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



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## INTRODUCTION.

THE Diary of Francis Evans, Secretary to Bishop Lloyd, one of the famous Seven Bishops, was found by the late Bishop Philpott in the Muniment Room of Hartlebury Castle, and was deposited by him in the Diocesan Registry at Worcester.

It is beautifully written in the clear and careful handwriting of a professional clerk, and it gives a unique picture of a bishop's life in England 200 years ago.

Francis Evans was, like his master, a Welshman. He followed the Bishop from St. Asaph to Lichfield, and from Lichfield to Worcester. His father, John Evans, kept the 'Bell Inn' at Oswestry. Frank seems to have married above his position, for his wife was the daughter of the Lord of the Manor of Snelston in Derbyshire. He was a most faithful and diligent scribe. He chronicled everything, events great and small—the death of King William III., and the death of the deer in the park; the Consecration of a church, and the appointment of a gamekeeper; the Livings in the Bishop's gift, and the haunches of venison sent to the Bishop's friends; the places where he himself "lay" each night, and the friends with whom "his Lop" dined.

He was hardworking and energetic, constantly riding about the country on business. He made long journeys on horseback, sometimes sleeping in a different bed each night for three months on end. He met with many adventures; for instance, at Tredington, "where ye room above stairs fell under us; though there were many persons in it, and many below, wee suffered no harme." Again, a year afterwards, "This day I escaped falling and being stifled in Mr Jones' house of office at Oxford (as I did this day 12 months being hurt at Tredington), when the floor fell under the Chancellor, Stewart, Jury, and myself, and many others that attended the Court there." Again, Nov. 26th, 1703, "I went to Treddington and thence to Dascot, and thro' a most violent wet storme thence to Blockley, passing ye waters wth

He met, poor man, with other misfortunes, for in those eight years he lost in succession his young wife, his mother, his father, and his father-in-law.

He had the greatest veneration for "my Lord," and was much trusted by him. A clergyman in the Diocese of Lichfield wrote to the "wicked" Bishop Watson, who was deprived for simony by Archbishop Tenison, in these terms of Francis Evans—"The Bishop's will was his law. A sic volumus from Frank Evans the Secretary was enough to remove a poor clergyman from his livelihood. I know several displaced upon Frank's order, and two lines from him was as powerful and as legal as the long pole of Canterbury's sentence against your Lordship."

THE DIARY begins in 1699. The Bishop was then in his 73<sup>rd</sup> year. He had been a bishop for 19 years—12 years at St. Asaph, and 7 years at Lichfield. He was born at Tilehurst Rectory near Reading. His father, the Rev. Richard Lloyd, was a Royalist, devoted to the cause of Charles I. He "suffered very much upon the king's account in the time of the wars, and was four or five times imprisoned by the rebels." His wife's name was Anne Wicken. He sent his son to Oriel, where he had been himself. William Lloyd, the future bishop, while yet a boy, "gave proof of so fertile an intellect, and so diligently studied Greek and Latin authors and oriental literature, that at the age of eleven years he turned out a distinguished ornament of the University of Oxford 2." He took his Degree at the age of 15, on the 25<sup>th</sup> October, 1642, "being Tuesday after Edgehill Fight." He was ordained Deacon when only 21, during the Commonwealth, by Bishop Skinner of Oxford,

afterwards Bishop of Worcester. "In those very iniquitous times, when the Church was falling, he was not afraid to take the sacred Orders of a Deacon, and, when it was almost trodden underfoot, those of the Priesthood 1."

After he was ordained he went to be tutor in the family of Mr. William Backhouse, of Swallowfield near Reading. Mr. Backhouse was a Rosicrucian and student of the occult sciences. He gave great encouragement to those who were addicted to the same pursuits, especially to Elias Ashmole. He sent his son John to Wadham, and Lloyd went with him, just as Bentley took his pupil, James Stillingfleet, the Bishop's son, to the same College 20 years later. John Backhouse died young, and his sister succeeded to Swallowfield. She married into the Clarendon family, and it was at Swallowfield that Lord Clarendon wrote the History of the Great Rebellion.

At the Restoration Lloyd was made Prebend of Ripon, but fell ill of "a quartan ague and had no health for business for three or four years."

He married, but his first wife only lived a year. After being fourteen years a widower he was married again in Westminster Abbey to a daughter of one of the Prebendaries<sup>2</sup>. He was then King's Chaplain and Rector of St. Mary's, Reading. He became also Dean of Bangor and Canon Residentiary of Salisbury, and was preferred in 1676 to the Vicarage of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, "the greatest Cure in England;" and "there he stood in the front of the battel all King James' reign <sup>3</sup>."

This is the description given of his learning and scholarship by his contemporary Bishop Burnet:—

"Lloyd was a great critick in the Greek and Latin authors, but chiefly in the Scriptures; of the words and phrases of which he carried the most perfect concordance in his memory, and had it the readiest about him of all the men that ever I knew. He was an exact historian, and the most punctual in chronology of all our divines. He had read the most books, and with the best

judgment, and had made the most copious abstracts out of them of any in this age, so that Wilkins 1 used to say he had the most learning *in ready cash* of any he ever knew."

While Vicar of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields he went with the Princess Mary into Holland, being her first Chaplain. Charles II. promoted him to the See of St. Asaph, to which he was consecrated 3rd October, 1680. He was then 53. He lived to be over 90, so that he was a bishop for more than 37 years. It was while he was at St. Asaph that he was committed to the Tower by James II. for resisting his illegal proceedings. Along with him were Sancroft. Archbishop of Canterbury, Ken, Bishop of Bath and Wells, Turner of Ely, White of Peterborough, Lake of Chichester, and Trelawney of Bristol. The popular feeling in favour of the seven bishops was very strong. Macaulay's account of their Trial and Acquittal is one of the most striking passages in his History. Lloyd, who had lived much in London, seems to have been as popular as any of them. "He was unable to get through Palace yard by reason of the crowds of people who pressed round him in their enthusiasm, and kissed his hands and garments; and was rescued by Lord Clarendon in his carriage by a circuitous way 2."

When James II. was dethroned, Lloyd took the oaths to William and Mary with willingness, for he was a strong Protestant, and made every effort to persuade the clergy to follow his example. He was soon promoted to Lichfield, where he rebuilt Eccleshall Castle, which had fallen into ruin, and after seven years he was advanced to Worcester. The King had a high opinion of him, and perhaps thought he would do something to make his government more popular in a country not specially favourable to his cause.

If the number of portraits of a man be any guide to his greatness, then indeed Bishop Lloyd must have been among the greatest of bishops, for the number of his portraits is quite confusing. Three of them are engraved, and extremely well engraved, in Nash's "History of Worcestershire." Besides these there is a portrait at Lambeth, another at Lichfield, another in the pos-

session of the Bishop of Worcester, and several others in private hands.

Bishop Lloyd lived to enter his 91st year "without losing his intellect till the last moment of his life." He died 30<sup>th</sup> August, 1717, and was buried under the chancel of Fladbury Church, where his son was Rector. His wife survived him two years, and was laid to rest beside him.

Their only son, WILLIAM LLOYD, D.D., is commemorated on a tablet in Fladbury Church in these terms:—"Rector of this Parish and Chancellor of this Diocese, who within the short space of a week from his mother's death, departed this life, much regretted, at the age of forty-five. He was a man learned without pride, benevolent without ostentation, an eloquent clear and forcible preacher, patient in investigating causes, just in his decisions, second to none in unshaken fidelity to his king and country, and in no respect a degenerate heir of his Father's virtues. During his life he made for himself a noble monument in the adjacent Rectory-house, which he erected from the foundations."

He was twice married, first to Elizabeth Poulden<sup>2</sup>, and then to Jane Thompson of Eskrick, Yorkshire, and had eight children, four of whom died young.

A modern bishop has no leisure, his engagements are endless, he has absolutely no time for reading or for thought. The late Bishop Westcott used to look round his library and say regretfully, "a bishop nowadays has no need for books."

It was very different 200 years ago. Bishop Lloyd had a great deal of leisure, he never spent more than half the year in his Diocese, and was usually absent for eight months out of the twelve. He lived mostly at Oxford, where he employed his leisure in prophetical studies, and was called by the Terrae filius of 1703 Pseudopropheta canus!

He was a prolific author. Burnet gives him great praise as a writer of English. "The Bishop of Worcester, Dr. Lloyd, had the truest notions of a correct stile of any man I ever saw. I kept close to his rules, and so came to have the reputation of a correct writer as to stile 1."

His work as a bishop will not stand the test of modern requirements. To reside in his Diocese for four months only in the year, to hold about 15 confirmations, to treat the clergy of one or two deaneries to a dinner at an inn, was not a great tax either on his time or his purse. Yet he was spoken of by his contemporaries as a model bishop 2, and was considered to have "watched over the Diocese with the utmost prudence."

The income of the See of Worcester was reckoned by the Chancellor (Price), who gives a careful list of the revenues in his Notitia, at £1,300 a year. Of course this represents a much larger sum. It is difficult to say how much larger, for it is not easy to find out the exact value of money in those days. The Head Master of Kidderminster Grammar School, Rev. Dr. Gibbins, who is an authority on the subject, considers that prices to-day are at least four times more than in 1701. Perhaps we may arrive at a fairly correct idea from the Diary itself. It mentions that £24 a year was the ordinary salary of a curate, therefore the Bishop's income was about 50 times that of a curate. On the same scale of comparison, Bishop Lloyd's income must have been equal to about £7,500 a year.

The Bishop had no less than *four* houses of residence: Hartlebury Castle, with its deer park and attractive surroundings, the Palace at Worcester (which has been for 60 years the Deanery), a house at Oxford, and a house in London.

When in London, he lived at first in Whitehall near the Palace, and afterwards in the neighbourhood of Soho Square, which was built in 1680, and was considered then to be "the genteelest part of the town<sup>3</sup>." If Macaulay is correct in saying that in those days woodcocks were shot where Regent Street now stands

once visit his diocese during the whole six years in which he held the Bishopric.

then Brewer's Street, Soho, in which the Bishop lived, must have been almost in the country.

Modern writers seem scarcely to have done justice to Bishop Lloyd's character. Macaulay speaks of him as "a half crazed fanatic," and "of slender judgment." Miss Strickland in her "Lives of the Seven Bishops" is very down upon him for avarice, nepotism, partisanship, &c. "Assuredly Archbishop Tenison must have been weary of Lloyd's perpetual importunity in behalf of one person or another." Whereas the fact was that Lloyd was only doing his duty in recommending men to the Archbishop. Burnet writes, "K. William granted a commission to the two Archbishops, the Bishops of Lichfield, Worcester, Ely, and myself to recommend fit persons to all Ecclesiastical preferments, and did charge us to seek out the best and worthiest men we could find, that such and such only should be promoted 1." The authors of the "Diocesan History of Worcester" speak of Lloyd's "violence," his "irritability," and his "passionate self-will."

The testimony of the Diary is altogether different. The Bishop's letters are singularly weighty and well expressed. Take for example the letter (page 60) defending his action in suspending one of his clergy. What could be more full of force and vigour and good sense? It must have made "his good Brethren" to whom it was addressed look very foolish. In all the letters inserted in the Diary he speaks his mind very plainly, but in remarkably reasonable and temperate language.

We ought also to give due weight to the opinion of contemporaries.

This is Bishop Burnet's description of Lloyd's character: "He was a holy, humble, and patient man, ever ready to do good when he saw a proper opportunity." Richard Bentley had the highest opinion of him<sup>2</sup>. Whiston thought himself fortunate in having obtained Holy Orders from him. "I most fortunately pitched upon the *great* Bishop Lloyd (then Bishop of Lichfield), to whom that year 1693 I brought my College testimonial with a letter from Mr Langley, Minister of Tamworth, well known to

the Bishop. . . . . . I desired that his Lop would please to give me deacon's orders on S<sup>t</sup> Matthew's Day, and priest's on Sunday following, being the public ordination. . . . . He favoured me with a private ordination on the holiday, and after a most uncommon but vastly improving examination and instruction in the Cathedral beforehand, with a publick ordination into the priesthood the next Lord's Day <sup>1</sup>."

The Bishop generally held three ORDINATIONS in the year. Strange to say, he never once ordained in his Cathedral, always in the Parish Church of Hartlebury, or else in London or Oxford.

He was most particular as to Candidates for Holy Orders. At almost every ordination he refused men. One man is not of full age.—Another has not found a title.—Another came late and had not letters Dimissory from his own bishop.— Another, "a student of Gloucester Hall in Oxford, had officiated several times in the Chapell of St Kenelm's in the Parish of Hales Owen without orders." The Bishop seems to have been much pestered by a certain candidate for Deacon's Orders, named Samuel Mogridge, whom he twice refused for insufficiency, and when the fellow managed to obtain Deacon's Orders elsewhere he twice refused to ordain him priest.

A remarkable instance is given in the Diary of the Bishop's anxiety that men should be sufficiently well-read before taking charge of a parish.

A certain Mr. Bell was presented by Lord Plymouth to the living of Tardebigge. Although he was a University man, the Bishop would not institute him until he had solemnly promised to apply himself to the study of the Holy Scriptures and such books as the Bishop should think necessary. He made him promise to read so many books during each succeeding four months, and to repair to the Bishop at intervals to give an account of his study and improvements, and to receive further advice and instructions. The list of books to be studied during each period is given <sup>2</sup> and is sufficiently formidable.

On the other hand, a man was sometimes ordained deacon one

Sunday, Priest the next Sunday, and instituted to a Living before the week was out!

Among those who were ordained by the Bishop, three may be selected as notable men.

I. First the great foreign scholar, GRABE.

He was a Prussian, a man of profound erudition, "One of the greatest divines of the age 1." "Dissatisfied as to the validity of Lutheran Orders, he had at first turned his thoughts to Rome, not unaware that he should find in that Church many departures from the simplicity of the early faith; but meeting with Spencer, the eminent leader of the German Pietists, he pointed out to him the Church of England as a community likely to meet his wants. He came to this country, received a Royal pension, took Holy Orders<sup>2</sup>, and continued with indefatigable labour his patriotic studies. It became the great project of his life to maintain a close correspondence between the English and Lutheran Churches, to bring about in Prussia a restoration of Episcopacy, and introduce there a Liturgy composed upon the English model<sup>3</sup>." But he died young. He met with an accident while journeying to London in the stage-coach, from which he did not recover. Dr. Grabe is still quoted as a classical authority. Robert Harley, Earl of Oxford, placed a costly monument to him in the South Transept of Westminster Abbey, close to Poets' Corner. His figure is seated pen in hand on a marble bench, upon which stands a bronze lamp, with books and MSS. The monument is just over the tablet to Isaac Casaubon, and close to David Garrick's. The face is beautiful and vouthful.

2. Another interesting person who late in life joined our Church and came to Bishop Lloyd as a candidate for Holy Orders, was the first S.P.G. Missionary, GEORGE KEITH. He was brought up a Presbyterian, was a class-fellow of Bishop Burnet's at Marischal College, Aberdeen, but joined the then new sect of Quakers, and in the course of his life was four times imprisoned for his opinions. He went abroad to spread those opinions in Germany and afterwards in America. There he disagreed with the Quakers of Philadelphia on the doctrine of the Lord's Supper, and in 1692 was prohibited by them from preaching. He returned to London,

and at first started a schism, but came to a better mind and joined the Church of England; was ordained Deacon by Compton, Bishop of London, and was given Priest's Orders in Whitehall Chapel by Bishop Lloyd in 1701, at the mature age of 64 <sup>1</sup>. It is said that he persuaded as many as 500 persons among the Quakers to conform to the Church of England.

The newly formed Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts sent him back to America as their first Missionary, being immensely impressed with his zeal and earnestness. His journal during his tour of two years is a most interesting publication. On his return home he was given the living of Edburton in Sussex by Archbishop Tenison, but fell into ill-health through the hardships he had endured in his missionary labours, and after being bed-ridden for five years, died in 1710, aged 77.

His publications fill 23 pages of Smith's Catalogue. Few men have had so varied a career.

3. A third remarkable candidate for Holy Orders was the Chancellor of the Diocese, JOHN PRICE.

He was an able, learned and well-read man—a tower of strength to the Bishop in all matters connected with the Consistory Court. He left behind him several books of notes, now preserved in the Edgar Tower in Worcester, written in a minute hand, which are of great interest. They contain the ancient forms for installation of Cathedral dignitaries; for excommunication and absolving from excommunication, for election of Proctors for Convocation, &c., with many devout prayers and extracts.

He was ordained Deacon and Priest in September, 1700, at the age of 59.

On one occasion when the Archdeacon of Worcester (Fleetwood) was ill he visited the Clergy in his stead, and gave a beautiful Charge, judging from the *resumé* of it given in his *Notitia*. His death is thus recorded in the Diary: "1705, June 12. Mr. Chance Price dyed, much lamented, at Worce." A monument to him in the Cathedral speaks in high praise of his judicial character and noble motives, and states that he wore himself out (*desudasset*) in the service of the Bishop, the Dean and the Chapter.

The Bishop held a VISITATION OF THE CLERGY every three years. This is the account of the first:—

"Tu., Oct. 31, 1699. My L<sup>d</sup> held his Visitac'on for the Deanryes of Worcester and Powick, and Dr. Wall, Rector of Holt, preach'd the Visitac'on Sermon. The Clergy were treated by my L<sup>d</sup> at the 'Talbott' Inn."

The next entry, taken in connection with the above, is suggestive:—

"W., Nov. I. My L<sup>d</sup> not being very well by reason of a pain in his stomach, and the rivers being out, His Lo<sup>p</sup> granted a com'ission to Mr. John Price, his Chancellor, and Dr. Jephcot and the other Rurall Deans to visit at Evesham."

The Bishop's indisposition, so graphically described, soon passed off, and he was able to visit at Kidderminster on Nov. 6, and to 'treat the clergy with a dinner at ye Lyon' without any ill effects.

It is interesting to read that "his Lop printed 2,000 copies of the accounts of the several kinds of Societies, got up of late years for the promoting of God's worship, for the Reformation of manners, and for the Propagating of Christian Knowledge, and distributed them in his Visitations about his Diocese."

There was a very real revival of religious zeal and earnestness in those days. Bishop Burnet thus notices it:—"There were constant sacraments every Lord's Day in many Churches. There were both greater numbers and greater appearances of Devotion at Prayers and Sacraments than had been observed in the memory of man. . . . At last a Corporation was created by the late King (William III.) for Propagating the Gospel among Infidels, for settling Schools in our Plantations, for furnishing the clergy that were sent thither, and for sending Missionaries among such of our Plantations as were not able to provide Pastors for themselves. . . . It was a glorious conclusion of a Reign that was begun with preserving our Religion, thus to create a Corporation for Propagating it to the remote parts of the earth."

In a pastoral to the Clergy, a printed copy of which is preserved between the pages of the Diary, Bishop Lloyd mentions with approval these praiseworthy and noble efforts. He adds remarks on the subject of Education, which were far ahead of his day and generation:—

"How great a Public Blessing would it be if there were in every Parish in this Church and Kingdom a sufficient Number of good discreet Masters and Dames maintained with public salaries for the teaching of Male and Female Children apart to Read and to say their Catechism. . . . . also to Write and to do such little Works as would Enable them to live by their Labour! Happy are they that are God's Instruments for the procuring of such a Blessing in the Parishes where He has placed them!"

The Bishop made a practice of *visiting* the Cathedral Body as well as the parochial clergy—a practice which has lately been revived—and apparently the Cathedral Body needed a good deal of attention. In 1705 my Lord "visited the chapter and suspended two of the Priest Vicars for not attending," and there was so much amiss that, in the same year, he visited the Chapter once in June, twice in July, and twice in August!

He was also keen to reform abuses in the various Grammar Schools and Hospitals of which he was Visitor. For example, he visited Leicester's Hospital at Warwick, and on two occasions suspended Brethren that were not qualified or had misbehaved themselves.

He wrote strong and pithy letters to the Governors of the Dudley Grammar School<sup>1</sup>, hearing that they had "work't for cole in the school land," exhorting them to be careful of their property, and to make the most of it. And to the Feoffees of Hartlebury Grammar School<sup>2</sup>, whom he calls "his good friends and neighbours," he hints that they had better not resort to the alehouse to do their business, nor spend any of the revenues of the school in meat and drink, "since they all live in the Parish and can get that well enough in their own houses."

In ordinary years the Bishop held Confirmations in the chief market towns. This was his list in 1700:—Shipston, Stratford - on - Avon, Kington, Warwick, Henley, Bidford, Alcester, Bromsgrove, Droitwich, Evesham, Pershore, Worcester, Holt, Kidderminster, Oldswinford, Dudley, Hartlebury, Ombersley, Feckenham.

The numbers confirmed were enormous. The Secretary says:-

"My L<sup>d</sup> had lists of y<sup>e</sup> names of such as came to be confirmed from every Parish, but many more came than were named in the lists, and the Confirmac'ons were *very great* every where. In some places 7 or 800 Persons, and at Bromsgrove, where there were fewest, the number was guessed to be about 400."

How it was accomplished we cannot tell. It must have been in some places impossible for all the candidates, not to speak of the sponsors and parents, to get within the church. For instance, the church of Elmley Lovett did not hold more than 200 people, yet the Bishop confirmed 500 persons there!

By the Bishop's rule children might be confirmed at 10 years of age.

In the first seven years of his Episcopate at Worcester, Bishop Lloyd CONSECRATED only *one* church. That seems a meagre record. One new church in seven years for the whole Diocese of Worcester! Contrast this with modern times.

The Rev. J. Bowstead Wilson, Rector of Knightwick, has made a careful calculation of the amount of money expended in church building and church restoration throughout the Diocese of Worcester (including the Archdeaconry of Coventry) during the 30 years of the Episcopate of the late Bishop Philpott. He reckons it at a million and a quarter. In seven years Bishop Philpott consecrated 33 new churches.

But we must remember how utterly different was the state of the country. The city of Birmingham was a mere village; Macaulay says it did not contain a single bookshop, and that Dr. Johnson's father used to go over from Lichfield on a market-day, and open a bookstall for a few hours. There were no great centres of population. Worcester itself had only 8,000 people, and the whole population of England was not much more than 5 millions. People did not move about much, therefore few new Churches were needed. There is not a single instance in the Diary of the Bishop being asked to license a new building for divine worship, nor to reopen a Church after restoration. If they restored their Churches they did not ask or expect an episcopal benediction. The only Church the Bishop consecrated was Marston Chapel, in the parish of Yardley, which was built by a legacy left by a Mr. Job Marston.

The entry is as follows:-

"1704, May 25, Th. Ascension Day. My L<sup>d</sup> went from S<sup>r</sup> John Burgoigne's and consecrated Marston Chapell in the Parish of Yardley. M<sup>r</sup> Rich<sup>d</sup> Banner (the new Incumbent) preacht. My L<sup>d</sup> Digby, S<sup>r</sup> Charles Holt, and many Persons of quality attended the Solemnity. In the afternoon my L<sup>d</sup> consecrated the Chapel yard."

Some years afterwards the Bishop wrote a letter to the Church-wardens of the Mother Church of Yardley ordering them to supply bread and wine for the Holy Communion at the daughter Church.

The Bishop consecrated one other Churchyard, at St. Peter's, Droitwich.

Bishop Lloyd held his CONSISTORY COURT from time to time, and heard causes concerning the Clergy. It was held in the south aisle of the nave of the Cathedral, near the spot where the Font now stands. He seems to have had summary jurisdiction, and did not hesitate to act upon it.

So much has been said and written on the subject of bishops' courts of first instance, that it may be well to bring together all the entries in the Diary that refer to the subject.

"1700, Jun. 17. My L<sup>d</sup> sate in his consistory and heard causes yt concerned yt clergy."

(As the result of this sitting he suspended John Goodwin, Rector of Moreton Bagot, for marrying persons illegally.)

"July 17. My L<sup>d</sup> sate in his Consistory and suspended William Bartholomew, Clerke, Vicar of Salford, in the County of Warwick, for contumacy in not appearing to answer articles."

"His Lop also judicially admonished Rowld Dennis, Clerke, Vicar of Himbledon 1, to Reside on his Vicarage, and be more diligent in the Dutyes of his place by catechising youth and administering youth Sacraments, &c., and not to tipple or frequent Alehouses."

"1704, July 27. My L<sup>d</sup> went from Hartlebury to Worcester and sate in the Consistory to hear causes."

One of the Priest Vicars of the Cathedral.

"1705, June 7. I was with my Ld at ye Consistory at Worcester."

(The Chancellor, who usually assisted the Bishop, was ill and died on the 12<sup>th</sup>.)

"June 21. My L<sup>d</sup> went and kept his Consistory Cort at Worcr."

(Next day he suspended 2 of the Priest Vicars for neglect of duty.)

"July 12. My Ld held his Consistory."

"Aug. 2. My L<sup>d</sup> held his Consistory and visited the Chapter."

"Aug. 14. My Ld held a Consistory and visited the Chapter."

"Aug. 15. My L<sup>d</sup> sate in the Consistory and visited the Chapter, and adj<sup>d</sup> the Visitac'on till Thursday, 11 Apr., 1706."

(He held this adjourned Visitation on Apr. 11, 1706.)

"1706, Oct. 10. My Ld sate in the Consistory."

Thus during the years of the Diary the Bishop 'sat' in his Consistory Court ten times—six of which occurred in the Summer of 1705, and were evidently connected with the state of the Cathedral Chapter, in which much laxity prevailed <sup>1</sup>.

The Bishop's Court was refreshingly speedy.

The Clergy were under strict discipline, and so were the Laity. Chancellor Price records the case of a Baronet brought before him as the Bishop's official for incontinency. In pronouncing judgment he thus addressed him:—"I shall not attempt to revive the exemplary discipline of former times, when they punished crimes of this kind with thrice surrounding the Parish Church for 3 several Sundays, and sometimes thrice round the market place on 3 market days in high market time bare foot in the then strict habit of penitents, covered with a sheet, and carrying a white wand. But I do decree that you shall make a public confession of y<sup>r</sup> fault in a form agreeable to y<sup>r</sup> case, in a white sheet before the Congregation immediately after the Niceen Creed, in the Cath¹ Church of Worcester, on Sunday the 26th inst., and in the Parish Church of Salford, on Sunday the 2nd Oct. next."

We wonder if the erring Baronet performed his penance.

When did this 'exemplary' discipline die out?

In addressing another delinquent, Chancellor Price used these striking words:—

"There is no wash good for stains of this kind but tears, sorrow and repentance."

And to a third he finishes his sentence with this searching word of warning:—

"Take heed that all this be not ridiculed in your next mirth1."

In those days TRAVELLING was a matter of difficulty—the roads were execrable. Four or six horses must have been needed to drag the Bishop's carriage through the muddy lanes of Oxfordshire and Warwickshire.

In coming from London he generally 'lay' at Maidenhead, 26 miles, then at Sunningwell, near Abingdon, where his son was Vicar, then at Oxford. The next stage generally brought him to the confines of his Diocese, and if he did not stay at Shipston or elsewhere to confirm, he reached Worcester, 110 miles, on the 5th day, sleeping four nights on the way. (The express train does it now, without stopping, in two hours and a quarter.)

Francis Evans travelled faster, for he almost always rode on horseback—as indeed everybody did except the very rich. He occasionally took the stage-coach. It held only five or six passengers, for nobody could go on the top because of the swinging of the coach. Even then he had to spend two nights between Worcester and London.

PUBLIC EVENTS are incidentally noted in the Diary. For example, the death of King William III., the entry of the Venetian Ambassador into London, 23rd April, 1706, the founding of Queen Anne's Bounty, Parliamentary Elections, the Embassy to Denmark <sup>2</sup>, &c.

The Diary notices some CURIOUS CUSTOMS.

For example, the Bishop in those days was empowered to grant licences to *surgeons*. It was an old custom. Many years before, the Rector of Hartlebury was licensed by his father-in-law, Bishop Thornborough of Worcester, to practise medicine, and when he was turned out of his living at the Rebellion, he took to doctoring his parishioners and thus supported himself during the Commonwealth.

Bishop Lloyd frequently granted licences to surgeons. Here is a case in point:—

"Henry Chance of Mary Cleeve, in the Parish of Bidford, was licensed by the Chanc<sup>r</sup> to practise chirurgery by letting of blood and drawing of teeth, having subscribed to the 39 Articles!"

What a precaution! How consoling to know that the man who nearly bled you to death, or dragged you round the room in his effort to draw your tooth was at any rate an undoubted member of the Church of England!

Another custom worth noting was the immense length of sermons. The Bishop on one occasion preached *for two hours* in Hartlebury Church <sup>1</sup>, and afterwards ordained six Deacons and three Priests!

THE POVERTY OF THE CLERGY was very great. A curate was "passing rich" when he received £40 a year, often he had to be content with £24. Rectors and Vicars were not much better off. Queen Anne on her birthday announced her generous gift to the poorer benefices of Tenths and First-fruits, which is still known as Queen Anne's Bounty, and the Bishop had to make a return of all Livings in the Diocese which would benefit by her kindness<sup>2</sup>. A list is given of the Livings in the gift of the Bishop of Worcester<sup>3</sup>. Some were exceedingly small: St. Helen's, Worcester, was valued at £30 a year, Elmley Castle at £20. Fladbury is set down as the largest; it was worth £450 a year. Hartlebury is put at £250.

In consequence of the poverty of the Clergy, the Bishop often granted dispensations to men to hold two or more Livings. It was needful then, and it may become needful again. Chancellor Price, a high-minded and sensible man, defends the practice. "Take away pluralities," he says in his "Notitia," "and you take away worthy priests; take away those and you overthrow the Church."

A pitiful picture is drawn in the Diary of the poverty of the Clergy; witness this entry:—

"My Ld's Certificate wch he gave the Vicar of Hales Owen's wife wth 30s. towds repairing the Vicarage House.

"I know the Vicarage of Hales Owen within my Diocese has a large Cure of Soules belonging to it, and is but meanly endowed, and I have been informed and doe believe that Mr Thomas Jukes, Vicar there, who is a diligent Conscientious man, and performs

his Duty well, has a charge of seaven children, and can very ill bear the addic'onall charge that is fal'n upon him of repairing the Vicarage House, for w<sup>ch</sup> reason I have contributed towards it, taking it to be a work of Christian charity.

"This at his wife's desire I have thought fit to certify under my hand this 22<sup>th</sup> day of November, 1705.

"W. Worcester."

There is a world of pathos in those words, "at his wife's desire." Poor thing! The thought of her "seaven children" drove her to seek the assistance which the Vicar could not bring himself to ask.

Some of the Bishoprics were of small value, and were held with other preferment. The Bishop of Oxford was allowed to retain the Deanery of Worcester, and a Bishop of Gloucester held the Living of Hartlebury. There is a letter inserted in the Diary from Bishop Lloyd:—"To my much honoured Friend S<sup>r</sup> John Bridgeman, Barronet, at Castle Bromwich in Warwickshire," reminding him of the good intention of his Father to attach the great Living of Wigan to the Bishopric of Chester.

Thanks to the work of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners there are no longer the glaring contrasts there used to be between the incomes of the English sees.

In those days PARTY FEELING was intensely strong. The names Whig and Tory, High Church and Low Church, were newly invented, and involved greater issues than ever since. It was not a question of Liberal principles or Conservative principles, but of adherence to a Protestant or a Roman Catholic sovereign.

The Trial of Dr. Sacheverell, whom Smollett calls "a clergyman of narrow intellect and over heated imagination," but who won the public ear by his fervid eloquence and striking delivery, created an amount of excitement difficult for us to estimate. His trial in Westminster Hall lasted for three weeks, and it is said that Queen Anne herself attended it each day. The names of four personages who took part in it appear in the Diary:— LORD GODOLPHIN, who instituted the prosecution, LORD CHANCELLOR COWPER, who presided at the Trial, and voted against Sacheverell, CHIEF JUSTICE

NATHAN WRIGHT, who was Junior Counsel for the Crown, and BISHOP TALBOT of Oxford (Dean of Worcester), who was one of the four bishops in the House of Lords who were for condemning him.

When Sacheverell came to Worcester in his triumphal progress after his release from prison, Bishop Lloyd would not allow the bells to be rung in his honour 1.

At election times men were carried off their feet by passionate

party spirit.

Bishop Lloyd and his son were accused by Sir John Pakington in the House of Commons; not of bribery, for both parties did that freely enough, but of hindering his election by unwarrantable interference, and of slandering his character.

Sir John, who is thought to be the original of Addison's Sir Roger de Coverley, was a man of distinction in Worcestershire—a high Tory, very honest, but with some absurdities which endeared him to his friends. The Bishop, in a letter to the Vicar of Inkborough, published in the evidence given at the Bar of the House of Commons in 1702, writes thus:—

"You cannot but have heard, and probably have seen, how the Bishops of this Church in general, and 5 or 6 of them in particular, have been abused with impudent Lies in two Libels that were published by Sir John Pakington almost a Year since, in order to his last Election.

"At that time I had not given him the least Provocation; and for the other abused Bishops, few of them knew his Face. Since that time, finding at my Return from London, where I was all the while he was libelling me in the Country, that he had published these Libels, some of them with his own Hands, and the rest by his Agents, I could not but think myself obliged by all honest ways to oppose his Election."

Accordingly the Bishop caused his Secretary to write the following letter to his different bailiffs.

"Whitehall, 15 Nov., 1701.

"M" \* \* \* \*

"My Ld desires you'l go to every Person within his Mannor of \* \* \* \* \* that have votes, and desire them to appear at the

next Election for Members of Parliam<sup>t</sup> and vote for M<sup>r</sup> Bromley and M<sup>r</sup> Walsh; his Lo<sup>p</sup> knows of no other that will stand except S<sup>r</sup> John Packington, and his Lo<sup>p</sup> does not think him as fit a Person to y<sup>e</sup> King and Countrey as either of the other two. His Lo<sup>p</sup> desires you'l take an acc<sup>t</sup> of y<sup>e</sup> names of all such as will vote at his Lo<sup>p</sup>'s request, and keep it by you, and let them know he'l hold himself obliged to them.

"I am,
"Yor Friend and Servt,
"ffra. Evans.

Sir John Pakington made a serious complaint in the House of Commons "against the Lord Bishop of Worcester and Mr Lloyd his Son, relating to the Rights and Privileges of the House of Commons." He accused the Bishop and his son of aspersing him and his ancestors, and stated that the Bishop's Secretary also aspersed him to several Freeholders in the like manner, representing him as unfit to Sit in the House, threatening them with the Bishop's Displeasure; and said they might as well vote for the Prince of Wales as for him!

One of the chief witnesses whom Sir John brought against the Bishop was the Rector of Hampton Lovett, the Rev. Charles Stephens. This gentleman, who was Sir John's domestic Chaplain, was much beholden to him. His letters, now in Lord Hampton's possession, are all couched in very obsequious language. In one of these he writes of "the ill practices made use of at the last poll," and remarks, "We do hear of some Persons who have received letters from the Bishop of Worcester, but it was to none he sent but such as he has some sort of obligation upon; so that it will be difficult, if possible, to gain some of his letters unless you have a compulsory power of sending for Persons, Papers, and Records."... "I have no more to add but to return you my humble thanks for your noble present of oysters, which were the best that ever were eaten." In a P.S. he adds:

"The story of M<sup>r</sup>. Walsh's being a Socinian awakens y<sup>e</sup> clergy; but for letters to charge their Bishop, you can't expect it from 'em."

He signs himself: "Your most obedient and faithful humble servant."

On another occasion he writes: "Your generosity to me in sending me so noble a present of oysters is far beyond what I had any occasion to expect or deserve from you. I can but return you my most humble and hearty thanks for this and all favours, with assurances that I shall never be wanting whenever it shall be in my power to serve you most faithfully to my utmost."

The House of Commons being strongly Tory at the time, without hearing any evidence on the Bishop's side,

"Resolved

- "That Sir John Pakington has by Evidence fully made out the charge which he exhibited against the Lord Bishop of Worcester.
  - " Resolved
- "That Sir John Pakington has by evidence fully made out the charge against Mr. Lloyd, the said Lord Bishop's son.
  - "Resolved
- "That it appears to this House, That the Proceedings of William, Lord Bishop of Worcester, his Son and his Agents, in order to the hindering the Election of a Member for the County of Worcester, has been Malicious, Unchristian, and Arbitrary, in high Violation of the Liberties and Privileges of the Commons of England.
  - " Resolved
- "That a humble Address be presented to Her Majesty, That She will be Graciously pleased to Remove William Lord Bishop of Worcester from being Lord Almoner to Her Majesty."
- "Ordered, That the said Resolutions and Address be Presented to Her Majesty by such Members of this House as are of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy-Council."
- "Ordered, That the further Consideration of the Matter relating to the Lord Bishop of Worcester be adjourned till this day sevenight.
- "Ordered, That Mr. Attorney General do prosecute Mr. Lloyd, the Lord Bishop of Worcester's son, for his said offences, after his Privilege as a Member of the Lower House of Convocation is out."

Two days afterwards Her Majesty "was pleased to give this most gracious answer."

I am very sorry that there is occasion for this Address against the Bishop of Worcester: I shall Order and Direct that he shall

no longer continue to supply the Place of Almoner, but I will put another in his room to perform that Office.

It is curious to find how these proceedings were viewed by men of opposite parties. Some were overjoyed at Sir John's triumph, others took the Bishop's side as strongly, and spoke of him as a martyr.

The Diary shows that although the Bishop was removed from his post of Almoner, he was not banished from Court.

"1704, Sept. 12, Tuesday. My L<sup>d</sup> waited on the Queen at Windsor, and had an hour and a half's audience, and her Ma<sup>ty</sup> was pleased to bespeak a dinner for his Lo<sup>p</sup>; and he returned y<sup>t</sup> night by Torchlight to Maidenhead."

Nor did the proceedings lead to any permanent breach with Sir John himself, for the Secretary notes:—

"1706, Sept. 15, Sunday. Sr John Packington and his Lady visited my L<sup>d</sup> at Hartlebury, and brought his Daughters to be confirmed by his Lop."

And a few days afterwards, "Sept. 25, Friday. My L<sup>a</sup> and Lady dined with S<sup>r</sup> Jo<sup>n</sup> Pakington at Westwood."

The Diary ends abruptly. The last entry is in Feb., 170%. Yet Francis Evans continued to note the number of deer in the Park for two more years, until 30 June, 1709.

The Editor has received much help and information from many kind friends, especially from the Rev. J. Bowstead Wilson, Rector of Knightwick, Rev. Canon Bigg, Professor of Ecclesiastical History in the University of Oxford, The Lady Hampton, The Hon. Hugh Pakington, Rev. Albert Watson, late Principal of Brasenose, Rev. Dr. Gibbins, Headmaster of Kidderminster Grammar School.

He is indebted to the Headmaster of Hartlebury Grammar School, E. W. Hopewell, Esq., for photographs of Bishop Lloyd and Sir John Pakington.

Whilst I was in London my L<sup>d</sup> writ a letter to his clergy, and printed it, and sent one to every Clergyman in his Diocese, and printed 2,000 copies of the Accounts of the several kinds of Societies, got up of late years, for the promoting of God's worship, for the Reformation of manners, and for the Propagating of Christian Knowledge, and distributed them in his Visitations abt his Diocese.

# For my very Dear and much Honoured Brethren, The Clergy of the Diocese of Worcester<sup>1</sup>.

MY REVEREND BRETHREN,

You cannot so soon have forgot the Truly Pious and Prudent Advice and Exhortation, which, about a Twelvemonth since, was sent in a Circular Letter by our most Reverend Primate 2 throughout his whole Province; and which was some while after communicated by me to all the Clergy of this Diocese in my Primary Visitation. And yet the best way to keep a good Lesson in Memory being to put it speedily in Practice, this, I must needs say, as to our following this wholesom Advice, has been much wanting hitherto in those parts where You and I are concerned. I am very sensible that this Defect has been chiefly occasioned by my long, tho' necessary, Absence out of the Diocese: Wherefore being now upon my Return thither, and desiring very earnestly to make up that Defect, I send this Letter before me to bespeak your Assistance; being Resolved, by the Grace of God, with all the Power and Interest that I have among you, to set forward those Designs which I know to be so much for God's Glory, and the Edification of His Church.

The Methods proposed for these Purposes by our most Reverend Primate are all of them such as will require your most constant Endeavours and Prayers. But some of them do also require frequent Meetings among your selves, together with those of the Laiety, whose hearts God shall stir up to come in to your Assistance. And for the last thing in His Grace's Letter, that is, the

Religious Education of Children (which indeed is a Principal Part of your Duty), this will require something more than all the rest, of any one that will thoroughly and conscientiously discharge it: For unless your care of this sort of Education be so short as to leave out them that most need it, the Poor Children that are left on Parish-Charge, or that have Parents so poor that they cannot pay for their Teaching, you will find that the Care of Providing for the Education of these lies chiefly charged upon you, by the Laws both Divine and Human. Not that it can be expected that you should bear the Charge of this Provision, whereas, which is a thing indeed to be lamented, too many of your selves are so slenderly provided for, that you have scarce enough for your own Families: But where God has given you wherewith to contribute to this Charge, there no doubt you ought to do it according to your Ability; and the less any of you can spare of your own, the more diligent you ought to be in getting your Neighbours of the Laiety to contribute towards it.

How great a Publick Blessing would it be, if there were in every Parish in this Church and Kingdom, a sufficient Number of good discreet Masters and Dames, maintained with Publick Salaries for the Teaching of Male and Female Children, a-part, to Read and to say their Catechism, and as many of them as were capable to learn an Exposition thereof; and where the Contribution would be sufficient, to teach them also to Write, and to do such little Works as would Enable them to live by their Labour! Happy are they that are God's Instruments for the procuring of such a Blessing in the Parishes where He has placed them! But where that cannot be attained, nor hoped for, yet I must needs tell you, my good Brethren, you ought to do what you can towards it in your several Parishes, where there are Poor Children that need such a Help and Provision. And the less need you have in your own Parishes, the more helpful you may and ought to be to the poor Market-Towns in your Neighbourhood, which (as it commonly happens) are so overburdened with Poor, they need some Support from their Neighbours to keep them from the utmost Disorder and Beggery.

It is my Intention, (with God's Assistance), this Summer, to Preach and Confirm in every Market-Town in my Diocese; and it is my earnest Desire to see the Face of every one of you in the Town that lies nearest his Habitation, or to which he can come with the least Inconvenience to himself, and to the Children that he shall bring with him for Confirmation.

This I promise my self of all my good Brethren, and shall not take it well of any one that fails me in this, that for all the Children in your Parish that are above Ten Years Old, and have not received Confirmation, you either have already prepared them for that Duty, or will do your utmost to prepare them for it, by making them perfect in their Catechism, before the Time of my coming into your Neighbourhood: And that, when I am come to the Church in which you would have them Confirmed, you will deliver in their Names to my Chaplain, and be present with them your self till that Duty is over.

I shall also desire your Presence at my Lodging, all the Time between Morning and Evening Prayer, to the End that I may there be informed by you of all those things which you think fit I should know for the Service of the Church, as far as you have either heard by Common Fame, or can tell me from your own Observation. No doubt there are many things otherwise than they should be in your Neighbourhood, as well as in all other Places in this World. There are things amiss which ought to be Corrected: There are things wanting which ought to be supplied: There are many good things that are capable of being improved. Whatsoever you impart to me of any of these kinds, I shall serve the Church in it to the utmost of my Power; and I shall do it much the Better, for the good Advice and Assistance which I have reason to expect, and doubt not to receive, from all my good Brethren at these Meetings, Which, as you will see by the Table here Annex'd¹, I have so much set my

Therefore to quicken yor backwardnesse, I do hereby require

a complaint from the Poor Sufferers by the fire at Warwick 1 that they have had no account from ye ArchDeacon of Worcester of the Collection made for their relief in this Diocese, and his Lop is also informed that the acct and money lyes in yor hands. That in the time of the late civill wars and upon the burning of the Suburbs of the City of Worcester when that City was be-

sieged, several poor people, by the authority of those times, and the charitable consent of the then Inhabitants of the said Parish, did erect several cottages upon the Wasts of yor said Mannors of Whistones and Claynes, we'h have ever since bin made up, by the authority of the officers of the said Parish, for such Poor of the said Parish as have received Alms, or otherwise such as would have become chargeable if not supported by such habitac'ons, untill of late years several persons, surreptitiously obtaining leases from some of yor Lop's Pr'decessors, endeavour to alter the property of the said cottages to the great prjudice of the said Parish of Claynes.

That particularly in the time of the late Bishop Thomas <sup>1</sup> such practices were then made use of, and the then tenants, petic'oning the said B<sup>p</sup>, his Lo<sup>p</sup> was pleased to answer that care should be taken to prevent such Practices for the future.

That by these means yor Petic'oners are forced to pay considerable Rents for habitac'ons for severall of the Poor of the said Parish.

That by the Statute 31° Eliz. cap. 7<sup>th</sup>, none shall erect a cottage w<sup>th</sup>out laying *four Acres* of Freehold land near unto it to be occupyed therewith, on pain of ten pounds, and forty shillings each month continuance.

That by the Statute 43 Eliz. ca. 2<sup>d</sup>, the offic<sup>rs</sup> of the Parish, by y<sup>e</sup> consent of y<sup>e</sup> L<sup>d</sup> of y<sup>e</sup> Mannor, under his hand and seale, either by themselves, by virtue of a sessions order, may erect Cottages on y<sup>e</sup> Wast for the benefit of the Poor, but those cottages shall not afterwards be otherwise imployed.

That yor Petic'oners conceive the s<sup>d</sup> Cottages were erected according to the Charitable intent of the laws, but wanting the consent of the L<sup>d</sup>, in due forme (w<sup>ch</sup> could not in those troublesome times be obtained) many suites and other inconveniences do arise, to the p<sup>r</sup>judice of yor Petic'oners.

Therefore yor Petic'oners humbly pray yor Lop would be pleased to grant such Confirmation of the said Cottages, within the said Parish of Claines, as may be effectuall by, and with the consent of the Officers of the said Parish, to appropriate the said

My Ld's answer to the sd Petic'on.

Whitehall, 26 Nov., 1700.

Gentlemen,

I am very sensible of the burthen of the Poor that lyes upon you; and believe w<sup>t</sup> you tell me in yo<sup>r</sup> Petic'on, that much of it is and has bin occasioned by the erecting of so many Cottages on the Wasts of that Lo<sup>p</sup>, and placing Inhabitants in them by the Officers of the Parish without due regard to the Lawes of the land, and afterwards the L<sup>ds</sup> granting those Cottages in lease to such poor people as have bin com'ended to them by those whom they look to mind the good of the Parish, as the conveniences of those Poor People.

But however this has come to passe, the burthen being now so heavy on the Parish as you tell me, I am very willing to do  $\mathbf{w}^t$  I can, by any lawfull and prudent wayes, to make it easyer.

But withall I must desire you to do wt you can for yrselves, and therefore I offer these things following to yr considerac'on.

I. First as to those that are antient Inhabitants among you, and have leases of their Cottages, there is no way of dealing with them that I know, but that you take care that they take in no inmates; and that when any of them ask relief of the Parish, before you grant that, you may oblige them to make over their leases to the Overseers or Churchwardens for the use of the Parish. That you may be sure that I make no profit of those leases, I do here promise you I will never renew any of them that shall happen to fall in my time.

II. 2<sup>dly</sup>. I would advise you to take a particular Account of all the Cottages, and all the Inhabitants that dwell in them; and if any of them as Foreigners that have no legall settlement among you, such may be removed by order from the Justices; and if they are not so removed, it is the fault of the Officers of the Parish. And when any old People that are in Cottages dye, it concerns you to take care that no young people be permitted to come in to succeed them. This might be easily obtained if, when any such occasion should happen, any of you that knows it would give my Bayliff notice of it, to the end that he may lock up any such cottage that falls void; and then, if he gives me notice of it, as he ought, I will give my consent for the pulling of it down, or removing any other poor family that live in a worse or more inconvenient Cottage into that better, and so let the worse or more inconvenient be pulled down.

III. 3<sup>dly</sup>. It happens too often that yong people are taken home out of their services to look after their aged parents in cottages; and then they marry, and so keep up a succession of beggars, whereas if the Parishioners would employ and pay poor people that are not yet come to be impotent, to attend and take care of them that are impotent, it would be more advantageous for them.

Tho. possibly at the first this may seem to make the charge more burthensome to them, yet within a few years you would find it to be a great ease and benefit to  $y^r$  Parish.

IV. 4<sup>thly</sup>. There is another thing in yo<sup>r</sup> power by the stat. w<sup>ch</sup> you mention 31 Eliz. c. 7.

If you please to take an acct of all the Cottages in yor Parish, you are by that Statute able to reduce them into a lesser number; but you are so far from it, that, as far as I can learn, there has not bin any one such Cottage presented at any of my Leets, weh is a proper place to present them. If such Cottages, and such persons as receive Inmates into their Houses or Cottages were presented at such times, I would oblige my Steward to do his part to suppresse those cottages as the Law directs; and if need be, to punish the offenders.

V. 5<sup>thlŷ</sup>. I hope I need not desire you to take care that no more Cottages be erected than what are already in your Parish: If there be any erected in my time, it will be entirely your own

fault, for I do assure you I will never consent to the building of any, otherwise than pursuant to the Statute of 43 Eliz. c. 2 w<sup>ch</sup> you also mention in yo<sup>r</sup> Petic'on.

VI. 6<sup>thly</sup>. I would also advise you to see what poor children there are in yo<sup>r</sup> Parish that are brought up at Parish Charge, or whose Parents receive yo<sup>r</sup> relief; and to cause those children, whether boys or girls, as many as you can get Masters or Mistresses for, to be bound apprentices as soon as they are of age for it; and so to be brought up to husbandry, and housewifery, as the Statute directs.

Those who are thus enured from their childhood to earn their Living in an honest Vocation, will be useful on many accounts to the People among whom they live; especially if care be taken in the placing out of Apprentices, that you do not breed up more of yor Parish in any one Trade than there is work for, unless you Apprentice them in other Parishes, for then you are no farther concerned in them by Law, because wheresoever any one is bound apprentice and has served his time, there by Law he has his settlement.

This will shew that I am ready and willing to do all that in me lyes to make you easier. If you follow my advice in the things that are here written, I hope there will be good effect of it. I am sure there will if you are not very much wanting yorselves.

I beseech God to direct you to the best in all things for yor own good, both temporall and eternall, It is the hearty prayer of Gentlemen.

1701, My L<sup>d</sup> Bishop and M<sup>r</sup> Stillingfleet <sup>1</sup> having entered into Aug. 18. Bonds of £200 penalty to stand to the award of M<sup>r</sup> Archdeacon Ashenhurst, Rector of Kingswinford, if they would agree and make their award before ye 29<sup>th</sup> instant, and in case they could not, M<sup>r</sup> Chancellor Price was to be umpire, and to make his award before the 31<sup>st</sup> instant.

found there, M<sup>r</sup> Stillingfleet is to buy wt is necessary and convenient to put the Pale in sufficient repair, and to be at the charge of all carriage, and in regard my L<sup>d</sup> B<sup>p</sup> has bin above 2 y<sup>rs</sup> Bishop of this Diocese, it was agreed that he should bear such a proportionable charge tow<sup>ds</sup> y<sup>e</sup> workmanship as M<sup>r</sup> Chancellor Price shall think fit to order

They agreed that Mr Stillingfleet should pay £13 11s. 3d. tow<sup>ds</sup> finishing some roomes in ye north side of ye Pallace at Hartlebury that were not finished, and towards some small repairs to be made in ye stable.

I find your Father was admitted tenant to it, and is long since dead, I find yor Mother, who had her widdow's estate, has bin also long dead, and that the Reversion by the Copy was granted to yor 2 elder Brothers and yrself successively, and that you are last in the Copy.

It does not appear to me that my Ld has any tenant legally

possessed of that Estate, and if speedy care be not taken to p<sup>r</sup>vent it, I must enter upon it, and eject you, and do the Bishoprick right.

I am told you have a Warr<sup>t</sup> to make a new assess<sup>t</sup> pursuant to the late Act, and I hope you will obey it, and thereby do right not only to my L<sup>d</sup> but his tenants. If you do not, you can only create trouble to yo<sup>r</sup>self and yo<sup>r</sup> neighbors, w<sup>ch</sup> I hope you'l p<sup>r</sup>vent, for my L<sup>d</sup> will not pay the tax laid upon him, and he cannot be compelled to.

Dudley School.

Whitehall, 18 Nov., 1701.

Gentlemen,

I have heard that you have workt for Cole in the schoolland, and that it does not appear to others what profit the work has yielded, nor how you have disposed of the money raised by it. It is my duty to enquire into all publick Charities, and to see that they be disposed of according to the Founder's Intention. Therefore I desire you to let me know the truth of these matters.

And withall I desire you to let me know what care is taken in setting and letting the Houses and Lands belonging to y<sup>r</sup> School.

Being also informed that there is now neer expiring a Lease

of a House belonging to yor school, which is now let at or about £4 a year, and may be raised to 12 or £16 a year, in case some money be laid out for the improvemt of it; I desire to know the truth of this; And if this Information be true, I would know whether you cannot both renew the Lease and make this Improvemt out of the profits of the cole works.

It is too likely that there may be mismanagem<sup>ts</sup> of that school estate, and it cannot be otherwise, if it be true, that I hear, that you do not meet together but very seldome: which you ought to do at least quarterly, to consider what may be done in order to the due performance of the Trust reposed in you as Trustees of the s<sup>d</sup> school.

I hope to receive so good an account from you, as that I may not need to give myself nor you any further trouble concerning these matters. But if I have not a sufficient account sent me hither to London before my coming out of Town, I shall think myself obliged at my next coming into the country to bring a Com'ission of Charitable Uses with me, for the regulating of that charity at Dudley, and of such other charities as cannot well be regulated otherwise.

This I think fit to let you know, hoping you will take it aright that what I do is only in discharge of my Duty, and to see that you do yours; that so both you and I may have the Comfort of it, when wee come to give our account to the great Judge of the world, to whose Grace I heartily com'end you in my Prayers, and remain,

In answer to the letter on the former page my L<sup>d</sup> received a very respectful and civil letter from M<sup>r</sup> Jonathan Taylor, M<sup>r</sup> Oliver Shaw, Oliver Dixon, Joseph Finch, and W<sup>m</sup> Bach, 5 of the Trustees of the s<sup>d</sup> School, and in the later end of January, my L<sup>d</sup> writ a letter to the Trustees, a copy whereof follows, I know not y<sup>e</sup> day by reason I had not then leisure to transcribe it, but kept y<sup>e</sup> draft.

Whitehall, Jan. 1701.

Gentlemen,

Having receiv<sup>d</sup> yo<sup>r</sup> letter of the 23<sup>d</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> in answer to mine of y<sup>e</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> of November last, and finding therein a fair acc<sup>t</sup> of w<sup>t</sup> things you have done in performance of yo<sup>r</sup> trust, I cannot but tell you I am very much satisfied with it, and do therefore return you my very hearty thanks.

There remains one thing more to be done for the securing of this Charity while it is in such good hands, for fear it should not come into the like in after times; that is, to make up a perfect Rentrole of all houses, lands, and tenements that belong to your school, shewing where everything therein mentioned lies, with the bounds and abutmts as near as you can, and shewing in whose Possession every particular now is, at wt rent, and wt would be the utmost improved value of everything in yr said Rentroll. If these things were set down in so many several columns, it would be the better understood. But however you order it, if all these things are very particularly and deffinitely set down for the full and cleer Information of them that come after you, it will be a worthy work, for wch God will reward you, and posterity will praise him for the benefit they will receive by it.

I do heartily recom'end you to God, and not doubting yor concurrence in so good a work.

Moreton Bagot. My L<sup>d/8</sup> answer to M<sup>r</sup> John Goodwin, Rector of Moreton Bagot's petic'on, and to several Clergymen's request for restoring him from a suspension for 3 years 1, w<sup>ch</sup> his L<sup>p</sup> caused him to be put under.

My good Brethren,

I received a paper signed by you all, in behalf of Mr Goodwin of Moreton Bagot, to desire me to take off his suspension, and restore him to his Livelyhood. They are 2 different things that you ask, one is to restore him to the exercise of his Ministry; the other is to take off the Sequestration that is laid on the profits of that Rectory.

The arguments by w<sup>ch</sup> you are moved to intercede for him, and by w<sup>ch</sup> you would move me to do what you ask in his behalf, are likewise two. One is, because he is of mean judgm<sup>t</sup> in outward things, and easy to be imposed upon; the other is, compassion to his great old age.

This last argument I ought to consider more than you, being older than any of you, and perhaps not younger than Mr Goodwin. But I thank God my old age has not yet disabled me from doing my duty, as his has unqualified him for a Cure of souls, having left him neither Divinity nor learning, if ever he had any; we I do so much question that I am sorry for those Bishops that gave him holy Orders and Institucions into a Church Living. I have that under his hand which they would be ashamed to see, if they were now alive; and if you saw it you would be ashamed to move for his being restored to the exercise of his Ministry.

And yet in your other Inducem<sup>t</sup> to write for him, you say he is of mean judgm<sup>t</sup> in outward things; as if you took him to be of great judgm<sup>t</sup> in spirituall matters; tho' I think none of you can be of that opinion; I take it rather that you mean, he is of no judgm<sup>t</sup> in spiritualls, and of very little judgm<sup>t</sup> in any other.

What Churchman but he would have worn yellow fringes on his sleeves at the ArchDeacon's Visitac'on? and that taken off from the pulpit cushion, as if he had a mind to make himself ridiculous to the people? I passe by his reading the Litany with the Responses, and other such senseless things which some of you know of him.

In accordance with Canon 62.

You do also say, that he is easy to be imposed on. This agrees wth wt I have heard of him, that either drunk or sober, he is very apt to be fooled out of all he has. The meanwhile his Parsonage House and the buildings about it, as I understand, are very much out of repair. And though he being fitter to be a day labourer than a minister, doth as I hear mend the thatch with his own hands as well as he can; yet for wt requires a workman he cannot afford to be at the charge; and the worst is that, when he dyes, there will be nothing to answer for Dilapidations.

These things being considered, though I am very willing to shew him all the favour I can, yet I must think how to do it without wronging the Church, for which I am to give account to the great Shepherd of Souls. You would have me take off his suspension, woh is his punishmt according to the Canon for the Crimes hereafter mentioned.

But in case I should do this it would do him hurt rather than good. For having done this in compassion to him, as you desire, I must afterwards, in justice to the Soules of the People, appoint him a Coadjutor, and that must be done by an Act of the Ecclesi'all Cort, weh will put him to a much greater charge. The sparing of this charge by continuing the Suspension is really a favour, whatever he thinks of it. And then for the Sequestration, wch you would have me recall; it must necessarily be continued, both for the paying of the Coadjutor, and also for the putting the Parsonage house and buildings into sufficient repair. But for the manageing of this in such sort that he may have a good surplusage for his subsistence, I desire some of you to undertake it, or that you'l name 2 or 3 such honest men as you judge fittest to be trusted with the sequestration. I am told they may very well afford him a surplusage of £30 a year, with which he may live perhaps better than he did with his whole Rectory. One thing I could not but observe all along in this man's talk, and I see it also in his writings, he has still been complaining of his hard usage, as if he had been utterly undone; and yet since I first took cognizance of him, he has had the whole profits of his Living to himself, and not bin at any charge that I know, but for his own Proctor's Fees, weh are very inconsiderable, and his journeys, most of weh he might have spared if he had pleased, whereas he that shall serve ye Cure of that Church must serve it a great while for

nothing, and at last, if this man dyes before the next harvest, he will be in danger of loosing all his salary.

But such complaints I must endure, and clamors also, sometimes for nothing else than doing my duty, and then I must have the trouble of satisfying others (as I hope I have satisfyed you) by writing Apologies when I have no time to spare. It has pleased God to call me to this, and I submit to it.

Mr. Goodwin marryed John Fisher, an Inhabitant of Evesham, and Mary Hobday, an Inhabitant of Henley, without any license so to do, tho' neither of them were of his Parish; and tho' Mary Hobday's Banes were published at Wootton, wen was mother Church of Henley, yet Fisher's Banes were never published at Evesham, as they ought to have bin, therefore this was plainly a Clandestine marriage; and it was so much the worse, because, as I am informed, he marryed them about 5 in the morning, whereas he could not have marryed them before 8, tho' he had a License.

To the end therefore that the p'sent Incumbents of the said small Rectoryes and Vicarages may have the effect of Her Matie's gratious intention towards them, I do hereby desire yor Lop will please to transmit to me a Certificate of wt is due and owing to Her Maty from such poor Rectoryes or Vicarages as aforesaid wthin yor Diocese. In obedience to yor Lop's com'ands in yor letter of the first of July last I doe hereby certify yor Lop that the Rectoryes, Vicarages and Chapelries hereafter mencioned are of small value, not exceeding thirty pounds per Annum by the most improved valuac'ons of the same, to the best of my Informac'on, and that the Ministers that serve the Cure of those Churches may, as I believe in respect of their poverty, be true objects of Her Matie's Royal Compassion, I doe also certify that where Vicarages are above ten pounds yearly value in the Queen's Books, and under thirty pounds improved value, I do not know that I can get any one to take Instituc'on to such, by reason of the charge and trouble of Firstfruits weh they are lyable to pay im'ediately upon Instituc'on. But whereas yor Lop has been pleased to demand wt arrears are due and owing from these poor Rectoryes and Vicarages to Her Maty in arrear of tenths, I know not how to answer it, because I have only a generall charge of the totall sume of arrears from the Auditor, and have not been able to obtain it in particular,

A copy of my L<sup>d</sup>'s letter to Mr. Vernon, Rector of Redmil in Leicestershire, who has my L<sup>d</sup> Rutland's <sup>1</sup> Prsentac'on to the Vicarage of Pillerton in Warwickshire, and holds it only by a Sequestration.

Sr,

At my Visitac'on at Stratford in July, 1702, appeared no Curate for Pillerton. But the day after there came to me one that called himself Thomas Woodcock, and shewed me Deacon's orders to one of that name, telling me that you had hired him in Leicesterss for the serving of that Cure. But having had an account of him from several of that neighborhood, that he was an idle drunken fellow, company for any Tinker or Cratcarier<sup>2</sup>, and particularly that at

Easter last he was drunk 4 days in Passion Week, and 4 days again in Easter Week; which charge he could not answer, I therefore forbade him serving any Cure in my Diocese.

Since that time Pillerton has been served by  $M^r$  Geo. Edwards, and after him by  $M^r$  Gryffith, both of them put in by yor friend  $M^r$  Fancourt, who gave them their board for helping them in his schoole, that they might the better live upon yor allowance of £20 a year.

But that allowance of yours has not been fully paid to either of them. The arrear that they charge you with you will see in the enclosed. There is also a charge upon you from the Eccl'icall Cort for yor neglects of yor duty in that place.

And all this while you hold the place only by sequestration from that Eccl'icall Cort.

What shall I do with such a riddle of a man as you are? Shall I recall the sequestrac'on? Then all this debt is lost to the Parties concerned, and you are cut off from that help of livelihood that yor friends intended you in this place. But if I continue it, I know not how to answer it to God. For either the Cure of Souls will be unsupplied; or they that supply it will be cheated of their salary, as those poor men have been, by yor supine negligence, minding nothing but yor humor and yor Lusts. I beseech God to mend it for yor soul's sake.

The only way I can think of to remedy this, will be to write to my L<sup>d</sup> Granby <sup>1</sup>, to beg of him that he will accept of the sequestration to his Steward, y<sup>t</sup> may both pay off this Bill, and make a Provision for the supplying of the Cure, till such time as his Lop shall think fit to p<sup>r</sup>sent one to be instituted to the Vicarage.

This I have determined to do within a month of this p<sup>r</sup>sent, that wee may be at a certainty for the serving of y<sup>e</sup> Cure at Easter next; unless you will within that time either pay or secure the Debt in this paper, and thereby gain credit enough to be trusted for the farther serving of y<sup>e</sup> Cure.

I pity yor poor wife and children, but much more yorself, to whom God has given good gifts for better purposes than you apply them to.

My Ld's letter to the Govern's of Dudley School.

Hartlebury, 13 Aug., 1705.

Gentlemen,

Yor letter of the 23<sup>rd</sup> of December, 1701, gave me so much satisfaction that I did hope I needed not to have given you any further trouble upon the account of yor School. But upon enquiry into the present state of it I am informed that the Leases of many of the small houses belonging to yor School are either expired or near expiring, and therefore I take this oportunity of minding you of yor promise to me in yor before mentioned letter, of continuing yor endeavors to improve the School Revenue by advancing the Rents proportionably to what they may reasonably desire.

It will be considerable to yor schoolmr if you add to his stipend but 4 or 5 £ a year, weh I hope you will do, and yet let the tenants have reasonable allowance for repairs and other contingencies withall understanding that of yor Trustees there are only 7 living, I take this oportunity whilst I think of it to desire you to fill up the number, for fear that by the death of a few more you may come to sinck yor Trust, as it has happened in some places within my memory.

I have had so good an account of you formerly that I take you to be such as need not many words to direct or excite you to the doing of those things, w<sup>ch</sup> I trust you are ready to do of yo<sup>r</sup> own just and good inclinac'ons.

I beseech God to have you in his Gratious keeping.

### To the Governors of Hartlebury Schoole.

My Good Friends and Neighbors,

I have throughly considered the case of yor school, and find that the real value of the school land is above £100 per annum, of w<sup>ch</sup> the reserved rent is but £51 8s. 7d., out of w<sup>ch</sup> yor Schoolmr has £32 and yor usher £12; the remainder is applyed to pay the Interest of y<sup>e</sup> money borrowed to build the Master's house and to finish that building, as I presume.

These salaries being not sufficient to invite men of ability to instruct yor children, I think therefore you ought to be very cautious in renewing of Leases; and if I understand yor Statutes, you ought not to grant any Lease without the Bishop's consent. I think to enquire farther into that matter, and in the meanwhile I do advise you not to renew any Lease without reserving at least two thirds in rent of ye real improved value, to comence at the expiracion of the term in being, if not sooner. If you do so, you will by degrees bring the Rents to above £70 per annum; of wen I think the Master ought to have £40 and the usher £20 at least; and £10 more with the consent of the Bishop, Governours, and Schoolmasters, may be applyed to teach poor children in the Parish to read, wen is now to be done by the Usher or not at all.

I do not very well approve of yor Statutes, and think they were drawn very negligently. But I desire to have a true copy of the Charter 1, and the Statutes, and of a Decree yt was made on a Com'is sion for Pious Uses, and then I will at my first oportunity advise how such fresh Statutes may be made, as may be of the greatest advantage and benefit to you and yor posterity.

I am told yor school is like to be void in a short time Wnever it is so, I would advise you to lay aside all yor private Interests and piques, and to agree together to choose the best man that you can find or hear of, I mean such a man as is like to doe the most good in yor school.

I think you cannot well justify the spending of any of the school revenue in yor meetings about ye school business: especially since you all live within the Parish, where you have meat and drink at yor own Houses; so that, for that, you need not go to an Alehouse. And when you meet for business, I think it ought to be either in the Church or Schoolhouse, where it may be done much better than at an Alehouse. There especially is the worst place for making up of yor Accounts: tho' I am afraid you make them all there, for I cannot imagine how they should be done so slatterly otherwise. I speak thus particularly of the Accounts that have been given of the building of the Schoolmaster's house. If you will make me think it necessary to look farther into these matters, and I see no other way to do the Charity right, but by a Com'ission of Pious and Charitable Uses, I shall be sorry for it as wel for yor sakes as my own; for it will be expensive and troublesome to all parties concerned. I doe therefore desire you so to order yor matters for the future that there may be no occasion for this.

But in case there was no such, you might dispose of it otherwise as you had reason to believe he would do himself if he were living. most pious and Charitable Act of that excellent Man whom I have the honour to call my first Patron to a Church Living, as you made it no secret to me, so I thought it my duty to publish it to others, that he might have the just praise of so great a good work upon earth, as I doubt not he has the blessed reward of it in Heaven.

By my speaking so often and so freely of this as I have done these many years, I hear that it has now come to be a matter of co'mon discourse at this time, and therefore I thought it fit to acquaint you how it came to be so, hoping that you will not disapprove of that part y<sup>t</sup> I have had in it as proceeding entirely from my gratitude to my good Lord, and the honour I have always borne to his most worthy Family.

I make use of my own hand to conclude this, tho I can do it but very infirmly, being now on my recovery from a very dangerous sickenesse, for which I blesse my good God.

I do also according to my manifold Duty beseech him to
