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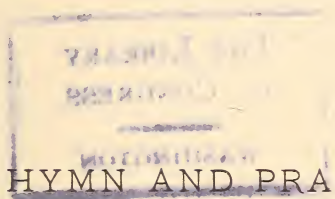

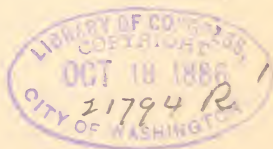

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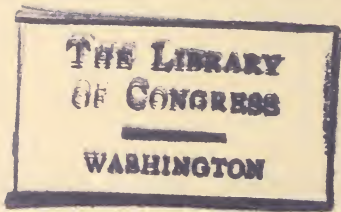

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P R E F A C E .

THE "WORD FOR THE DAY" has been compiled with reference to real, everyday needs, not fictitious or merely sentimental ones. Thus the endeavor has been to touch the work-a-day Christian life at all possible points; to arouse, to strengthen, to comfort the believer with germ thoughts from the divine word, and their echoes in the human mind.

Choosing the poetical thoughts here and there, with reference chiefly to their carrying out or amplifying the topic suggested by the Scripture text, it has not always been possible to find the authors' names. It was not deemed necessary to reject a gem because not labelled with the name of the mine from which it was taken.

The blank spaces at the end of the book may be utilized as a record of birthdays, and other events of personal and family history, or of the way in which the reader has carried out the central thought of the selections. It might be found profitable also to note briefly actions of others which seem to accord with the spirit of the topic ; drawing upon history, biography, or fiction for illustrations of the special virtues or sins mentioned.

To a fertile mind, many ways will suggest themselves of making this book further the end that the compiler had in view. That it may not "return void," is her earnest and heartfelt desire.

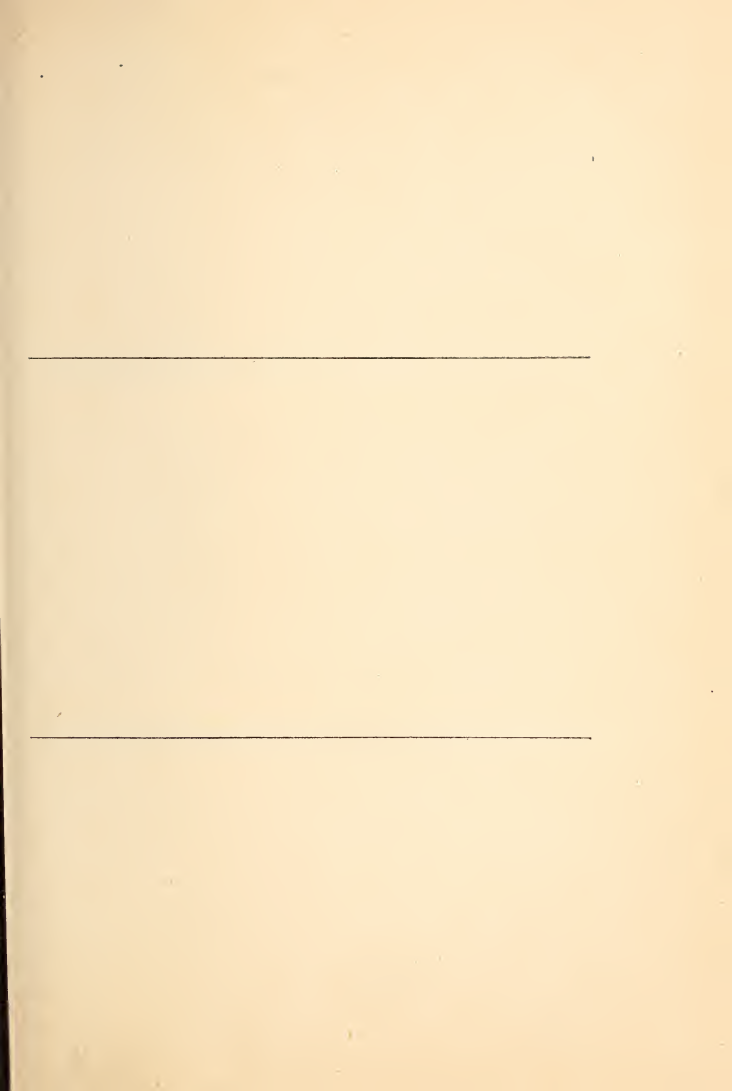


