you would be to your parents, to the priests, to those who educate your mind, train your will and guide your soul, who help

you to preserve the most precious treasure of sanctifying grace and the Holy Ghost!

"Here Jesus Dwells"

The saintly nun, Marina of Eskobar, daughter of a Spanish lawyer, died in the 80th year of her life in 1633, after having been bedridden for thirty years. During her prolonged illness, our Savior often consoled her in visions which sometimes brought on ecstasies. Once Christ showed the nun her own heart which shone like a bright ruby. In its midst was written, in characters of gold: Here Jesus dwells. — Christ enters the soul of the just man by means of the Holy Spirit.

The Temple Defiled

How long does the Holy Spirit remain with us? The Holy Spirit abides in our soul as long as we preserve ourselves from mortal sin. Mortal sin forces the Holy Ghost to depart from our soul. Light and darkness cannot dwell together. "What fellowship has light with darkness?" (2 Cor. vi. 14.) The Holy Ghost has no communication nor indwelling with the evil spirit; they cannot co-inhabit a soul,

as it is certain that a soul whilst in mortal sin is given over to the power of the evil one. The wisdom of the Holy Ghost does not enter a wicked soul; the Holy Ghost hates hypocrisy, and does not dwell in a body that serves sin and vice.

Oh, that we would ever remember the dignity to which our body has been raised by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit! What a sacred duty rests upon us to preserve this body undefiled, and never to misuse it! Every member therefore, the eye, the ear, the tongue, the hand, must be a servant of the Holy Spirit.

Woe to those who desecrate this temple! The Apostle writes: "If anyone destroys the temple of God, him will God destroy; for holy is the temple of God, and this temple you are" (1 Cor. iii. 17). This temple is desecrated most frequently and most shamefully by sins of impurity. By day and by night the evil one seeks to ignite this hallowed temple with sparks of impure temptations, and to expel the Spirit of Divine Love therefrom.

Therefore, let us arm ourselves with the fear of the Lord, that the demon may not enter our heart and establish his dominion there. Let us avoid sinful thoughts, imaginations and desires. Let us refrain from using impure language, and avoid works of darkness. Let us not sadden the Holy Spirit. Let us not extinguish the holy fire of Divine love which burns on the altar of our heart. Let us be docile to the promptings of the Holy Ghost, who with His Divine love will illuminate our mind, purify our body and soul, and enkindle our heart.

From this let us conclude what a dreadful misfortune it is to commit a grievous sin which desecrates the temple of the Holy Ghost and drives from our heart the Holy Spirit with His glorious gifts and graces. When the Holy Ghost departs, we also lose Divine love, peace, joy, heavenly consolation, and the hope of eternal salvation. Oh, how sad for the sinner to drive the Holy Spirit from His consecrated temple!

Should ever the great misfortune of losing sanctifying grace befall you, how bitterly you should weep over this unspeakable loss, nor should you rest day or night until you have regained the heavenly treasure. This most beautiful ornament of the soul, received in baptism, if lost by

mortal sin, is restored by the Holy Ghost in the sacrament of penance; also by perfect contrition when accompanied by the earnest will to go to confession. Therefore, sanctifying grace is also called the "grace of justification," because it makes us holy and raises us from the state of sin to the state of justice, to that justice which makes us pleasing to God and capable of possessing Him forever in heaven.

St. Lucy's Answer

St. Lucy suffered martyrdom under the Emperor Diocletian. She belonged to a noble family, and possessed great wealth. A young pagan who desired to marry her, denounced her as a "Christian" to the prefect because she refused to give him her hand. The prefect had Lucy apprehended, and endeavored to gain her by threats and promises, but all in vain. Flattery proving fruitless, he ordered her to be scourged. On hearing this sentence, Lucy said: "You will only waste your time in torturing me, for the words I have uttered are not mine, but are inspired by the Holy Ghost."

"Is the Holy Ghost dwelling in you?" asked the prefect.

Lucy answered: "The hearts of the chaste and holy are the temples of the Holy Ghost."

"Then I will take from you that virtue of which you speak," raged the prefect, "and the Holy Ghost will then forsake you."

In great fury, he ordered Lucy to be led to a den of wickedness, but when the wretched inmates tried to seize her, she stood immovable as a statue. The tyrant then ordered her to be covered with oil and resin and to be burned to death. But the flames would not touch her, and the prefect, to accomplish her death, ordered her to be pierced by a sword. This was done, and the virgin martyr went to rejoice forever in the love of the Holy Spirit.

The Immaculate Spouse of the Holy Spirit

A CERTAIN artist has represented Mary as the Spouse of the Holy Spirit. The picture shows Mary standing upon a globe, which represents the world. Above is the Blessed Trinity. Directly over her head hovers the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove. Graces, represented by rays of light, stream from Him into Mary's Heart, and from thence pour themselves upon the earth in seven streams, symbolizing the



seven gifts of the Holy Spirit granted to men through Mary's mediation. In several passages of Holy Scripture, the Holy Ghost Himself calls Mary His Spouse. Even at the first instant of her conception, He imparted to her so great a fulness of grace that all the angels and saints combined have not attained such a degree of perfection.

Enraptured by Mary's beauty, the Holy Spirit exclaims in admiration: "How beautiful art thou, My Love!" (Cant. iv. 1.) But it was above all at the Incarnation of the Son of God that Mary became the true Spouse of the Holy Spirit, for she conceived the Eternal Word in the power of the Holy Ghost.

Through Mary, with Mary and in Mary the Holy Ghost brought forth the God-man,

and in like manner He brings forth, every day, to the end of time, the elect children of God. Blessed Grignon de Montfort says: "The Holy Ghost imparted to Mary His immeasurable gifts, and has made her the dispenser of all His graces, so that she distributes His gifts and graces to whom she wills, as much as she wills, and how and where she wills. No grace is given by heaven to man except through her virginal hands." St. Bernard and St. Alphonsus hold the same opinion.

To enable Mary to fill her new, sublime office as Mother of all God's children, she required another plenitude of grace, and this she received from the Holy Ghost at His coming on Pentecost. Mary had joined the Apostles in the cenacle, and for nine days had prayed and sighed for the coming of the Divine Comforter. It was due chiefly to her prayers and ardent desires that the Holy Spirit came down with such treasures of grace.

Through Mary we must seek grace, for she is the Spouse of the Holy Spirit, and all graces are dispensed through her hands. Let us then often greet Mary as the Spouse of the Holy Spirit.

Devotion to the Holy Ghost

The Golden Key to Graces

EVOTION to the Holy Ghost is the golden key wherewith the soul gains free access to His infinitely rich treasure chamber. From this treasury the Holy Ghost dispenses graces upon graces with boundless liberality and delight, for He is Eternal Love, and to give affords Him more pleasure than man experiences in receiving. In His infinite love, He ardently desires to make souls happy, more so than a mother desires to gladden her child. Souls who honor the Holy Ghost in a particular manner will receive special graces.

The holy Mother of God and the Apostles were the first to practice special devotion to the Holy Spirit. St. Paul speaks of the Holy Ghost more than a hundred times in his epistles. All the holy fathers of the Church have followed in the footsteps of the Apostles. All have glorified the Holy Spirit, and some have written whole volumes in His praise. To Saint Ambrose alone are ascribed four books on the Holy Ghost.

Once when the glorious Pontiff, Pope St. Pius VI, was considering these words of the royal psalmist: "Send forth Thy Spirit and they shall be created, and Thou shalt renew the face of the earth," he felt convinced that these words, which were fulfilled on the first Pentecost, would continue to be realized if Christians would invoke the Holy Spirit with contrite heart.

Pope Leo XIII, in his encyclical of May 9, 1897, writes: "We earnestly desire that... piety may increase and be inflamed towards the Holy Ghost, to whom especially all of us owe the grace of following the paths of truth and virtue."

"Devotion to the Holy Ghost," says Cardinal Manning, "seeks to awaken in us a consciousness of the presence and indwelling of the Holy Ghost, not only in the Church as a whole, but in each one of us." — The Holy Ghost is not honored at all by some, and far too little by most Catholics, yet this devotion yields salutary fruits.

It is to be deplored that so few prayer books contain devotions to the Holy Ghost, for it is by the incessant administration of graces that He operates the supernatural life of the faithful. Let it be remembered that all the lights, inspirations, Divine calls; all the good acts which we have performed during our life; all our acts of contrition, of confidence in the Divine mercy, of love, of resignation, have been gifts of the Holy Spirit. The hidden manner in which the Holy Ghost operates, obscures His graces from our superficial sight, but let us never forget that we are His temples.

Ven. Vincent Pallotti

While only a student, the servant of God, Vincent Pallotti, who died in Rome in 1850, had little aptitude for study, and made little progress in school. Upon his mother's advice, he asked the Holy Ghost for one ray of light to illuminate his weak understanding. Behold, the Holy Spirit sent that ray of light into the heart of the pious student, and Pallotti became not only a useful priest, but an eminent preacher and the founder of a religious Congregation.

How to Prepare for the Coming of the Holy Spirit

What should we do to obtain the gifts of the Holy Ghost? We should, first, excite in our hearts an ardent desire for the Holy Ghost and His gifts by considering the great graces which the Holy Spirit dispenses, especially His burning charity and heavenly consolations. Our Divine Savior repeatedly promised the Apostles the Holy Spirit as a comforter, counsellor and teacher.

Secondly, we should, according to the example of the Apostles before Pentecost, pray most fervently for the Holy Spirit. Prayer is the golden key to the treasure chamber of the Holy Ghost. Therefore, we should often during the year make novenas to the Holy Spirit.

Novena to the Holy Ghost

St. John Vianney, the Cure of Ars, was accustomed to say: "Without the Holy Ghost all is cold. Therefore, when we feel we are losing our fervor, we must instantly start a novena to the Holy Spirit to ask for faith and love."

The nine days following the ascension of Our Lord, previous to the descent of the Holy Ghost, were spent by the Blessed Virgin and the Apostles in preparing themselves by prayer and recollection for the coming of the Holy Spirit. This was the

first novena ever made in the Catholic Church. It was made at the command of Our Lord Himself. It is, therefore, the model of all other novenas, and should hold a prominent place in our devotions.

St. Alphonsus writes: "The novena to the Holy Ghost is the chief of all novenas, because it was the first that was ever celebrated, and that by the holy Mother of God with the Apostles in the Supper-room. It was rewarded by many wonders and gifts, principally by the descent of the Holy Spirit, a gift merited for us by the Passion of Jesus Christ Himself."

Pope Leo XIII prescribed that a novena should be made in preparation for the feast of Pentecost in all parish churches throughout the world to implore the return of heretics and schismatics to the unity of the Catholic Faith.

"Our hearts are the altars of God," says St. Gregory, "where He desires that the fires of Divine love should be always burning. Therefore the Eternal Father, not satisfied with having given us His Son Jesus Christ to save us by His Death, would also give us the Holy Ghost that He might dwell in our souls, and keep them

constantly on fire with His love."

Any of the prayers in this booklet may be used for a novena. Also, the "Glory be to the Father," said seven times in honor of the Holy Spirit is recommended.

Besides novenas, other means of honoring the Holy Spirit are: to assist at Holy Mass in His honor or have the adorable Sacrifice offered for this intention; often to recite the Glory be to the Father, or some other prayer, devoutly in honor of the Holy Ghost, and to invoke His aid in all difficulties. Thus we shall experience Divine light, grace and consolation from on high.

An indulgence of 10 years for each day of the Novena is granted to all those who take part in a public novena in preparation for the feast of Pentecost, and a plenary indulgence, once during the novena or the eight days following, if the novena has been attended at least five days, and the person complies with the conditions of confession, Communion and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father.

If a novena is made privately during the nine days preceding the feast of Pentecost, or at any other time during the year, an indulgence of 7 years may be gained for each day of the novena, and a plenary indulgence at the close of the novena under the conditions specified above.

NOTE: Where a public novena is held before the feast of Pentecost, one cannot gain the indulgences for a private novena unless lawfully hindered from attending the public exercises.



Reflections and Prayers

For the Feast of Pentecost

S T. Gregory the Great writes: "As God has given to the body of man two important parts, the head and the heart, that they may be the organs of the principal faculties, the understanding and the will, so the same God has given to the mystical body, which is the Catholic Church, Christ as its Head, and the Holy Ghost as its Heart. Through the one we learn the eternal truth, through the other we learn to love and to practice it."

The Holy Ghost descended from the heights of heaven to distribute the immense treasures which our Savior merited through His bitter Passion and Death. He crowns the work of Redemption, and illuminates the world by the beams of truth and love. The Holy Ghost came down in

the form of a dove, of flames, and of flery tongues. He came in the form of a dove because by His gentleness and mildness He desires to give us tranquillity of heart; in the form of flames to symbolize the zeal for justice which He imparts; and as flery tongues, to enkindle men that they may speak words of burning love.

On the Feast of Pentecost, the Holy Ghost came and consecrated the Apostles as spiritual temples, and sanctified them so that everything displeasing to God was consumed. We, too, have been consecrated by the Holy Ghost as temples of the Most High in the laver of spiritual regeneration. In holy baptism we have been purified from original sin, and by receiving sanctifying grace we have been adorned with the robe of honor and justification. From being sinners we became just, and from being enemies of God, we were made His friends, His children, and heirs of heavenly glory.

Oh, how sincerely grateful we should be to our Sanctifier, the Giver of sanctifying grace, the Holy Spirit! How thankfully we should recall the day of our baptism! The early Christians so highly esteemed the anniversary of their baptism that they celebrated it as a festival, and each year renewed their baptismal vows to show their gratitude to the Most Blessed Trinity and especially to the Holy Ghost. On the anniversary of our baptism, we, too, should

renew our baptismal vows, and be thankful for the priceless benefits bestowed upon us in this great and sublime sacrament through which we were delivered from the slavery of Satan, washed from our sins, given new spiritual life, adorned with the robe of light and grace, admitted to the fold of Christ, and had the indelible seal of sanctity imprinted upon our souls through the operation of the Holy Spirit. Let us never forget that we are members of that mystical body of which Christ is the Head and the Holy Spirit the soul.

St. John Chrysostom overcame all the assaults of the evil spirit by renewing his baptismal vows in these words: "I renounce thee, Satan. I despise thee and all thy works! I will have no share with thee and in thy pride. Thou, O Jesus, art my Lord and Master, Thou art my Savior! To Thee I cling; I surrender myself entirely to Thee." The saint frequently recommended this exercise in his sermons.

Thanksgiving for Baptismal Graces

I believe in Thee, O God, the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. Thou hast accepted me as Thy child and in the laver of regeneration hast constituted me as an heir of Thy kingdom.

I believe in Thee, O Lord Jesus Christ, only-begotten Son, who hast suffered and died for me, and through Thy Precious Blood hast ransomed me from the slavery of Satan.

I believe in Thee, O Holy Ghost, who, hast made me and consecrated me as Thy temple, and chosen me as a vessel of grace.

I renounce the devil with all his works and all his pomps. I renounce all the evil desires of the flesh, and the world with all its vanities and deceits, and I firmly resolve to lead a truly Christian life. May the Most Blessed Trinity strengthen my purpose, by whom I seal this renewal of my baptismal vows, in the Name of the Father, A and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Let its Divine light penetrate my soul and fill it with such a reverence and awe of the Divine Majesty as to make me not only dread every sin as an offence against the great God, but shun carefully whatever in the least degree wounds Divine charity.
