Preface.

A BIRTHDAY marks the beginning of a life. This little book records not only the dates of birth of the workers of the Woman's Home Missionary Society, but the birthdays of the different Homes, Conference organizations, and other departments of work.

We trust the items may serve as a guide to suggest the subjects of our prayers for the Society. On the birthday of a Conference society we would naturally remember the organization, its officers, members, and work. When a Home is given a family and those for whom they toil would not be forgotten. On the heavenly birthday of a translated sister we would pray for the work she especially loved. What better time to remember by gift, letter, or prayer a Home, missionary, or deaconess than on their birthday?

We also have from the workers their favorite or helpful texts, which they pass on to others, some-

times adding a word of testimony, which brings before us more clearly their personality.

The dates will remain unchanged from year to year. The workers may retire or go to other fields; they will still need our prayers. If they pass to "the beyond" the work they leave behind will still need them.

We hope the book will prove helpful as a work of reference, as we have tried to secure exact dates, not approximate ones, and if not quite sure of a date we state the fact.

A few days in several of the months are filled with other items, but, as a rule, these suggest subjects of prayer.

We are sorry for the omissions, and doubtless there are many mistakes, but even with these we trust the book may prove a blessing and a help to the workers at home and on the field.

In January, 1900, Mrs. Sudo came from Japan to take Mrs. Takahashi's place; she resigned January 29, 1901. Miss Nakano and Miss Blois are the present workers. Mrs. Bishop Hamilton is Chairman of Committee for Hawaii.

January 4.

Miss Eva B. Hockersmith, Visiting Deaconess, Columbus Deaconess Home, Columbus, O. Birthplace, Iowa.

Her text: "My God shall supply all your need, according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus."

1888. Girls' Lodging House near Castle Garden, New York, opened its doors to unprotected immigrant women and girls.

January 5.

Miss Mary L. Haney, Deaconess, Moline, Ill. Birthplace, Abingdon, Ill.

Her text: "Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness."

January 6.

Miss Effie M. Buren, Deaconess, Los Angeles, Cal. Birthplace, Princeton, Mo.

Her text: "I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go; I will guide thee with mine eye."

January 7.

Miss Emma Caroline Johnson, Aldrich Deaconess Home, Grand Rapids, Mich. Birthplace, South Norwalk, Conn.

1893. Opening of deaconess work in Knoxville, Tenn. "Eight years of blessed service in the upbuilding of His kingdom for the love of Christ and hmanity."—*Rhoda Sigler*.

1899. The Francie Alexander Library in Mothers' Jewels Home consecrated for its mission.

January 8.

Mrs. Dunton and Mrs. Hartzell are two names intimately associated with the early work of the Society. Mrs. Dunton assisted in organizing the Conferences throughout the North, and in opening work in South Carolina. Mrs. Hartzell started Home Missionary work in New Orleans before the organization of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. In the summer of 1878-79 she raised seven hundred or more dollars for the work.

1893. Bidwell Deaconess Home, Des Moines, Ia., formally opened with an address by Bishop Fowler. Woman’s Home Missionary Society assumed management October 12, 1895.

1900. The Elizabeth Wellington Griffin Deaconess Home, at Rensselaer, N. Y., dedicated by Bishop Warren.

1890. First Deaconess Home in Philadelphia occupied; it was dedicated February 20.

Miss Ada B. Hutchins, Kindergartner, Baltimore Deaconess Home. Birthplace, Ohio.

1882. Mrs. S. M. Lewis left her home to open work in Savannah, Ga.

1893. Miss Ella J. Hewett, a returned Missionary from Japan, took charge of the first Home for Japanese women in San Francisco.

1886. The Japanese Mission in San Francisco was formed, mother of all Japanese missionary work on the Pacific coast.

1901. The Gulf Mission Conference Woman's Home Missionary Society was formed. There were auxiliaries in 1900.

1901. Building for Chinese and Japanese women and children begun in San Francisco. Miss Margarette Lake is the missionary.
