NEW BERNE, N. C., November 10th, 1896.

THE SYNOD OF NORTH CAROLINA met in its Eightythird Annual Session, Tuesday, November 10th, 1896, at 7:30 o'clock P. M., in the Presbyterian church, New Berne, N. C., and was opened with a sermon by the retiring Moderator, Rev. E. Daniel, D. D., from H. Tim., 3:16: "All Scripture is given by inspiration," &c.

SECOND DAY.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 11th, 1896.

MORNING SESSION.

The Synod met according to adjournment, and was opened with prayer by Rev. W. B. Arrowood.

Rev. Thos. H. Law, D. D., of the Synod of South Carolina, was invited to sit as a corresponding member and was introduced to the Synod.

The minutes of the last annual meeting, having been printed and distributed, were approved without reading.

Rev. Thos. H. Law, D. D., addressed the Synod in the interest of the American Bible Society.

It was ordered that the matter of Dr. Law's address be referred to the Synod's Committee on the Bible Cause.

The resignation of Mr. Geo. E. Wilson, as a Regent of the Orphans' Home, was read and referred to the special Committee on the Orphans' Home, to be appointed.

It was ordered that a special committee be appointed to consider the matter of memorializing the General Assembly of the State in the interest of the convicts at the penitentiary and report at this meeting. The Moderator appointed as this committee Rev. L. B. Turnbull, D. D., E. Daniel, D. D., and Ruling Elder James Dinwiddie.

Salisbury was chosen as the place for the next meeting of the Synod; and the first Tuesday (2nd) of November, 1897, at 7:30 P. M., was fixed as the time.

The Synod took recess until the hour for divine worship.

After recess the Synod convened and heard a sermon from Rev. A. D. McClure.

Synod then took recess until 3 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Stated Clerk was directed to have 600 copies of the Minutes of the present session of the Synod printed.

Standing Rule Amended. Statistical Report. Bible Cause.

It was ordered that Standing Rule No. 22, be amended as follows: That item 1 of this rule be amended so as to read as follows: That the Synodical Communion be held at 11 A. M. on the second day of the sessions; and that item 2 of this rule be stricken out.

The Committee on Statistical Reports, Rev. A. J. Mc-Kelway, chairman, made a partial report, which was received and adopted, as follows:

It was made the Order of the Day to-morrow (Thursday) at 11 A. M. to hear the report of the Regents of the Orphans' Home.

Rev. F. D. Thomas presented the report on the Bible Cause, which was adopted, and is as follows:

1. That Synod again commends the Bible Cause to the Churches as deserving of their contributions, especially on account of the pressing necessities of the Society.

2. That all our ministers be urged to see to it that a collection is taken for

Church and Christian Education. Parochial Schools.

this cause as ordered by Synod, on the 3rd Sabbath of October. or as soon thereafter as possible.

3. That the contributions to this cause be made to appear in the minutes of Presbytery and of Synod.

The Committee on Church and Christian Education, Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., agent and chairman, presented a report, which was approved, and the recommendations adopted. They are as follows:

We recommend the Synod to continue the same apportionment for this cause as last year, to wit: Albemarie, \$100: Concord, \$300: Fayetteville, \$300; Mecklenburg, \$275; Orange, \$250; Wilmington, \$200; Asheville, \$75; aggregate, \$1,500.

We recommend further that the collections for this cause be distributed hereafter, one-half to Davidson College, instead of two-thirds as heretofore, and one-half to other schools instead of one-third as heretofore. This change is recommended because of the larger increase of the latter interest.

The Committee on Parochial Schools, Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., chairman, presented a report which was received. the recommendations were taken up *seriatim* and adopted, and the report as a whole was then adopted. The recommendations are as follows:

1. We recommend to Synod's Committee of Church and Christian Education, and also to the committees of the several Presbyteries, to agitate the importance of Parochial Schools in such way as may seem to them best, not neglecting to use the press. We also arge the Presbyteries to foster this movement, and we would charge our ministers to instruct the people on this subject on all proper occasions.

2. That Synod recommends the different Presbyteries to give this action of Synod in reference to Parochial Schools their serious consideration at their next Spring meeting.

Rev. L. B. Turnbull, D. D., agent, presented a report on Ministerial Education, which was received. Pending further action upon this report, the Synod took recess until 7:30 p. M.

Foreign Missions. Ministerial Education.

EVENING SESSION.

The Synod convened at 7:30 P. M. and resumed its business.

The Order of the Day was taken up, viz.: Popular meeting in the interest of Foreign Missions. The annual report was read by Rev. A. T. Graham, chairman. Pending further action, addresses were made by Rev. R. V. Lancaster, P. H. Hoge, D. D., E. W. Smith, D. D., and the Synod was led in prayer by Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D. A collection was taken for the cause amounting to \$41.95.

The recommendations were then adopted, and the report as a whole was adopted.

The recommendations are as follows:

1. That the Synod unite in prayer, gratefully acknowledging the special token we have had of the favor and blessing of the Divine Master, and that prayer also be offered for our own missionaries.

2. That pastors he urged to seek the larger distribution of *The Missionary* and the *Children's Missionary*, the one at 50c, and the other at 25c, per year.

The unfinished business was taken up, viz.: Report on Ministerial Education. The recommendations, as amended, were adopted, and the report as a whole was adopted.

The recommendations are as follows.

1. That pastors and sessions exercise caution in encouraging candidates for the ministry, especially in their early stage of study, as to becoming beneficiaries of the Church, and urge them, as far as practicable, to depend upon their own resources and personal efforts for support.

2. That our pastors present from their pulpits and in private, the claims and call to the Gospel ministry, that parents and their sons have this claim and cause of the Lord constantly on their hearts and consciences.

3. That chairmen of Committees of Ministerial Education be encouraged, wherever practicable, to visit the churches of their Presbyteries, and present and press this claim and call upon our young men. And also visit male schools within their Presbyteries for the same purpose.

4. That our pastors and sessions so present this cause to their congregations as to win and maintain their allegiance and liberal contributions to it. Communication. Overture.

The Synod adjourned to meet to-morrow at 9:30 A. M. Closed with prayer by Rev. J. Henry Smith, D. D.

THIRD DAY.

THURSDAY, November 12th, 1896.

MORNING SESSION.

The Synod met pursuant to adjournment, and was opened with prayer by Rev. A. N. Ferguson.

The minutes of the second day's session were read and approved.

A communication from Rev. J. N. Craig, D. D. Secretary of Assembly's Home Missions, was read and referred to Synod's Committee on Home Missions.

An Overture from Orange Presbytery was presented, read and referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures. It is as follows:

In view of the growing importance and necessity for the Church superintending and providing for the education of her sons and daughters. We hereby Overture the Synod of North Carolina to request all its pastors to preach annually in convection with the day of prayer for schools and colleges, a sermon emphasizing and magnifying the importance of Christian Education and encouraging our people to send their sons and daughters to schools established by the Presbyterian Church.

An Overture from Mecklenburg Presbytery, asking for the division of itself and the erection of a new Presbytery, was read, and made the first Order of the Day for this morning. It is as follows:

Overture. Communication. Reports.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

The Presbytery of Mccklenburg respectfully Overtures the Synod of North Carolina to erect out of the churches in her bounds,'a new Presbytery, which shall be known as ASHEVILLE PRESUVTERY, and which shall embrace the counties west of the Blue Ridge, viz: Madison, Buncombe, Henderson, Haywood, Transylvania, Macon, Jackson, Swain, Graham, Clay and Cherokee; and consisting of the following elurches, ministers and candidate:

CHURCHES.—Asheville, Bethany (col'd). Bethel (Haywood), Brevard, Bryson City, Centre, Davidson River, Drusilla, Franklin, Hendersonville, Hiwassee, Midway, Murphy, Mills River, Morrison, Oak Forest, Southside, Swannanoa and Waynesville. (Nineteen churches with a total membership of 1,005.)

MINISTERS.-D. T. Towles, E. A. Sample, J. T. Wade, W. J. Williams, J. S. Morrow, H. M. Parker, R. F. Campbell, D. D., J. L. Wicker, J. B. Cochrane and R. W. Alexander. (10).

CANDIDATE .- W. W. Williams, of Mills River church.

And the Presbytery of Mecklenburg further promises and pledges itself to pay to the new Presbytery, when it shall be formed, the amount of \$500 per year for three years for Home Mission work, and to allow its General Evangelist to labor four months during the summer in the new Presbytery.

The report was received and approved.

ined the Records, and have found them neatly and correctly kept, and recommend their approval."

The report was received and adopted.

The Committee to examine the Records of Wilmington Presbytery, Rev. W. R. Coppedge, chairman, reported "that the minutes appear to be neatly and accurately kept and we recommend their approval."

The report was received and adopted.

The Committee on the Report of the Trustees of Synod, Rev. A. McFadyen, chairman, reported that no papers had been placed in their hands. The report was received and the committee discharged.

The special committee appointed to nominate a successor to the late Col. John E. Brown, as chairman of the Board of Trustees of Synod, reported, recommending the election of Dr. John R. Irwin. The report was received and adopted.

The committee to examine the Records of Albemarle Presbytery, Rev. Colin Shaw, chairman, reported, recommending their approval. The report was received and adopted.

The Order of the Day was taken up, viz.: Overture from Mecklenburg Presbytery. The petition of the Overture was granted, and a committee consisting of Rev. R. A. Miller, Rev. J. W. Stagg and Ruling Elder W. A. Blair, was appointed to nominate a time, place and Moderator for the first meeting of the new Presbytery.

Rev. J. Rumple, D. D., president, presented the annual report of the Regents of the Orphans' Home. Pending further action the Synod took a short recess.

After recess the Synod convened and engaged in divine worship conducted by Rev. J. W. Stagg.

The Synod took recess until 3 P. M.

Recommendation. Visiting Member. Colored Industrial School.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod convened at 3 P. M., and resumed its business.

The unfinished business was taken up, viz.: the report of the Regents of the Orphans' Home; the report was referred to a special committee, consisting of Rev. F. H Johnston, D. D., Rev. J. M. Rose, D. D., and Ruling Elder W. A. Blair.

Rev. R. A. Miller, chairman of special committee on the new Presbytery, reported, recommending that the first meeting be held in the First Presbyterian church, Asheville, N. C., on the first Wednesday of December, 1896, at 11 o'clock A. M., and that Rev. E. A. Sample be the Moderator at this meeting. The report was received and adopted.

Rev. S. J. Porter, of the Missionary Baptist Church, was invited to sit as a visiting brother, and was introduced to the Synod.

Rev. L. B. Turnbull, D. D., presented the report of the Directors of the Colored Industrial and Academical Institute, which was referred to a special committee consisting of Rev. J. Rumple, D. D., Rev. H. G. Hill, D. D., and Rev. A. McFadyen.

Rev. D. I. Craig, temporary chairman, presented a report on Colored Evangelization, which was approved, and the following recommendation adopted :

The Synod would earnestly urge all its ministers and sessions to faithfully present this cause to their congregations at the appointed time, and thereby awaken, if possible, a greater interest, and secure larger contributions.

It was ordered that Synod suspend its work to-morrow (Friday) night for the installation of the pastor-elect of this church.

Union Theological Seminary. Chaptains.

The Committee on Union Theological Seminary, Rev. J. M. Rose, D. D., chairman, presented the following report, which was received and adopted:

The Committee on the report of the Board of Directors of Union Theological Seminary would respectfully submit the following for the Synod's action:

1 The Synod desires to express its profound sense of gratitude to God for the continued prosperity Hehas vouchsafed to this beloved Institution; for the faithfulness of its Board of Directors to the trust committed to them; for the fidelity of its honored professors; for the large number of consecrated young men gathered within its walls; for the dilgence and good deportment of the students, and for all the manifest tokens of Divine approval and blessing.

2. The Synod hereby appoints the Rev. W. B. Arrowood a director to fill out the unexpired term of the Rev. D. D. McBryde, lately deceased; Dr. Henry Louis Smith to fill out the unexpired term of the lamented Dr. W. J. Martin, and Rev. J. B. Morton to fill out the unexpired term of Rev. Dr W. D Morton, removed from our bounds.

The Synod hereby appoints for another term of three years, the Rev. H.
 Hill, D. D., and Dr. E. Nye Hutchison, and appoints the Rev. R. F. Campbell,
 D. b. in the place of the Rev. J. H. Smith, D. D., who declines a re-election.

4. The Synod takes this opportunity of putting on record its grateful appreciation of the long and valued services, rendered to this Institution as members of its Board of Directors, by the two honored brethren whose decease is noted in this paper, and also by the beloved brother, who, on account of infirmities of age declines a re-election.

The following report of the special committee on the subject, was presented by Rev. L. P. Turnbull, D. D., and was adopted:

The committee to consider and report on the recommendation to appoint a committee to co-operate with similar committees from other denominations in memorializing the Legislature to provide for the religious welfare of the convicts of the State, recommend that such a committee, consisting of two, be appointed to try to secure the appointment and support by the State of -Chaplains for the convicts on the State farms.

Revs. L. B. Turnbull, D. D., and E. Daniel, D. D., were appointed the committee called for in the above paper. Sabbath Schools. Overture.

Rev. C. G. Vardell, chairman, presented the report on Sabbath Schools which was received; the recommendations taken up *seriatim* and adopted, and the report as a whole adopted.

The recommendations are as follows:

1. That committees be appointed by Presbyteries to visit their churches and take particular note of these facts and make a special report on the case to Presbytery.

2. That Presbyterial Agents be directed by correspondence and personal visitation so far as practicable, to try to remedy this state of affairs by establishing schools in their churches.

3. That when it is found impracticable to establish a school on account of the scattered state of the congregation, or because the numbers are few, every effort be made to establish a "Home Study" department that shall be reported as the school of that church.

An Overture to the General Assembly was presented by Rev. C. G. Vardell, and referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures. It is as follows:

The Synod of North Carolina overtures the General Assembly to meet in Charlotte, N. C., to re-open the question of a separate course of lessons for infant classes prepared by the Assembly's Committee to the last Assembly and the anthorizing that Committee to prepare that course, and such other courses alternative to the International Lessons as shall secure

1. Adaptation of the lesson material to the age and advancement of the scholar;

- 2. More direct use of the Bible itself in our schools;
- 3. More systematic and connected study of the Bible History;
- 4. More attention to the doctrines of our own Church.

The Committee on Systematic Beneficence, Rev. L. B. Turnbull, D. D., chairman, presented the following report, which was received and adopted:

Systematic Beneficence. Address to the Churches.

Which is, in round numbers, \$7,000 more than the totals of last year.

Forty-one churches make no reports to Presbyteries. Of these seven are in -Fayetteville, twelve in Mecklenburg, eleven in Wilmington, six in Orange and five in Albemarle. In the total contributions for the past year Fayetteville Presbytery has increased \$655, Mecklenburg, \$6,166, Wilmington, \$1,600 and Orange, \$312. While the Presbytery of Concord has decreased \$1,387 and Albemarle, \$339.

The committee recommends that Synod request the Presbyteries to instruct their churches when failing to report contributions to any stated cause of the Church's beneficence, to give a reason for their failure to contribute.

We also recommend that the Stated Clerk of Synod revise the Synod's blank for systematic beneficence, and omit the cause of church erection.

The Committee to prepare an Address to the Churches on the State of Religion, Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., chairman. presented the following, which was adopted and ordered to be read in all our churches:

The reports from the Presbyteries indicate the following state of religion in our bounds:

1. The officers of our churches, ministers, elders and deacons, nre commended for official fidelity in the discharge of their duties, and especial mention is made of the faithfulness of the elders in gathering the people together in vacant churches. On the other hand also the attendance of the people on the means of grace is growing, and encouraging, and often highly satisfactory.

Address to the Churches.

2. An increasing interest is reported in Sunday school work, and special mention is made of the increasing efficiency of this part of church work, while on the other hand the reports deplore the fact that parents in so many cases leave their children too exclusively to this agency for their religious training. Dear brethren, this ought not so to be. The help you get from the Sunday school ought rather to encourage you to more earnest efforts at home, for responsibility in this matter cannot be transferred to others.

3. The most of the reports mention decided improvement in Sabbath observance, while there is still much to deplore in Sabbath descration by travel, social visiting, Sunday mails, and Sunday newspapers. The Synod would exhort all the people to "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," because the Lord's Sabbath is the starting place and nursing time of true holiness.

4. There is a uniform statement that the family altar is almost entirely neglected except in the families of office-bearers in the Church. The bare knowledge of this sad fact is a hopeful sign, and gives promise of an effort to correct so great an evil. Perhaps the confessed lack of a high state of grace and spirituality is due to this failure at the fountain head of family religion. "The stream cannot rise higher than the fountain."

5. Prayer meetings are well kept up in our compact and well-trained congregations, but are sadly neglected, especially in country districts where the congregations are much scattered. The Synod would recommend cottage prayer-meetings as the remedy for the real difficulties in the way of the more formal church prayer-meetings. Cottage prayer-meetings have done much good when tried.

6. The reported decrease in attendance on worldly amusements and intemperance is a subject for profound gratitude to God and encourages us to hope and pray that you all shall be no more "conformed to this world."

7. The churches are reported in the main, as faithful in their pecuniary obligations to their pastors and also in the regularity of their contributions to the various causes of the Church; and in some quarters the measure of liberality has been marked as well as gratifying.

8. All the Presbyteries report a steady growth in membership and large additions have been made to a number of churches in various parts of the Synod, and a signal blessing has rested upon our evangelistic work.

9. These and other indications lead us to thank God and take courage while we confess and deplore our short-comings and failure in duty, and pray Him to pour us out a blessing till there shall not be room to receive it.

Reports of Committees. Statistical Report.

10. Dear brethren, the Synod would make these practical suggestions: Read this paper in all your churches, address yourselves to improving what is good and to correcting what is bad with all long suffering and patience; a few days of special services might be held with great profit in all our churches pastors assisting each other—the burden of which service might well be the contents of this address in detail. "Wisdom is profitable to direct."

In the name of the Synod of North Carolina we pray you grace, merey, and peace from Christ Jesus our Lord.

The Committee on Peace Institute, Rev. E. Daniel, D. D., chairman, presented the following report, which was received and adopted:

Your committee has had conference alike with the president of the Institute and with some friends of the Presbyterian Church who may be supposed to have the means whereby the financial part of our undertaking may be accomplished. We are gratified to report that on the part of the president we find an unswerving devotion to the Church of our fathers, and an abiding determination to maintain the school as distinctly Presbyterian. The Synod is to be congratulated that God has raised up one amongst us, who, while hearing atone the heavy financial responsibility incurred in maintaining a large female school of the highest grade in the Synod, has, as a loyal son, devoted his time and means and energies to making the school an agency for the development of the interests of the Presbyterian Church. Your committee furthermore hopes to report that this effort is meeting with more encouraging success. The Institute is in every way in a most flourishing condition, and remains a source of pride to every Presbyterian in the Synod. Whilst all this is true, your committee is of the opinion that the work of Peace Institute may yet be greatly enlarged. Located at the capital of the State, it may be made the centre of everwidening influence - With proper management and co-operation on the part of the Synod and the men of means within our bounds, there is reason to hope that the already encouraging attendance may be more than doubled, and that the Church may have at our capital an institution which shall sustain to her a relation of influence and prominence similar to that which the University, or

the A, and M. College, or the Greensboro Normal College sustains to the State. To bring about this result requires time. The committee has had conference with men of financial ability concerning the property interests involved, but the unsettled state of affairs throughout the country, and within the State has made it impossible to bring matters to a conclusion. Your committee would therefore ask to be continued.

The Committee to examine the Records of Mecklenburg Presbytery, Rev. Hugh Craig, chairman, reported, recommending their approval, with exceptions. The report was adopted, and the exceptions ordered to be noted in the records.

The Committee to examine the Records of Fayetteville Presbytery, Rev. P. C. Morton, chairman, reported that the records are neatly and concisely kept, and recommended their approval. The report was adopted.

Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., made a verbal report from the Board of Regents of South Atlantic University; the report was received as information; and Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., was re-elected a regent of the South Atlantic University, to serve three years.

Rev. A. D. McClure, chairman, presented the annual report on Publication and Colportage, which was received and adopted.

The Synod took recess until 7:30 P. M.

EVENING SESSION.

The Synod convened at 7:30 P. M. and resumed its business.

The Order of the Day was taken up, viz.: Popular meeting in the interest of Synodical Home Missions., Rev. P. H. Hoge, D. D., presided by request, and opened the meeting with devotional exercises. Rev. Dr. Hoge then read the annual report of the committee. Addresses were made by Rev. Messrs. J. B. Morton, John Wakefield, A. K. Pool, Recommendations. Records of Orange Presbytery.

B. Soulier and Wm. Black. A collection was taken for the cause, amounting to \$39.04 in cash, and \$5.50 in pledges. The recommendations were considered *seriatim* and adopted. And the report as a whole was adopted.

The recommendations are as follows:

1. Synod recognizing the need of a more active prosecution of the financial side of the committee's work and not wishing to draw more of the Superintendent's time from the Evangelistic work in which he has been so emineutly blessed, authorizes the committee to secure the service, for a whole or part of his time, of an assistant superintendent.

2. Synod calls upon Presbyterial Committees, pastors and sessions to cooperate with the Synodical Committee in securing the proper presentation of this cause to all our churches, and would arge that whenever an adequate presentation can not be secured in the times allotted for it, efforts should be made by subscriptions or otherwise to make up within the year at least the sums apportioned each church.

Synod apportions the sum of \$5,000 for Synodical Mission work as follows: Mecklenburg, \$750: Fayetteville, \$950; Orange, \$950; Concord, \$900: Wilmington, \$750: Albemarle, \$500; Asheville, \$200

4. Synod commends the broad field of the Sonthwest under the care of our Assembly's committee to the liberality of our people and apportions the sum of \$3,000 for the cause as follows: Fayetteville, \$600; Orange, \$600; Concord, \$600; Mecklenburg, \$600; Wilmington, \$400: Albemarle, \$200; Asheville, \$100.

5. Synod would express its appreciation of the zeal and activity with which its Presbyteries have been prosecuting their work.

The erection of a new Presbytery out of our Western Mission Field, and the employment of Presbyterial Superintendents, or General Evangelists in several of the Presbyteries indicate the increased interest of our people in this cause, and the increased prosperity of this work. For all of which Synod expresses its gratitude to God

The Committee to examine the Records of Orange Presbytery, Rev. J. M. Rose, D. D., chairman, reported recommending their approval as far as written. The report was received and adopted.

Synod adjourned to meet to-morrow at 9:30 A. M. Closed with prayer by Rev. B. Soulier.

FOURTH DAY.

FRIDAY, November 13th, 1896.

MORNING SESSION.

The Synod convened at 9:30 л. м. and was opened with prayer by Rev. Wm. Black.

The minutes of the Third Day's Session were read and approved.

Rev. J. A. Ramsay, chairman of the Historical Committee, reported that there was nothing requiring the action of the Synod. The ceport was received as information.

The Committee on the Minutes of the General Assembly, Rev. J. Rumple, D. D., chairman, presented a report, which was received and adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee appointed to examine the Minutes of the General Assembly respectfully report that the duty has been performed, and that while there are many matters therein requiring the attention of the Presbyteries, there is nothing demanding action by the Synod. Your committee, however, would call the attention of our people to the report on the Sabbath on pages 613-14, especially to that clause that urges our people to do what they legitimately can to proenre the proper closing of the post offices on the Sabbath day. The Synod would therefore urge our people, wherever it appears practicable, to secure the consent of the local postmaster, and the signatures of a majority of the patrons of the post office to a petition asking for the closing of their office on the Sabbath day, and forward the same to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, in order to accomplish the much desired object.

The Special Committee on the report of the Regents of the Crphans' Home, Rev. F. H. Johnston, D. D., chairman, presented the following report which was received and adopted:

Your committee beg leave to report, recommending:

 That Synod express their gratitude to God for His continued favor to the Orphans' Home during another year.

2. That Synod has heard with great satisfaction from the report of the Regents of the growing usefulness of this institution, both in the increase of its mutates and in the efficiency of its educational work.

Orphans' Home. Statistical Report.

3. That the Board of Regents, and the Superintendent of the Home, Rev. R. W. Boyd, be commended for the prudent and fnithful discharge of the trust committed to them.

4. That the attention of the people of our Church be especially called at this time to the pressing need there is for money to finish the "Centre Building" for the larger accommodation of orphans. Under the circumstances the Synod endorses the purpose of the president, at the request of the Board of Regents, to visit some of our larger churches with the view of securing the needed funds; and commend him and his object to all the churches which he may visit.

5. That all our churches, Subbath schools and Young People's Societies be urged, if possible, to become regular monthly contributors to the Support Fund of the Home; and that our people generally remember the orphans on Thanksgiving day with increased liberality of contributions in money or supplies or both.

6. The term of the Fifth Class of Regents having expired, the Synod hereby appoints G. W. Watts, Esq., and Rev. J. W. Stagg, to serve five years.

7. The Synod heartily commends to our people the paper published at the Home—"Our Fatherless Ones"—both for its own sake, as an evidence of the intelligence and progress of the pupils, and because of the fact, as appears from the Regents' report, that the income from the paper has in an emergency proved helpful to the support of the institution.

The Stated Clerk presented the following statistical report to the General Assembly, which was adopted, and ordered to be forwarded to the General Assembly:

The Synod of North Carolina respectfully reports to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, that it consists of seven Presbyteries, and that these consist, in whole, of 142 ministers and 345 churches, having under their care nine licentiates and 73 candidates, viz.:


The following minutes touching the death of ministers deceased since the last meeting of the Synod were presented by their respective committees:

REV. PLEASANT HUNTER DALTON.

The Synod of North Carolina desires to place upon its minutes a record of its appreciation of the life and labors of the REV PLEASANT HUNTER DALTON, for nearly fifty years a faithful and efficient laborer in its bounds. MR DALTON

was a native of Iredell county. North Carolina, and a graduate of the State University. He began his labors in Concord Presbytery, afterwards labored in Orange Presbytery, in Washington, in Orange county, in Davidson and Guilford counties, and lastly in Davie county, near the place of his birth, and he fell asleep in Christ during the month of July of this year. We confidently testify that he was an earnest and instructive preacher of the gospel, successful in winning souls to Christ, and enterprising in founding and building up churches in destitute fields of the State. Nor would we forget to record that MR. DALTON was a pleasant and genial companion, and that his presence spread sunshine in whatever company he chanced to fall in with. His religion was a cheerful religion, a delightful earnest of that joy nuspeakable and full of glory, upon which we confidently believe he has now entered.



REV. W. K. BOGGS died at Waxhaw, N. C., on the —— day of September, 1896. At his death deceased was about 45 years of age – BROTHER BOGGS came to the Presbytery of Mecklenburg from Bethel Presbytery in the Synod of Sonth Carolina about twelve months before his death, and during his brief sojourn in the Synod, supplied as pastor the church at Waxhaw for part of his time, spending the remainder in evangelistic work.

He had peculiar gifts, fitting him for evangelistic work, and was greatly blessed in his labors; preaching the Gospel with much power, and fearlessly yet kindly denouncing sin in every form.

Wherever he labored special emphasis was laid upon the privilege and duty of family prayer, and many are the family altars erected through his influence, which still survive him as monuments to his faithful work. Synod has heard with sadness of his death, and records this brief memorial as some token of its appreciation of his service and its sympathy with his bereaved family who mourn his loss. Memorial.

REV. GEORGE L. WOLFE.

REV. GEORGE L. WOLFE died at Carthage, N. C., June 24th. 1896. He was received into Fayetteville Presbytery from Tuskaloosa Presbytery a little over a year before he was called to his reward. Owing to his brief stay amongst us, we feel a lack of information on which to base a suitable minute of this brother beloved. He impressed us as a man of scholarly attainments, a good presbyter, a faithful preacher of the Word, and an earnest, devoted servant of God. His sudden call to service in the "house not made with hards" is a solemn reminder of the brevity of life and gives emphasis to the Savior's command, "Be ye also ready for at such a time as ye think not the son of man cometh."

REV. A. McQUEEN.

REV. ARCHIBALD MCQUEEN died March 1st, 1896, in the 64th year of his age, in the 37th year of his ministry and 36th year of his membership in the Synod of North Carolina. It deserves to be said in a tribute to his memory, he was reserved as a presbyter and always modest in his manners. Few of his contemporaries possessed greater intellectual vigor. As a preacher he stood in the first rank. In the conduct of revival meetings he was peculiarly gifted. During his active career an unusual per centage of the churches of Fayetteville Presbytery were served by him for longer or shorter terms. Perhaps there are now more saved souls in the Presbytery in which he labored through all his life born again under his ministry than that of any other man. He was an affable and genial man and one of the most charming of fire side companions. His pronounced personal charms drew men to him with warm affection. In the county of Robeson, in which his labors were spent, and where he live 1 for the most part, and where he was best known, he was widely and warmly loved.

He died after a sickness of one year, in the midst of his family, at his charming country home, Queensdale. His last days were days of great suffering. He was a patient sufferer. At last he passed away declaring his readiness for his place in the House of many mansions.

REV. O. A. WHITE.




This brother pursued a special course of study preparatory to the ministry. taking his theological course in Columbia Seminary. In August, 1895, he came before the Presbytery of Fayetteville, and after examination, was received into the ministry. After his reception by Presbytery, MR. WHITE had placed in his hands, immediately, calls from the churches of Bethel and Galatia and in this, his first and last charge, he was soon happily settled. Under MR. WHITE's care this field was making excellent progress and there was much promise for the future. But it was soon evident that the brother's health was not equal to the work in his hands, and a period of rest was granted him in which to recover his strength and vigor. But very few had any thought that his case was at all serious, and probably none in the Presbytery or his congregation were prepared for the shock which came so soon in the news of BROTHER WHITE's death. The sorrow felt throughout his congregation, and by his brethren of Fayetteville Presbytery was genuine, for a faithful pastor, a beloved brother and a kind friend was gone. In this sorrow this Synod duly shares, and records its heartfelt sympathy with the bereaved family, and its own sense of loss in the death of this young and promising minister.

REV. WILLIAM GRAVES.

By reason of strength this brother lived above his four-score years and ten. He was one of the pioneer ministers of our Church in the mountain region of our territory. A good portion of his labor was in the counties of Henderson and Transylvania, and sometimes he made journeys into the adjoining counties of Haywood, Jackson, and doubtless others. He was a "good man," a faithful presbyter, a wise counselor and a man, in his day, zealous for his Father's bus-

iness. Amid the beauty and grundeur of his humble mountain home, among his own people, in the month of September, he peacefully passed away. Servant of God, cease from thy beloved employ, and enter into thy rest—that rest that remaineth to the people of God.



REV. D. D. McBRVDE, of Fayetteville Presbytery, whose loss our Synod is called to mourn, was born near Laurel Hill church, in Richmond county, in 1827, licensed by Fayetteville Presbytery in 1853, and ordained to the full work of the Gospel ministry in 1854. For 42 years he labored within the bounds of Fayetteville Presbytery, and for more than 36 years he was pastor of the two churches of Bluff and Sardis. But many other churches were benefited by his abundant and efficient labors. He was often a member of our highest judicatories, and of the boards of trustees which have successfully managed our educational institutions. He was ever a wise counselor and an active co-worker.

BROTHER McBRYDE was a man of rare intellectual and moral endowments. He was a profound and patient thinker, and he took hold of a subject with the vigorous grasp and keen insight of a powerful and disciplined mind. He had an acute intellect, quick perceptions, a sound judgment, an active logical faculty, a memory well furnished and prompt, and an extraordinary practical wisdom in all the affairs of life. His moral qualities were not less remarkable than his mental gifts. He had dignity without stiffness, courage without rashness, prudence without timidity, gentleness without weakness, courtesy without insincerity, liberality without extravagance, scholarship without pedantry, humility without meanness, and love without dissimulation. As a preacher he was reverent toward God, faithful toward man, loyal to his Divine Master, a diligent student of God's lively oracles and an active herald of Gospel tidings. He ever studied to "show himself a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of truth." As a *presbyter* he was familiar with the policy and laws of the church, was a punctual and active attendant upon its

judicatories, and was both wise in counsel and efficient in service. As a companion he was genial in disposition, affable in manners, courteons in speech and brotherly in intercourse. Our brother is not, because God hath taken him and translated him from labor to reward and from the Church militant to the Church triumphant.

The Synod would express the deepest sympathy with his bereaved family in its grievous loss, while at the same time it would rejoice with them in the character imparted to our brother by nature and by grace, in the honorable and useful career he had on earth, and in the assured hope of a blessed resurrection, a gladsome reunion and eternal life in the company of the redeemed and glorified.



REV. JOHN A. PRESTON, D. D.

JOBN ALEXANDER PRESTON had been but a short time among us when God called him higher. But in that short time he has left an impress upon Synod, Presbytery, Church and community that time can not efface and that eternity alone can reveal. With a head like a Romau Senator and a smile like a pictured saint, there was an impression of mingled sweetness and power created by his very appearance, which was confirmed and deepened as a closer acquaintauce began to reveal the rich treasures of his mind and heart. His gifts inherited from a distinguished ancestry and developed in an atmosphere of refinement, were cultivated by thorough study.

Possessed of an early acquaintance with the usual elements of liberal scholarship, in the study of the Word of God he made himself a master. His exact and critical knowledge of its contents and his firm grasp of its principles were set aglow by the intensity of his faith and the depth of his human sympathies. Here was the secret of his pulpit power: Knowledge of God's Word and of man's needs; sympathy with those needs and faith in that Word as their allsufficient remedy. Yet no view of his preaching can ignore his exquisite diction and faultless literary taste.

His character combined the strength of manhood with the gentleness of a woman and the simplicity of a little child. The high standard of duty which he unswervingly followed himself won the respect of all men, while his tender

consideration for the failings of others won their love. He was universally popular without ever stooping to court popularity. He seemed utterly indifferent to public opinion, but every one knew that he was never indifferent to public good. Both facts were due to his utter forgetfulness of self. The strong and the weak, the young and the old were equally sure of his ready interest. No burden was too great for him to seek to relieve it, none too light for him to give it attention and sympathy.

Upon his heart lay all the great causes of the Church. He deeply studied their problems, and in every way sought to advance their interests. In building up his own great church his purpose and aim was to make it more a factor in building up Christ's kingdom at home and abroad.

He was taken away in the prime of his powers and in the midst of his varied and growing usefulness. When first taken sick he said to his wife, "There are no shadows across my pathway; all is light; my faith is undimmed, my assurance is perfect." For us it should be a lesson to fill up our lives with work for others in the Master's name, that if suddenly called to our account, we may not be ashamed. If we would sum up in a word the secret of his life and work, it would be in the words of the text of the only sermon he ever preached before this Synod: "The disciple that Jesus loved."

After the reading of these memorials, and remarks by various members of the Synod, the memorials were adopted by a rising vote, and the Synod was led in prayer by Rev. E. Daniel, D. O.

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The Stated clerk was directed to transmit to the families of the deceased brethren copies of the memorials adopted, and to make the customary memorial record in the book of minutes.

Rev. J. M. Rose, D. D., was elected chairman of the Committee of Colored Evangelization in the place of Rev. W. D. Morton, D. D., removed from the Synod.

The Synod then engaged in Divine worship conducted by Rev. W. C. Alexander.

Recess was taken until 3 P. M.

Academical and Industrial Institute. Resolution. North Carolina Presbyterian.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Synod convened at 3 P. M. and resumed business.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Board of Directors of the Academical and Industrial Institute, Rev. J. Rumple, D. D., chairman, presented the following report, which was received and adopted:

1. That Synod has heard with pleasure of the success which has attended the efforts made in behalf of that institution, and would commend Rev. Simon G. Walker, its efficient Superintendent, and his work to the confidence and liberality of our people.

2. That Synod appoints Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D., and Rev. A. J. McKelway Trustees to succeed themselves.

3. Rev. R. E. Caldwell is appointed to succeed Rev. W. D. Morton, D. D., removed from our bounds; Mr. Edward Finley to succeed Mr. John Finley, deceased and Mr. — Montenstle to succeed Mr. C. E. Graham, removed from our bounds.

The Synod then heard Rev. S. G. Walker concerning the Academical and Industrial Institute, of which he is Superintendent and Financial Agent.

At the conclusion of this address the following resolution was presented and adopted:

The Synod directs that one-third of the December collection for Colored Work be applied to the Academical and Industrial Institute at North Wilkesboro, and that this one-third be sent to Mr. Geo. W. Watts, Durham, N. C., who is the treasurer of this fund; and the Stated Clerk is directed to publish this action in the North Carolina Presbyterian.

Rev. P. H. Hoge, D. D., presented the report of the special committee on the *North Carolina Presbyterian*. It is as follows:

Your committee would report that soon after the adjournment of the last Synod it sent out a circular to each of our ministers asking reports on the circulation of the paper (1) among the elders (2) among the deacons and (3) among the families of the congregation. From the meager reports received it appears that a large number of our elders and deacons fail to take the paper,

and that only a small proportion of the families that are able to take it are supplied with it.

The circular also asked for suggestions for the improvement of the paper. Some of the suggestions made were impracticable for lack of money, others would involve the sacrifice of more important things. The most important suggestion was that a Young People's Column be added. This has been done and other improvements have been made or will soon be added.

The committee recommends no action to be taken at this time, but asks to be continued and that the place of Dr. Preston be filled and a member be appointed from Asheville Presbytery.

The report was approved and the committee was continued. Rev. J. W. Stagg was put in the place of Rev. J. A. Preston, D. D., deceased; and Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D., was added from Asheville Presbytery.

The following resolution was presented and adopted :

Resolved. That the Stated Clerk of the Synod be and is hereby directed to have printed in the Appendix to the Minutes of this meeting of Synod a list of the Ruling Elders and Deacons in the Synod.

Rev. Wm. Black was re-elected Superintendent of Synodical Home Missions for the ensuing year. The ruling elders of the committee were re-elected, except Mr. C. E. Graham, who has removed from the State; and his place was filled by the election of Mr. A. G. Brenizer.

Mr. W. A. Blair, of Asheville, was elected as the ruling elder from Asheville Presbytery.

Synod took recess until after the installation service to-night.

EVENING SESSION.

Synod met after recess and resumed its business.

The following resolution of thanks was presented and adopted by a rising vote:

Resolution of Thanks. Adjournment.

The Synod of North Carolina returns its thanks for the abounding hospitality of the good people of New Berne church, who have so gracefully entertained the members of Synod, and to the choir of the church for their inspiring music. It acknowledges its indebtedness to the New Berne Journal, the New Berne Chronicle, the Charlotte Observer and the Raleigh News and Observer for their courtesy in publishing the news of the Synod; and to the railroads of the State for the reduction in the fare.

The roll was called before final adjournment.

The minutes of the fourth day's session were read and approved.

The Synod then adjourned to paget in the Presbyterian church, Salisbury, N.C., on Tuesday, November 2nd, 1897, at 7:30 o'clock, P. M.

Closed with singing, prayer and the Apostolic Benediction.



REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SYNODICAL MISSIONS.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

Your committee in submitting this, its Eighth Annual Report, desires to record its gratitude to God for His manifest blessing upon the work entrusted to its care during the year ending November 1st, 1896.

The work of the evangelists in preaching the Gospel has been greatly blessed and every department of the work shows encouraging progress except the financial support given to it by our churches.

The work this year was begun with a debt of \$928,00, (which was reported at last Synod,) and the receipts since then have been inadequate to permit any new work to be undertaken, though such was greatly desired, and insufficient for paying off the debt of last year; so that while our total receipts are about \$100,00 more this year than last, your committee finds itself still with a debt of about \$800,00.

There are many things upon which much labor was expended and which it is believed will result in much good, that can never be tabulated or reduced to figures, and therefore when your committee undertakes to lay before Synod the results of the work done, it is obvious that such report must be imperfect. Still it believes enough will appear to show that it is a great mistake for the Synod to fail in supporting this department of mission work.

THE SUPERINTENDENT,

Rev. William Black, has been in the constant employment of the committe^e during the year, and besides discharging the duties of the office of Secretary and Treasurer, (writing and mailing more than 600 letters and 5,000 circulars, and collecting and receipting for and disbursing more than \$4,400 00.) has held twenty-one meetings, assisted in two others, and preached more than 365 times in twenty-six churches, and in nineteen different counties, firaised in these meetings more than \$2,000.00 and added to the Presbyterian Church 446 members on profession of faith.

REV. J. W. WAKEFIELD,

Evangelist in Brunswick county, began work in July and supplied regularly the organized churches of New Hope and Shallotte, besides several mission points, and is the only Presbyterian minister in this county. As a part of the result of his work just began there have already been twenty additions to membership, one church organized, one Sunday school organized, and the work generally is in a most hopeful condition.

REV. C. W. ROBINSON,

Evangelist in Wilkes, Surry, Yadkin and Ashe Counties, supplies regularly the organized churches of North Wilkesboro, Wilkesboro and Elkin and four other mission points in the counties above named, and visits as opportunities occur, many other places in these counties, sometimes preaching or holding prayer meetings or other services as occasion suggests; has held 231 services, 31 professions of religion, 7 additions to Presbyterian Church, one church built, two Sunday schools organized with one hundred pupils, one day school with a consecrated Christian worker in charge, one church building repaired within and without, and the prospect of the whole work brighter than ever before.

REV. D. J. CURRIE,

Pastor of the Presbyterian church at Chapel Hill and also at New Hope, a country church not far away. The students at the University attend the services well, and there have been 18 additions to the Church for the year, ten to Uhapel Hill and eight to New Hope Church and the Sunday schools are doing well and the whole work hopeful.

REV. L. A. M'LAURIN,

Has had charge of the work in Mitchell county since January, and supplies regularly the churches at Elk Park, Spruce Pine, Cove Ureek and Linville, and also seven or eight other places, including Bakersville, the county seat. Has preached about 150 times, held a number of prayer meetings and other services, looked after the interest of the day schools, and there have been six additions to the Church membership.

EDGAR TUFT AND L. E. BOSTIAN.

The former supplied the Watauga field during the summer months and the latter since September 1st. Four members have been added to the Church, one church completed and dedicated, the schools have been looked after, and the general outlook is favorable. There are three churches in this county, all of which are supplied with preachers, besides several mission points. The day schools heretofore reported from Mitchell and Watauga are still kept up and are doing well.

REV. BART. SOULIER,

Is pastor of the Waldensian church at Valdese, and reports the work in good condition. Regular preaching and other religious services are held by him, and besides their Sunday school, there is a good day school and the children and grown people are learning to speak English and nre better satisfied and contented and have a more home-like feeling, and the out look is generally favorable. There have been seventeen additions to the Church during the year, and the church now has 112 members.

REV. A. K. POOL,

Evangelist in Cabarrus and Stanly counties, preaches at Odell mills and Cannon mills in Concord, at Patterson's mills, and Beulah church in Stanly county, and occasionally at other points. There have been twenty-five additions to membership, one church organized, one church built and three Sunday schools organized, and the work which was only begun in May is in a most flourishing condition.

ALBEMARLE PRESBYTERY.

The Synod aids the mission work in this Presbytery instead of selecting special fields, and there are nine evangelists supported in part by this fund, who preached the Gospel in thirteen counties, and as part of the result of their labors there have been eighty-six additions to membership, one church organized, five Sunday schools organized, one church built, and three churches repaired at a cost of more than \$1,200 00, which money was raised by these evangelists. There are at least two or three places where we confidently expect new churches can be organized very soon.

In reviewing the mission work of the Presbyteries we note:

ORANGE PRESBYTERY.

Orange Presbytery has contributed during the year for Presbyterial Missions, \$2,530.00; for local Missions, \$\$867.00; General Assembly Missions, \$299,00, Synodical Missions, \$558.00; employs six evangelists, who report about 100 additions to membership, one church organized, two churches repaired, two Sunday schools organized and one day school under Church control.

CONCORD PRESBYTERY.

Concord Presbytery employs eight men, whose salaries in whole or in part are paid by the Presbyterial Committee, and has raised for Presbyterial Missions \$1,400.00, for Synodical Missions \$688.00, for General Assembly Missions \$327.00. About fifty-four additions

FAYETTEVILLE PRESBYTERY.

Fayetteville Presbytery has three men aided by the Home Mission Committee, and raised \$1,500.00 for Presbyterial Missions, \$1.280.00 for Synodical

Missions, \$240.00 for General Missions, and \$300.00 for Local Missions. There have been two local evangelists at work all the time and one general evangelist for nine months, there have been two churches organized and about 175 additions to the membership.

MECKLENBURG PRESBYTERY

Mecklenburg Presbytery employs ten men whose salaries in whole or part are paid by the Presbyterial Committee, and during the year raised \$2,000,00 for Presbyterial Missions, \$592.00 for Synodical Missions, \$373.00 for General Assembly Missions, and \$1,800,00 for Local Missions. There were three churches built, two churches organized, two Sunday schools organized and 107 additions to the churches. The Synod was very anxious to open up a new work with the co-operation of the Presbytery in Madison county, but on account of the scarcity of funds and the failure to obtain a suitable man for the work, it had to be postponed. The late Dr. Preston pledged for the Young Ladies' Missionary Society of Charlotte First Church a liberal contribution for this work, and the officers of this society have since written acknowledging the obligation and shown themselves much interested in the work, and, no doubt, now that this county is put in a new Presbytery whose territory is almost entirely mission, these funds will still be available for the work as soon as a suitable man can be obtained.

WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY.

There are five evangelists at work in this Presbytery, and the outlook is perhaps more favorable than ever before. There were 70 additions to the Church, two churches organized, one church built, two Sunday schools organized, one day kindergarten school organized and supported entirely by the First Presbyterian church of Wilmington for the benefit of the poor. The Wilmington churches have organized a Home Mission Leagne and will undertake to support one evangelist. The Presbytery has raised for Local Missions, \$1,250.00; Presbyterial Missions, \$387.00; Synodical Missions, \$581.00; General Assembly Missions, \$204.00.

ALBEMARLE PRESBYTERY.

Albemarle Presbytery has raise for Presbyterial Missions, \$750.00; Synodical Missions, \$571.00; General Assembly Missions, \$184.00. It received from the Synod since last report, \$800.00 for mission work in its own bounds.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

As a general summary of all the mission work done in this State, we have the following statement:

Putting together the work of the Synods and Presbyteries and local missions and omitting duplicates we have 44 men aided by mission funds, 8 churches organized, 5 churches built, 5 churches repaired, 11 Sunday schools organized, 12 day schools maintained, and 1,061 members added to the churches.

Your committee would impress upon the mind of Synod the fact that the one sole essential for maintaining and enlarging this work is a larger income. In every other feature it has been blessed; God's Spirit has been poured out upon the labors of the superintendent and of the local missionaries. There has been no friction with the Presbyterial work, but the most absolute harmony and the closest co-operation. Fields have been developed that must otherwise have remained destitute, and by every manifestation of His favor God beekons us on to the continuance and enlargement of this work. Your committee would therefore submit to the prayerful consideration of Synod the following:

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. Synod recognizing the need of a more active prosecution of the financial side of the committee's work and not wishing to draw more of the superintendent's time from the evangelistic work in which he has been so eminently blessed, authorizes the committee to secure the services for the whole or a part of his time of an assistant superintendent.

2 Synod calls upon Presbyterial Committees, pastors and sessions to cooperate with the Synodical Committee in securing the proper presentation of

this cause to all our churches and would arge that whenever adequate presentation cannot be secured in the times allotted for it, efforts should be made by subscription or otherwise to make up within the year at least the sum apportioned each church.

 Synod apportions the sum of \$5,000.00 for Synodical Mission work as follows: Mecklenburg, \$750.00; Fayetteville, \$950.00; Orange, \$950.00; Concord, \$900.00; Wilmington, \$750.00; Albemarle, \$500.00; Asheville, \$200.00.

 Synod commends the broad field of the southwest under the care of our Assembly's Committee to the liberality of the people and apportions the sum of \$3,000.00 for this cause as follows: Fayetteville, \$600.00; Orange, \$600.00; Concord, \$600.00; Mecklenburg, \$600.00; Wilmington, \$400.00; Albemarle, \$200.00; Asheville, \$100.00

5. Synod would express its appreciation of the zeal and activity with which its Presbyteries have been prosecuting their work. The creation of a new Presbytery out of the Western Mission Field and the employment of Presbyterial superintendents or general evangelists in several of the Presbyteries indicate the increased interest of our people in this cause, and the increased prosperity of this work. For all of which Synod expresses its gratitude to God.

Publication and Colportage.

REPORT OF SYNOD'S AGENT OF PUBLICATION AND COLPORTAGE.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

Your Agent of Publication and Colportage would report :

1. One hundred and sixty-nine churches gave \$878 to this cause from April, 1895, to April, 1896. This is an increase of fourteen contributing churches over the preceding year and a gain of \$6 in contributions as follows:

2. Synod has had no colporteur in the field during the year. Fayetteville and Mecklenburg have had colporteurs for a few months, selling and distributing books. Some books have been given and sold by members of churches in Wlimington Presbytery under direction of your Agent during the year.

3. Donations have been made of papers and books for Sabbath schools at the request of Presbyterial agents.

According to the instructions of the General Assembly the Committee of Publication has made additional improvements in the Sabbath school Lesson Helps—giving improvements in these helps—with supplementing lessons. The editorial force has been increased and the publications made more vuluable. It gives your Agent pleasure to testify that our Lesson Helps are equal to the best and at a cost as cheap as any of the best available helps on these lessons, strictly denominational.

The Committee of Publication has issued valuable books and tracts during the year and deserves the support and sympathy of all our churches. The secretary, Dr. Høzen, continues to execute efficiently the will of his committee for the Assembly.

Foreign Missions.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

The Seventh Annual Report of the Standing Committee on Foreign Missions is as follows:

The year of 1895–'96, will be long remembered by the lovers of the cause of missions. It has been a season of intense anxiety to those who have had the management of matters relating to the world's evangelization.

Our Church has stood face to face with a threatened deficiency in its funds to carry forward the Master's work. The embarrassment was the greater, because in confidence and hope the Executive Committee had sent forth 19 new missionaries, increasing the whole force in the mission field to 142. In addition, there have been many of the s ins and daughters of our Church, asking to be returned to their posts of duty or else to be allowed to go ont for the first time that they might enter this glad service for Christ.

In this emergency there was nothing to be done but to carry the needs of the cause in greater faith to Him who is "Head over all things to the Church," Accordingly, the people of God were called to observe a week of special prayer, lingering humbly at the throne of grace and entreating that God might be pleased to reveal His arm of power. The result has been just what we had reason to expect-giving us a new illustration of the fact that "prayer can turn every crisis in the history of the Church of our ascended Lord and King." It is His prerogative to touch the hearts and make them responsive to the crying needs of His work. This He has done in a way that must quicken our faith and awaken in every soul sincere gratitude and praise. Had this report been submitted three weeks ago it would have sent forth a wail of complaint that the treasury was empty and the cause of the Master in all its interests was imperilled. Instead of this, to-day we can ring out the glad news that a great tidal wave of liberatity has swept over the Church, and the secretary authorizes the statement that the crisis has passed and the fear of debt removed. The collection in October brought to the treasury \$21,019.19, which is \$9,000 more than last year, and \$3 000 in excess of the gifts of the people ever before at this point of the ecclesiastical year. So that while on October 1st, there was a deficit of \$6,000, on November 1st, there was a surplus of \$3,000. This is good tidings.

Foreign Missions.

indeed, and should be caught up and carried to every congregation in this Synod. However, let it not be misunderstood. It must be the incentive for greater effort and in no sense, an excuse for inaction. Half the year still lies before us with increasing demand for enlarged contributions to meet the necessary expenses of the work. One fact needs to be emphasized. Last year we received about \$14,000 from legacies and yet up to the present time only \$4,000 has been received from this source. If this deficiency continues the loss must be made good by the gifts of the entire Church.

SYNOD'S WORK.

This general view leads us to a more careful survey of the work in our own immediate territory. In all the reports it is learned with pleasure that our synod has gone beyond its gifts of the last two years.

Our contributions are \$2,101 in excess of last year, and the whole amount given was \$21,007, making an average gift of 65 cents per member.

A closer study of the reports before us will give a still more gratifying view of the faithfulness of our churches.

The banner Presbytery is Wilmington, giving \$3,543, or \$1.12 per member: Mecklenburg gave \$6,216 or 70 cents per member; Orange gave \$3,458 or 68 cents per member: Albemarle gave \$1,112 or 55 cents per member; Concord gave \$2,717 or 53 cents per member; Fayetteville gave \$3,961 or 51 cents per member.

NON-CONTRIBUTING CHURCHES.

We have 69 churches out of 341 which failed to contribute to Foreign Missions as follows:

Albemarke has 11 out of 30 churches; Concord has 13 out of 51; Fayetteville has 1 out of 77; Mecklenburg has 19 out of 86; Orange has 9 out of 53: Wilmington has 17 out of 44.

SOCIETIES.

There are 31 men's, 141 ladies' and 40 children's societies in the bounds of our Synod, as follows: Albemarle, men, ——; ladies', 6; children's, 3; Concord, men, 1; ladies', 7; children's, 16; Mecklenburg, men, 14; ladies', 25; children's, 7; Orange, men, 6; ladies', 19; children's, 3; Wilmington, men, 2; ladies', 14; children's, 4.

Foreign Missions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The children of the Church have contributed to this cause through 73 Sabbath schools, giving \$1,019.19, as follows: Albemarle, two schools, \$14,86; Concord, seven schools, \$131,59; Fayetteville, eighteen schools, \$186,21; Mecklenburg, twenty schools, \$313,18; Orange, seventeen schools, \$126,05; Wilmington, nine schools, \$246,30.

MISSIONARIES.

Our Synod has reason to feel proud that so many of her sons and daughters are entering the mission field. A few years ago there were only three representatives in foreign lands. Last year we reported thirteen missionaries and this year the number has been, or will be in a few weeks, increased to fifteen or sixteen. In this connection we are glad to call attention to the fact that a number of our churches and individual members are undertaking the support of missionaries. A significant fact is that several groups of country churches have arranged to support our outgoing missionaries. This suggests the possibility of an effort among a larger number of our country charges.

REPORT OF AGENT OF MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

1. Your Agent makes report that Synod has now 74 candidates, distributed as follows, viz.: Concord, 15; Orange, 19; Wilmington, 5: Fayetteville, 8; Albemarle, 5; Mecklenburg, 21: total, 73. This is the same number of candidates that were enrolled last year.

2. The Synod contributed to this cause for the year 1896, \$1,137,48, distributed as follows by Presbyteries, viz.: Albemarle, \$64.30; Concord, \$206.99; Fayetteville, \$275.23: Orange, \$413.92; Wilmington, \$177.04; total, \$1,-137.48.

3. The Assembly's Committee appropriated to the Synod's candidates \$2,132.50, whereby the Synod became a beneficiary of the Assembly to the amount of \$995.02, or nearly one-half the amount needed by our candidates.

We offer the following recommendations, viz.:

1. That pastors and sessions exercise cantion in encouraging candidates for the ministry, especially in the early stage of their studies, as to becoming beneficiaries of the Church, and urge them, as far as practicable, to depend upon their own resonrces and personal efforts for support.

2. That our pastors present from their pulpits, and in private, the claims and call to the Gospel ministry, that parents and their sons have this claim and cause of the Lord constantly on their hearts and consciences.

3. That the chairmen of Committees of Ministerial Education be encouraged, wherever practicable, to visit the churches of their Presbyteries and present and press this claim and call upon our young men, and visit also the male schools within their Presbyteries, for the same cause and purpose.

4. That our pastors and sessions so present this cause to their congregations as to win and maintain their allegiance and liberal contributions to it.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

The Synod's Committee of Church and Christian Education beg leave to make the following report :

The past year has been marked with great prosperity and progress in all the departments of this work.

1 Davidson College has had the largest attendance in her history, and the work done has been eminently satisfactory. She was greatly bereaved in the death of her senior professor, Dr. W. J. Martin, so long a tower of strength to the College. The Alumni have undertaken to build a Science Hall as a memorial of his life and labors in the cause of Church Education. Three thousand dollars have been subscribed in part of the fifteen thousand needed.

2. Peace Institute also was never more flourishing, and the work she is doing for the Master is beyond price. It behooves the Synod to exhaust every means of establishing close and permanent relations with this school. The Presbyterians of the State could hardly do a better thing than to invest \$50,-000 in that institution. The Church must maintain a fair and honorable rivalry with the State.

3. Female education has been more emphasized during the past year than perhaps ever before. Three female colleges or seminaries have been founded and successfully started. The Presbytery of Fayetteville has founded one at Red Springs, having expended over \$6,000 on the building. The Presbyteries of Concord and Mecklenburg have founded one in Charlotte, N. C. and have already expended \$10,000 in part payment for the property, repairs, and furnishing. The Statesville Female College has also been purchased for the Presbyterian Church and over siz thousand dollars expended in part payment for the property, repairs, and furnishing. It is the purpose of these three schools to furnish a thorough education on such terms that it may be in reach of all.

4. Much progress has been made likewise in preparatory schools, academies, parochial schools, mission schools, and private school enterprises, with promise of increasing usefulness from year to year. Synod's Committee will present a special report on Parochial Schools at this meeting.

Church and Christian Education.

5. It will be seen from the financial statement herewith submitted that a a larger number of churches contributed to this cause than ever before. The aggregate, however, is not increased, owing, no doubt, to the large amounts contributed to the female schools named, and to local enterprises. Eighty-five churches have contributed \$832,80. Of this amount \$71,22 went directly to the Mebane High School from Orange Presbytery; \$156,00 to the mountain schools in Concord Presbytery and \$350,00 to Davidson College. This leaves \$254-58, less\$ 9.91 expenses, which has been disbursed by your committee as follows: To Red Springs Seminary, \$43,76; to the Mountain Mission schools in Concord Presbytery \$43,00; and to Davidson College \$158,91. No mention is made of monies specially raised for local purposes.

 Your Agent and Chairman sent the usual circular letter to the charches as authorized, and will do so again unless otherwise instructed.

SPECIAL REPORT ON PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS.

An overture from Orange Presbytery to the last meeting of Synod, on the subject of Parochial Schools, was approved by Synod and the following answer was given:

"That the overture be granted, and the Synod's Committee of Church and Christian Education be appointed to perform the duties contemplated in the overture."

Your Committee would recommend the following action:

 It is both proper and desirable for the Church to control and direct the primary and preparatory education of her children, male and female, as far as circumstances may permit.

2. To this end we recommend to the consideration of all churches, the establishing of Parochial Schools in every parish or congregation, which shall either be independent of or supplementary to public or private schools already in existence.

Minutes of the Synod of North Carolina.

Church and Christian Education.

3. We recommend the Presbyteries to found and foster schools in all their mission fields, and we do especially recommend to our well established churches to use such schools in their local mission work, and also to assist the schools founded by Presbyteries in their mission fields through the collection for Church and Christian Education, and otherwise.

4. We propose to the churches the following Constitution for Parochial Schools for uniform adoption:

1. The Presbyterian church of — does undertake to establish a school, to be under Church control, as a Christian school.

2. The sole government and administration of the school shall be vested in a Board of Trustees of three members appointed by the session, whose terms of office shall be one, two, and three years, respectively, and the session shall fill vacancies as they recur, electing for three-year terms. Two members shall constitute a quorum.

3. The school shall be limited in its scope and design to primary and preparatory education, male or female, or both.

4. The Bible shall be used as a text book throughout the school in such measure and proportion as the Board may determine, so as to make the school distinctively a Christian school; and the standards of the Church, also, as far as it may be found practicable.

5. The Board shall have power to raise and disburse monies and to hold property in trust in furtherance of this object if necessary.

6. The Board shall, at their discretion, found and develop the school as rapidly as the means in hand may justify without incurring debt.

7. The Board shall adopt their own by-laws subject to the limitations of this paper, which shall be of the nature of fundamental law to the Board in the execution of their trust.

8. In case it shall ever prove desirable to secure a charter of incorporation, the provisions of this paper shall be incorporated into the charter, or else adopted as a fixed part of the by-laws.

9. This paper, *mutatis mutandis*, is recommended to the Presbyteries for the founding of Presbyterial schools of any grade.

Academical and Industrial Institute.

REPORT ON ACADEMICAL AND INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

The Board held its annual meeting in New Berne, N. C., November 11th, 1896. A quorum of five members were present. The report of Rev. S. G. Walker for 1895-'96, which was submitted, along with the financial statement, set forth the following facts, viz.:

The school was run seven months and thirty-seven pupils were enrolled, ineluding six boarders, representing five counties. One teacher was employed whose work was admirably supplemented by the superintendent.

Two dosmitories, a ten room building for girls and a three room building for boys, have been erected during the year at a cost of \$550. Two other buildings, a kitchen and work-shop, are in course of erection which, when furnished, will give us a plant of large and attractive grounds and five suitable buildings worth \$1,800.

The terms of Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D., and Rev. A. J. McKelway, expire at this meeting of Synod. Mr. John Finley, of the term expiring 1898, has died. While Rev. W. D. Morton, D. D., and Elder C. E. Graham have moved without the bounds of the Synod.

REPORT OF REGENTS OF ORPHANS' HOME

To the Synod of North Carolina :

The Orphans' Home of the Synod of North Carolina has become one of the fixed and cherished institutions of our Church, and needs no special commendation to your favorable notice by its Board of Regents. The work that the Home is doing is its own sufficient commendation; and the support which it receives is evidence of the place which it holds in the hearts of our people. Our Seventh Annual Report will therefore be occupied in a simple statement of such facts as the Synod has a right to expect from its Board of Regents.

I .-- MEETINGS OF REGENTS.

Your Board of Regents having met and organized and elected its own officers, together with a superintendent, teachers and matrons for the Home, and given directions for the management of the Home to an efficient Executive Committee, has found it necessary to hold but two meetings during the year. These meetings were attended as follows, viz.; Rev. W. R. McLelland attended two meetings. Dr. M. W. Hill, two; Mr. S. C. Rankin, one: Mr. John E. Oates, two; Rev. J. Rumple, D. D., two; Rev. D. I. Craig, two; Rev. C. G. Vardell, one; Rev. H. G. Hill, D. D., two; Geo. W. Watts one and Geo. E. Wilson, Esq., one.

The terms of office of Geo. W. Watts, Esq., and of Geo. E. Wilson, Esq., expire at this time, and the Synod is requested to fill these vacancies.

II -- INTERNAL AFFAIRS.

The annual report of our faithful and efficient superintendent has been presented and approved. From this document we learn that eighty-one children fifty girls and thirty-one boys—have enjoyed the privileges of the Home during the past yeat—the average attendance being seventy-four. This large attendance has crowded our rooms to their full capacity and yet it has been necessary to refuse many deserving applicants or postpone their reception until we prepare larger accommodations.

The health of the children has been remarkably good, only one case of serious illness occurring during the year, and that one not originating in the Home.

We are glad to report that the educational department has been improved, that three competent teachers are now giving their best thought and labor to the work, and that the children are making satisfactory progress. The school has been graded, and monthly examinations are held. Four hours are spent every afternoon, five days in the week, in the school room, the primary classes having an extra hour of study in the forenoon, and the advanced classes two hours of study in the evening. The forenoons are spent in various industrial occupations snited to the capacities of the children.

The high moral tone of the institution has been maintained, and in some respects improved. Religious instruction is imparted at the morning and evening religious exercises, and especially on the Subbath, and the children are trained in the art of singing – A number of them are members of the Church, and give promise of usefulness in the Master's Kingdom. One boy, of good principles, and respectable gifts, who has left the institution, at the expiration of his sixteenth year, manifests a desire to enter the gospel ministry, if the way should open to him.

We desire to call special attention to our bi-weekly paper, *Our Fatherless Ones*, published at the Home.

This paper has brought into the treasury \$208.18 above the cost of its publication, and the profits would have been more than doubled had all arrears been paid in. Cannot our ministers and church members make a special effort to enlarge its circulation? Aside from its earnings, by the news which it contains concerning the Home, it brings our people in touch with this important work.

From the above statement it will be seen that the Support Fund at the close of the year was overdrawn by \$102 14, and our children have been saved from absolute want only by drawing upon the surplus of the Press Fund for over one hundred dollars. Our sole dependence, under God, is upon our people, and we would urge upon them not to forget that the wants of the large family of children, which they have encouraged us to undertake to support, are as constant and unremitting as the wants of any private family.

We would also remind our people that the period just before Thanksgiving is apt to find us with an exhausted treasury and unusual demands for winter outfits. There is, therefore, urgent need for some system of regular supply, such as is afforded by monthly contributions. The last number of *Our Fatherless Ones* contains a list of forty-eight individuals, Sunday schools and soci-

eties, who have promised to make monthly contributions for the support of the orphans. This number might easily be doubled, and in that event an average of two or three dollars per month from each would afford a comfortable revenue.

Your Board of Regents would again recommend that a contribution to the Support Fund by each church in the bounds of the Synod be made on Thanksgiving day, or as soon thereafter as practicable. The increased number of children, and other circumstances, demand that this contribution be as liberal as possible. There is no more acceptable manner of expressing thanks to God than feeding the hurgry and caring for the fatherless.

IV. -THE CENTRE BUILDING.

Encouraged by the resolution of the last Synod, declaring "that every proper effort be made to raise the necessary funds for the erection and completion of the Centre Building within the next twelve months," your Board of Regents have made repeated efforts by public appeals by circulars, and in some instances by personal applications, to raise the funds that were necessary to do the work. These efforts have been only partially successful, but sufficiently so to encourage the Executive Committee to appoint a Building Committee with instructions to commence the work when \$5,000.00 should be on hand or in sight, with the hope that funds might come in as they progressed to enable them to finish. Two bequests were made to the institution-one of \$2,000.00 by Mrs. Edwin G. Reade, of Raleigh, and one of \$1,000.00 by Miss Jennie Johnson, of Charlotte. The latter of these was promptly paid in by the executor, but the former will not be available before sometime next year. Under the circumstances, the work has been begun and, at the period of writing, the walls have been carried to the second floor. It is the order of the Regents that the walls be put up and covered in with a roof before the severity of the winter sets in. Whether it shall be completed or not depends upon the promptness with which outstanding pledges are met, and the liberality with which certain churches that have not yet contributed shall respond. Your Board of Regents do not feel authorized to place a debt upon the institution under any circumstances. It therefore remains for the generous people of the Synod of North Carolina to say whether the work shall go on at once to completion, or whether the walls shall stand as a monument to those who began to build and were not able to finish. The additional accommodations which this building will furnish are urgently needed, and we hope and pray that our kind-hearted people will

not hesitate to come to the rescue at once. The Board of Regents have requested their president to visit a few of our churches to secure the needed funds, and, Providence permitting, he will endeavor to do so as soon as practicable.

V.-LIST AND VALUE OF PROPERTY.

The property of the Home has been kept in good repair, and some small additions made to the outbuildings and furnishings. The farm, orchards and grounds generally are in an improved condition. But the general state does not differ materially from what it was last year, viz.:

They would have been glad to have accomplished greater results in the erection of the Centre Building, but are hopeful that our people will come to the help of the Lord, in carrying out what manifestly seems to be His purpose in regard to His fatherless ones.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

Your committee respectfully submits the following report :

First a comparative statement of the condition of the work in 1895-'96:

From this we see that in Albemarle this branch of the work has barely held its own. Concord has made some advance, reporting 61 more teachers and 495 more scholars.

In Fayetteville there is also a slight advance in the report of Presbytery, but a decided falling off if we take the figures from the General-Assembly Minutes – The increase is 27 teachers and 197 scholars. Mecklenburg also had ad vanced, reporting 22 additional teachers and 129 scholars. The same is true of Orange, 67 more teachers and 89 scholars. Wilmington has barely held her own.

There is a general advance in the work, the total of scholars passing the 20,000 mark and teachers nearly reaching 2,500.

We note a falling off in the number of schools reporting, 13 less than last year. Ninety-eight of our 341 churches have no school and sent no report to either Presbytery, Synod or General Assembly.

In Fayetteville, Orange and Concord the Sunday school is being vigorously pushed as an evangelizing agency. Fayetteville reports 54 churches and 71 Sunday Schools.

schools, 29 churches not reporting. Orange 43 churches, 52 schools, 10 not reporting. Concord reports 5 churches having 2 schools each and 2 having 3 schools each.

The problems that especially lie before us are, 1st: How to get reports from churches having schools and not reporting them; 2nd, and more important, how to establish schools in churches having no schools, and to this end we recommend:

1st. That a committee be appointed by Presbytery to visit these churches and take particular note of these facts and make a special report on the case to Presbytery.

2nd. Presbyterial Agents be directed, by correspondence and personal visitation, so far as possible, to try and remedy this state of affairs by establishing schools in these churches.

3rd. That, when it is found impracticable to establish a school on account of the scattered state of the congregation, or because the numbers are few, every effort be made to establish a 'Home Study' department that shall be reported as the school of that church.

SPECIAL REPORT ON COLORED EVANGELIZATION.

To the Synod of North Carolina :

Your special committee appointed in the absence of the permanent committee, to bring in a report on Colored Evangelization, would make the following report:

It appears from the reports of the six Presbyteries, for the year ending April 1, 1896, that there are some indications of the work which point to more hopeful prospects and results in the future.

One is the increased number of churches contributing to the cause, although the aggregate amount contributed is scarcely as much as was contributed last year.

Another indication to hopefulness and encouragement is the apparent increase of time, attention and interest given to the discussion of this great cause in the meetings of Presbyteries. These are hopeful indications, and combined with other favorable features of the work are matters of devout thankfulness to God.

But on the other hand, there are features of the work which are very depressing in their nature, and very discouraging. The great and growing need of funds, the meagre contributions, and the total lack of any visible prospect of organizing a single Presbytery within our bounds are matters to be greatly deplored.

These facts become apparent from the following:

Albemarle Presbytery now has no work in hand. During the year she organized a church and ordained a minister, but both have been transferred to the Cape Fear Presbytery of the Northern Assembly. She has one candidate for the ministry at Tuscaloosa Institute, and contributed \$129 as against \$106 last year.

Mecklenburg Presbytery will soon have no work in hand. The Rev. Mr. Morrow and his church, it is understood, will soon be transferred to the Northern Assembly. This Presbytery contributed \$382, as against \$470 last year.

Concord Presbytery has no work in hand, and contributed \$125, as against \$114 last year.

Colored Evangelization.

Fayetteville Presbytery has no work in hand, and contributed \$158, as against \$128 last year.

Wilmington Presbytery has no work in hand, and contributed \$85, as against \$115 last year.

Orange Presbytery alone has work in hand and men in the field. She has two ministers and one candidate at Tuscaloosa Institute. She has also contributed \$251, as against \$246 last year.

The Rev. S. G. Walker, a faithful and consecrated man, is doing a good work at North Wilkesboro and elsewhere, under the most trying and difficult circumstances, in his efforts to teach and preach the Gospel to his people, and at the same time to firmly establish and equip the Industrial School. He needs the encouragement, sympathy and help of the Synod.

REPORT ON UNION THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

To the Synod of North Carolina:

The Board of Directors and Trustees of Union Theological Seminary in Virginia report to the Synod of North Carolina that every member of the Board attended the annual meeting in May, 1896. Rev. G. W. Finley, D. D., Rev. J W. Rosebro, D. D., and Rev. L. B. Johnston, from the Synod of Virginia, and Ruling Elder H. L. Smith, of the Synod of North Carolina, having been duly appointed directors, by their respective Synods, were qualified and elected Trustees and enrolled.

Sixty-five students were in attendance during the session now ended. The faculty testify to the diligence and good deportment of the students, and the Examining Committee of this Board report the gratifying proofs of faithful and successful instruction given by the professors. The health of the students has generally been good, but one student was obliged by ill health to leave the Seminary.

We regret to report that Professor T. C. Johnson was compelled by ill health to be absent from his chair for several months: but such arrangements were made by him, as to reduce the loss of his classes to a minimum, and we hope that his temporary sojonrn in Florida has so far improved his health that he will be able to resume full work at the beginning of the next session.

Certificates were bestowed upon the following young gentlemen of the Senior Class, viz.: E. W. Brown, John M. Caldwell, John Josiah Fix, Wm. J. King, Walter Lee Lingle, C. W. McDonald, R. L. McNair, John Wakefield, D. K. Wathall, David Junkin Woods, Malcolm Graham Woodworth, W. C. Brown, A. Mc-Laughlin, W. L. Milne, H. R. Overcash and Ivanhoe Robertson

The Board is happy to report that Dr. G. B. Strickler has accepted its call to be professor of Systematic Theology, and will enter upon the duties of the chair at the beginning of next session.

The Board also elected Mr. W. L. Lingle, of the Senior Class, to be tutor in Hebrew and Greek, Librarian and Intendent for the next year.

For three years Dr. C. R. Vaughan has taught Theology with great satisfaction to the Board, and now that his services to the Seminary are terminated

at this time, the Board records its grateful appreciation of the fidelity, ability and success with which Dr. Vaughan has discharged the duties of professor of Theology.

The library now contains 15,187 volumes.

The address to the graduating class of this year was delivered by Rev. Dr. C. R. Hemphill, of the Louisville Seminary.

Your Board is sorry to report the deaths, during the year, of Rev. Dr's. T. L. Preston and W. T. Richardson, members of the Board from the Synod of Virginia, and Col. Wm. J. Martin, a member from the Synod of North Carolina. all of whom were truly faithful and efficient members of this Board.

STANDING RULES OF SYNOD.

Revised November, 1893.

1.-OF ENROLLMENT, ATTENDANCE AND ABSENCE.

1. The Stated Clerk, the pastor of the church in which the Synod holds its annual session, and the delegates of the session of said church shall constitute a Committee of Enrollment, who shall, at a convenient hour before the opening of the Synod, prepare the Roll of the Synod – And to the Committee of Enrollment shall each member report for enrollment upon appearing at Synod.

2. It shall be the duty of each member, unless released by a vote of the Synod, when providentially prevented from attending the Synod, to address a letter to the Moderator, stating reasons for his detention.

3. The Moderator shall at every meeting appoint a standing committee on Leave of Absence. To this committee all excuses for absence or late attendance, and for the latter, on the part of ruling elders as well as ministers, shall be rendered. The roll shall be called before final adjournment and those absent without permission shall be called to answer for such irregularity.

II -OF THE OFFICERS AND APPOINTEES OF SYNOD.

 A majority of all the votes given shall be necessary in the election of the officers of the Synod.

5. The Treasurer shall submit to the Synod annually his book together with a report of receipts and expenditures, presenting vonchers for the same.

 The Trustees of Synod shall be elected every four years, and they shall present annually a full written report of the funds in their hands.

7. Agents shall be appointed on each of the following departments of the Church's work, viz : Foreign Missions, Sustentation, Education, Publication, Evangelistic Labor and Sabbath Schools. And it shall be the duty of these Agents to take into consideration the whole field committed to their supervision, and to present at each meeting of Synod a written report of all that is doing within the bounds of Synod on the subjects severally assigned to them. The Agents for these respective subjects, or chairman of committees, in the several Presbyteries, shall forward to the Synodical Agents such reports as are needful

Standing Rules.

in the preparation of their reports to the Synod; and the Synod shall appoint Orders of the Day for each of these causes at each annual meeting. In connection with the Orders for Evangelistic Labor, the Synod will hear reports from Presbyterial Agents and Evangelists; and in connection with the consideration of Foreign Missions, a collection may also be taken for this object.

HI.-OF COMMITTEES.

8 A Standing Committee shall be appointed at each annual meeting, to whom the Statistical Reports of the Presbyteries shall be referred; and this committee shall condense the same and report to the Synod any matter contained in these reports calling for action by this body.

9 A Standing Committee shall be appointed at each annual meeting to whom the reports of the Presbyteries on Systematic Beneficence shall be referred; and this committee shall condense the same and report to the Synod recommending any action called for on this subject. The Presbyterial Reports shall cover the fiscal year of the Assembly.

10. A Standing Committee shall be appointed at each annual meeting to examine the Synodical Records and report thereon

IV .- OF THE STATED CLERK AND THE MINUTES.

11. The Stated Clerk shall forward to the Librarian of Union Theological Seminary and the Librarian of Davidson College, the Secretary of the Presbyterian Historical Society, and the Secretary of the North Carolina Historical Society, a copy of the Minutes of the Synod as published annually

12. He shall issue and sign certificates whenever necessary for the return of members and their families on the railroads of the State to their homes.

13. The Stated Clerk shall publish in the Appendix to the printed Minutes the reports of the Presbyteries furnishing statistics to the Synod; the statistics of the annual reports of the Synodical Agents, when approved by the Synod, requesting on behalf of the Synod, the publication of the full reports in the *North Carolina Presbyterian*; a list of the officers and appointees of the Synod; the Standing Rules of the Synod and a Docket of the business of the Synod at its next annual meeting.

14. The Stated Clerk shall publish in the Appendix to the printed Minutes, at least once in five years, the names of Ruling Elders and Dencons, with their respective postoffices, belonging to the churches composing the Synod; and the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries shall forward to the Stated Clerk of the Synod the information necessary for the execution of this rule.

Standing Rules.

V.-MISCELLANEOUS.

15. The Parliamentary Rules adopted by the General Assembly for 1886, and since that time observed by them, shall be the rules for the guidance of this Synod.

16. The Directors of the Union Theological Seminary, appointed by this Synod, shall render excuse to the Synod for non-attendance on any meeting of the Board, and if so absent without assigning sufficient excuse, his seat in the Board will be declared vacant.

17. The election of Stated Clerk and Synodical Agents shall be held in 1886, and every three years thereafter—the former to enter upon his duties at the opening of the Synod immediately succeeding that at which he is elected, and the latter to enter upon their duties immediately after the adjournment of the Synod which elected them. (Minutes 1883, page 240.)

18. It was made a Standing Rule that the Roll be called at the opening of the Synod, that those who have been enrolled by the Committee of enrollment may answer to their names. (Minutes 1885, page 612.)

19. The Committee on Leave of Absence was instructed not to grant leave of absence except for urgent reasons; and the Stated Clerk was directed to enter this action upon the Doeket of the next Synod for information and caution to members of the committee and of the Synod. (Minutes of 1885, page 615.)

20. When a vacancy occurs by death, resignation or removal beyond our bounds, in any of the offices of Synod (including the Stated Clerk, Agents and Directors of Union Theological Seminary) the Moderator is empowered to fill such vacancy until the next meeting of Synod, except in the case of those officers who are the heads of Synodical Committees, when the committee shall fill the vacancy. (Minutes 1891, page 579.)

21. Memorials of deceased ministers be read on Friday morning at each meeting of the Synod.

22. Resolved, That the Standing Orders of Synod be revised as follows:

(1.) That the Synodical Communion be held at 11 A.M. on the second day.

(2.) That the popular meeting in the interest of Foreign Missions he held Wednesday night.

(3.) That the popular meeting in the interest of Home Missions be held Thursday night.

(4.) That Friday night be given alternately to Sunday Schools and Colored Evangelization. (Minutes 1894, page 260.)
