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
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
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

PREFACE.

THE former Editions of this work having been very favourably received, it has been revised, and considerably extended for the present issue.

Synonyms are interchangeable but not identical words; and, as the signification of a word varies in different sentences, so do the synonyms which serve as its convertible terms. The timber is good—that is, sound, perfect, undamaged; the law is good—that is, useful, just, equitable. Synonyms, therefore, form so important a branch of language as to imperatively require the attention of the writer, speaker, and student.

Since nothing but constant practice can familiarize a learner with the total resources of his language, an aid such as the present Work becomes indispensable; and it is not without value to the experienced writer, for though memory may sometimes fail, yet the written letter remains.

By reference to any leading term in its alphabetical order, the corresponding synonyms will be found; and any of these may again be employed as leading terms if necessary. iv

OUTLINES OF ENGLISH GRAMMAR.

EVERY language is spoken or written according to certain rules. When these rules are digested into form, they become the Grammar of the language. The Grammar, therefore, serves to regulate doubtful expressions, by admitting of a reference to the analogous and recognised standard of the language.

Being and action are the bases of grammar; in other words. things exist and have motion, and give rise to our words expressing these states. The distinctions between different states of being, or modes of action, arise from varieties of time, order, quality, condition, possession, place, &c., and these varieties require to be expressed in terms which denote the difference of state.

Every word in the English language is capable of being classed under a certain head, and is therefore denominated by the term of its class. These classes, or sorts of words, are, in English, nine in number, and are known by the names of Noun, Article, Adjective, Pronoun, Verb, Adverb, Preposition, Conjunction, and Interjection.

OF THE NOUN.

A noun, or name, expresses anything that we can comprehend as existing, whether material or abstract: everything to which we give a name is a noun, if the name implies the thing itself. All that is palpable to our senses, all that we can see, hear, feel, touch, or taste, is a noun. Those things which are only embodied in idea, are abstract nouns; such as, goodness, justice, sweetness, industry, &c. These are not distinguished by any external form, but we esteem them as really existing notwithstanding.

Nouns have two NUMBERS, the singular and the plural. We may speak of one or more articles: when one is alluded to, it is singular, more than one is plural; as, apple, apples, box, boxes,

mouse, mice.

The plural of most nouns is formed by adding s to the singular; as, pen, pens. But if the final letter of the singular is v, it changes into ies; as, lady, ladies. If a vowel precedes the y, s, only is added; as boy, boys. Some nouns in f and fe take ves for the plural; as loaf, loaves, wife, wives; but such as gulf, grief, mischief, &c., only take a final s in the plural. Those which do not conform to these rules form the plural irregularly; as, man, men, seaman, seamen, child, children, goose, geese, and a few others.

GENDER.

Gender distinguishes sex; as, man, woman; and inanimate objects; as, a stone, milk.

Male subjects are masculine. Female subjects are feminine.

Inanimate things are always neuter, except when we speak figu-

ratively, as of a vessel; she sails well.

Gender is expressed by different words; as, boy, girl; by a different termination; as, Jew, Jewess; or a prefix; as, a manservant, a maid-servant.

CASE.

Exhibits the relation of one noun to another, or to a verb or preposition. There are three cases; the nominative, the possessive, and the objective.

The nominative is the doer, performer, or actor, spoken of; as

Thomas walks, he rides.

The possessive simply denotes possession: as John's boot.

The objective is only spoken of as either the object or the inactive agent; as, James strikes the table. James acts, and is therefore the nominative; the table struck is the object, or inactive agent, and is in the objective case. James struck his brother: brother is in the objective case. Three men found a treasure: creasure is in the objective case.

OF THE VERB.

Whatever we perceive of action, bodily or mentally; whatever moves, acts, or disturbs, gives rise to our ideas of motion, and these actions are classed as verbs. If we say, He runs, runs is a verb, because it expresses the action of the person spoken of; so if we say, I think, I understood, I shall go, I was there, we use verbs in our expressions.

From the two parts of speech, noun and verb, arise the remaining seven; for as without being and motion all would be nonentity, so without nouns and verbs, which express these states, language could not exist. The various states and qualities of being and

existence require other parts of speech to express them.

Verbs are active or transitive, passive, and neuter, or intransitive. The active verb exhibits the action between the nominative and object; as James strikes the table. The passive alludes to the object; as, the table is struck. The neuter relates to the person or persons to whom the action is confined; as, I run, I walk, He sleeps; and is therefore intransitive.

ARTICLE.

If we say apple, pen, boy, we use nouns; but out of a variety of apples, &c., we may either require one in particular or any one indifferently. The little modifying words joined to the noun to express these variations are termed articles; they are a or an, and the. The is used with any noun when we wish to speak of a definite subject: as, The boy whom I saw—alluding to some particular boy; but an is used if the subject is not limited particularly to one, as if we say, Give me an apple: the meaning is, any apple out of a quantity. An is used before a vowel, or before a silent h; but before a word beginning with a consonant, or a h which is aspirated, an drops the n, and becomes a; thus we say, Give me a pen, I have bought a house, because pen begins with a consonant, and house with an aspirated h.

ADJECTIVE.

The substance of which we speak may have some particular quality or number which we desire to express; as, an apple may be sweet, a pen may be good or bad, or, we may require three apples. These qualities and numbers of the noun are called adjectives. If we require a portion of any substance; as, some, any, all, of the fruit, these words are adjectives.

Adjectives can be compared, and have three degrees of comparison; as sweet, sweeter, sweetest, low, lower, lowest. The degree by which we commence the comparison is termed the positive; that by which we afterwards ascend or descend is the comparative; the third, the highest or lowest degree, is the

superlative.

Some adjectives are irregular: as good, better, best; little, less, least, &c.

PRONOUN

The pronoun refers to the substance of which we speak, or have spoken; as He is virtuous, by which is meant some man of whom we speak. That wine is good: that refers us at once to the wine, which is the subject of discourse. Thomas went out to meet his sister, that he might accompany her home. The italics all refer to the persons spoken of, and by representing the nouns are pronouns.

There are several kinds of pronouns, as, personal, relative, pos-

sessive, distributive, &c.

Personal pronouns relate to the person; as, I, he, his, him. Possessive pronouns denote possession; as, my, thy, his, her,

its, our.

Relative pronouns relate to the person or thing before spoken

of: they are, who, which, that, and what.

The distributive pronouns relate to persons and things taken separately; they are, each, every, either, and neither.

The demonstrative pronouns point out which of two or more

things is meant; they are, this and that, these and those.

Indefinite pronouns are such as none, any, all, such, &c.

If the student is at any loss to distinguish the nominative from the objective case of the pronoun, he may at all times ascertain them by distinguishing the active from the passive case;—send, give, or any such like verb, may be applied thus:—

ADVERB.

An adverb is joined to a verb, an adjective, or another adverb, to express condition (as an adjective is to a noun); it qualifies or defines the sense in which we are to understand the verb, &c. If we say, He runs, we express only the motion without condition; but if we say how he runs, as, He runs quickly, He moves slowly, we attach a definitive to the verb, and this definitive is an adverb.

the railway. A preposition may usually be known by its referring to place; as, over, nigh, towards, through, under London. A preposition also relates to time; as, during, since, past, &c. but prepositions of this class are few in number.

CONJUNCTION.

A conjunction joins words and sentences; as, He and I, He is neither happy nor contented. It also may in some instances be regarded as a conditional term; as, If you behave well I will help you; All were lost save, but, or except, the two who were rescued. Unless you learn you will be a dunce, notwithstanding your natural abilities.

INTERJECTIONS.

Are simply exclamations of surprise, fear, joy, &c.; as, Oh! Ah! Dear Me! Well! Hallo!


